THE ARMY WORM

Makes Its Appearance By Millions in the Wheat and Corn-fields in Kent County.

Through the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. W. Frank Jarrell, we were given the opportunity to see the work of the army worm on Mr. Jarrell's Dennis McCauley farm near Galena, tenanted by Mr. Otto M. Fogwell. Mr. Fogwell has 160 acres of as pretty wheat as you would care to see, and it was a prey to millions of the pest, which causes destruction in its march here and there. Mr. Fogwell stated that the worms made their appearance in his wheat all of a sudden. He noticed a few on Wednesday of last week, but on Sunday there were millions of them on the wheat heads, on the ground, and in the lane adjoining. An examination of the wheat head showed that the worm attacked the tip of the grain and whatever beard there may be on it. Opinions vary as to the damage the worms do to wheat. Mr. Samuel Vannort, who with his wife, accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Jarrell and Mr. Bowers on Sunday afternoon, as well as Senator Garrett Foxwell, Mr. Charles Sutton and Mr. James T. Anthony, all experienced farmers, say that the worms do no damage whatever to wheat. Mr. Foxwell says that during his 40 years of farming he was attacked four times by the pest. His wheat fields were literally alive with the worms, and he had as big a yield of wheat in those four years as he ever had in his life. Mr. Charles Sutton says in 1882 he was attacked, and he had a fine yield of wheat. Mr. James T. Anthony, one of our most experienced farmers and graziers, says the same thing. But they are death to cornfields. From Friday evening to Sunday afternoon the worms had eaten ten acres of Mr. Fogwell's cornfield as clean as a floor. Mr. Fogwell had dug great trenches around his field to protect the balance of his corn. The worms disappear as suddenly as they come, and Mr. Fogwell said he hoped they would soon get away from him. He also said that he would wait until he thrashed his wheat before he decided as to the damage the worm does to the wheat. The farm has been visited by great crowds during the week to see the worms. But we hear they have appeared in all parts of the county. They are in every field around Galena for a radius of five miles and the pests have been seen in the fields of Mr. Harry Nicols, Mr. John Atwell in Flatlands, and others. Nearly every farmer in this county has plowed great trenches in his cornfield to prevent attacks. The last time the worms appeared in Kent county was in 1882. They did great damage to cornfields at that time, but wheat was not hurt. Hogs will devour the worms with relish, and Mr. Fogwell had his hogs in the lane and wheat cleaning the pests up.
