Machine Dead Without Patronage.

Hon. Wm. L. Marbury, candidate for the long term United States Senatorship, made a great speech at Hancock on his tour of Washington county on Saturday. In speaking of federal patronage Mr. Marbury strikingly said: "It was for the purpose of destroying the old system that the progressive movement in the Democratic party was begun, and it was in fighting the great battle of the people against this system in his own State that Woodrow Wilson won the place which he now holds in the hearts of the American people and in the confidence of the Democratic party, and yet, in the face of all this, there are people in this State to-day—some of them good people, too, but not, I think, thoughtful people—who are manifesting great indignation because the present Democratic Administration has not used the appointing power of the Federal Government to rehabilitate this old system by selecting for Federal offices men who are active advocates of the re-election of Senator Smith to the United States Senate.

THE MACHINE NEEDS PATRONAGE.

"It is manifest to every intelligent voter of the State that Senator Smith has no chance to maintain his power without the perpetuation of the power of the machine, and the power of the machine is derived entirely from the power to control patronage—in other words, appointment to offices. It must be equally plain that whether these appointments are made directly on the recommendation of Senator Smith himself or indirectly or even incidentally as results of recommendations made by members of Congress who recommend his partisans for appointment, the result of such appointments would be to restore to him that which had been the main source of his power—the control of or the appearance of controlling patronage—and aid in perpetuating the system by promoting the re-election of its chief exponent and beneficiary to the United States Senate.

"The question here at issue is not whether the appointing power of the President shall be used in the interests of any progressive candidate, but whether it shall be used in the interests of Senator Smith for the perpetuation in Maryland of the same system which Woodrow Wilson has done so much to destroy in New Jersey.

"The movement for the destruction of this system is nation-wide. It is sweeping from State to State across this broad country. Why should anyone expect this great leader of progressive Democracy in the nation to do aught to stay its course?"

Straus For Short Term.

The Baltimore American, the regular Republican organ, which is fighting like a beaver for the re-election of Senator John Walter Smith, and which is also close to Mayor Preston said on Tuesday:

"Democrats in the city and all over the State are urging former Attorney-General Isaac Love Straus, to be a candidate for the short term in the United States Senate. Mr. Straus has declared his candidacy for the long term as successor to Senator John Walter Smith, but as the two gentlemen have many friends in common the suggestion has been made that Mr. Straus change from the long to the short term.

"Mr. Straus held a conference yesterday with John J. Mahon, Frank Kelley and other Democratic city leaders. At this conference the situation was canvassed, but no conclusion was reached. The Democratic organization leaders in the counties and in the State are anxious to give their support to Mr. Straus, not only because of his ability and qualifications from their viewpoint, but also because of his fighting abilities as displayed by his public record and by his recent letter to President Woodrow Wilson denying the latter's right to interfere in the election of a United States Senator in Maryland.

"Senator Lee, who is a candidate for the short term, has never been popular with the leaders of his party in the city and State.

It is presumed of course that the American is on the inside in city and State politics, and whereas Mr. Straus started out as a Progressive, he can go back to his first love and make the reactionary fight just the same.

Hicks' Forecasts for June.

A reactionary storm period extending over the 2nd, 3rd and 4th. Moon is in conjunction with Sun and Earth on the 4th. This, of course, gives us new Moon at high north declination. The new Moon is always at or near its greatest north point in the heavens in June. This, we hold, is one of the prime causes of maximum lightning, thunder and rain, in this solstice month. The falling barometer, and storms of rain and wind, which will develop in the west about the 2nd, will reach different longitudes in their eastward progress, on and touching the 3rd and 4th. These storms will reach their greatest extent and strength on and next to the 4th. The barometer will rise, and cooler, westerly winds will follow the storms from two to three days—say about the 5th to the 7th. The first June seismic period covers the 1st to the 7th, having its centre on the 4th.

A regular storm period involves the 6th to the 12th. This period is coincident with the annual magnetic and electrical crisis, which is at its centre each year on and about June 11th. Its peculiar influence is noticeable from about the 5th to the 15th, notably on the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th. Heavy storms of wind, rain and thunder will touch many sections in their eastward sweep over the country on and touching the 10th, 11th, and 12th. The Venus equinox, which is central in July, will add its disturbing energy to that of the Mercury period during the last week in June, calling for a prolonged spell of cloudy and threatening weather. Upon the whole, the general outlook for June is not abnormal, excepting the fact that the Jupiter influence will tend greatly to local down-pours and cloudburst, with lack of diffused rains in wide sections of the country.

Crowless Roosters Are Occupying Experts' Minds.

Washington, May 30.—Cock-a-doodle-doless roosters, guaranteed absolutely soundless and which will solve the problem of light-sleeping city dwellers annoyed early mornings by the neighbors' loudly crowing cocks are now the subject of experience by experts of the Department of Agriculture.

A correspondent, who discovered the process of eliminating the cock's crow, set the experts at work. A simple and painless operation of cutting one of the rooster's vocal chords does the trick, he says. The rooster can fill his lungs and go through all the evolutions which accompany a hearty crow, but can make no sound.
