WE HAVE BEEN SUED.

One of the Editors of the Transcript Was Arrested and the Transcript Publishing Company Was Sued Before the Ink on Saturday's Issue Was Dry.

Have you ever experienced how it feels to be arrested and then sued? We had our first experience last Friday evening and Saturday morning, and we confess that there is something novel about it, to say the least. The ink on the issue of last week had not gotten dry on Friday evening before Harrison W. Vickers, Jr., sent the constable, Mr. Beverly Hyland, into Mr. Bowers' home on Washington avenue and arrested Mr. Bowers on the charge of criminal libel, and demanded that he appear before Police Justice Kendall at eight o'clock to answer the charge of criminal libel, which charge was based upon an editorial in our last Saturday's issue under the heading, "Caught in the Trap." We answered the summons, waived a hearing and gave bail in the sum of \$500 for our appearance at court. On Saturday morning Sheriff William H. McKee served notice of a suit for damages, amounting to no stipulated damages, against our publisher, the Transcript Publishing Company by Harrison W. Vickers, Jr., upon Mr. Bowers, Mr. Collins and the members of the company. These are the details in the case which will be docketed for the October term of court. The editorial to which offense seems to have been taken is no doubt familiar to every one. The TRANSCRIPT was in such great demand on Saturday morning that we presume every one has seen it by this time. It would not be good taste for us to discuss the merits of the editorial. It speaks for itself.

We have been expecting something of the kind to happen for some time. Every possible effort has been made to destroy the character and reputation of Mr. Bowers by his political enemies, and we presume that those who are responsible for Mr. Bowers' arrest thought that they could most effectively accomplish their purpose by the mortifying and humiliating spectacle of the sending of an officer to our home to arrest us for an imaginary offense against some one. This is not the first attempt that has been made to intimidate the editors of the TRANSCRIPT, nor do we have an idea that it will be the last. Let a man have the courage of his convictions, let him fight the battle of the people against machine politicians and corrupt political methods, and his enemies will hound him like a vulture seeks its prey. They have done everything now that is possible, but let them understand once for all that they may crucify us in whatever manner they may choose, they may hound us, and seek to destroy our character, and mortify us and humiliate us, but we shall fight the battle of the people against what we believe to be wrong, if they send us to the penitentiary. We know we are pursuing the proper course, we know we are right, and if the people will remain steadfast, we will fight their battle till the final victory is won. We have no fear whatever of the result of this matter, nor will we be intimidated for one moment, if that is their game. We shall use every effort at our command to let the people know what our enemies are doing, and we shall fight to the last ditch for what we believe to be right. We shall let the law take its course in this matter, and we shall seek our vindication at the hands of our peers.
