ALL forward-looking men are standing together much more closely than they were before last Friday night. The other fellow's forces are demoralized, and they are leaving the ranks day by day.

OUR tax-payers are urged to read very carefully the levy list, which appears in this issue. Read the explanations which accompany the levy, and don't depend upon mere hearsay and deceptive statements for your information regarding the county finances.

THE TRANSCRIPT sold like wild fire last Saturday morning, and all the news stands in town had sold out before ten o'clock. That was a mighty interesting issue last Saturday. Just a little too interesting for the B'hoys, and something had to be doing.

THOMPSON AND TAYLOR, the Organization candidates for County Commissioners, stand for a tax rate of \$1.85. Crew and Wood, the Anti-Organization candidates, stand for a tax rate of 94 cents. To protect your interests Mr. Tax-payer, who are you going to vote for?

The Jones will case has been on trial at Centreville during the week, and some 36 witnesses have been in attendance. Hope H. Barroll, S. Scott and Wm. W. Beck are the attorneys in the case. Mr. Sterling Jones and his sister, Mrs. Spencer Harris, are endeavoring to upset the will of their father, the late R. C. Jones, and the other heirs who are the beneficiaries of the will are contesting their rights. The evidence was concluded and argument begun at the hour of going to press.

It is the most astonishing thing in the world to us that there are a few people left in Kent who are so foolish as to think that the County Commissioners are to blame for refusing to give any more money than the law appropriates to waste on the roads. The \$1.85 tax rate was caused by squandering the tax-payers' money on the roads, and any man who favors wasting any more money on the roads under the present management, is foolish and likes to pay high taxes. The Organization faction is blaming the commissioners for enforcing their own law.

The 94-cent tax rate, the refusal of Mr. Paul Dunn to run on the Organization ticket, and the exposure of the political record of Howard Turner, one of the Organization candidates for the Legislature, whom everybody regards as a Republican or Prohibitionist, was more than the Organization forces could stand on Saturday, and in their desperation for something to counteract the effect of these issues they arrested one of the editors of the TRANSCRIPT and sued the Transcript Publishing Company for libel. They are dying a hard death this time, and the TRANSCRIPT is going to give them a decent burial.

We understand that Mr. Howard Leaverton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Leaverton, on the Wroth-Jump farm, has rented Mr. Thomas G. Wroth's farm near Janvier's school house in Worton, and that Mr. Walter Kendall, the present tenant, we understand, has purchased Napley, the farm in the Fifth District, for which Mr. Allan A. Harris is agent.

If the people of this county appreciate what a tax rate of 94 cents means to them, as compared with extravagance and bad road management, they will not hesitate a moment to consider how they shall vote in the coming primaries. The Anti-Organization candidates stand for 94 cents on the \$100. The Organization candidates stand for a tax rate of \$1.85 on the \$100, and extravagance and bad road management.

The Kent News says that the reason the tax rate is 94 cents on the \$100 is because of the saving on the roads, and they go out and tell the road workers that the reason they can't give them any more money is because the County Commissioners won't give them any more money than the Kent News and its friends stipulated in their own road law should be spent a year. THEY ARE CRITICISING THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS FOR ENFORCING THE LAW WHICH THE ORGANIZATION MADE. Reminds us of the fellow who, when he went to bed, put his clothes in bed and laid down on the floor to sleep.

The tax rate of 94 cents on the \$100 declared by the County Commissioners last Friday, is the thing that put the crimp in the Organization. Their lame and puerile excuse that the great saving in the roads enabled the commissioners to declare a low rate, won't answer the bill. If that is so, no credit is due the Organization forces, for they tried their level best to urge the commissioners to give them \$4000 more for the roads about a month before the levy was struck, because their engineer had spent all of his \$21,236 appropriation two months before he should have spent it. So, if anybody is responsible for the saving on the roads it is certainly not the Organization, but the Antis. It is the most laughable thing in the world, the excuses that the Organization is offering for what is being done.

WHAT IS THE USE? We understand that the Organization is circulating petitions in the county to get people to say that they believe Mr. Turner is a Democrat. What is the use of doing that, when Mr. Turner has admitted that he has voted the Republican ticket, and is a petition an evidence of a man's Democracy?

TO DEFEND US. Hon. William L. Marbury, one of the best constitutional lawyers in the State, Hope H. Barroll and L. Wethered Barroll Esqs., will defend Mr. Bowers and Mr. Collins and the Transcript Publishing Company in the suits for libel that have been brought against them. Wm. W. Beck, Lewin W. Wickes and S. Scott Beck have noted their appearance for the plaintiff.

MR. TURNER ADMITS IT. We understand that Mr. Howard Turner, the Organization candidate for the Legislature, admitted at a festival held at Worton Station several Saturday nights ago that he did vote for Capt. Daniel Hill, and he has admitted to the editors of the TRANSCRIPT that he voted the Republican ticket nationally and all his environment and associations have been Republican. This being the case, we call upon Mr. Turner to withdraw as a candidate from the Democratic ticket.

ISN'T THIS CHILDISH? Did you ever hear anything more childish in your life than this from the Beck Organ of last Saturday? "G. D. Luffard refused to serve as a candidate on the Barroll ticket showing his good judgment." H. L. Kenyon has been in the "Isn't this rather unusual for an officer of the law?" Isn't Mr. John P. Ahern, your candidate for County Treasurer an officer of the law? Is he not now holding the office of School Commissioner at a yearly salary, and did you not make Sheriff Daniel Hadaway, a candidate for delegate to the State convention when your was your Sheriff? Stop publishing such stuff as that or you will make yourself and your whole ticket a county laughing stock.

HERE'S ANOTHER BRIGHT ONE. Here is the way the Beck Organ sizes up Mr. Caldwell, the Anti-Organization candidate for County Treasurer: "Did it occur to anyone reading that squib concerning the value of Mr. Caldwell to the farmers of this county, that the farmers had been about as valuable to him as he to them? We never heard anything wrong about Mr. Caldwell, but we fall to wondering what particular claim he has on the suffrage of Kent's citizens besides his horse and cattle, and is making a tidy little sum to keep the wolf from the door and to be the support of his declining years. The farmers are to vote for him because he sells them a horse or mule says the Barroll organ! Well, that's a binding argument for one's suffrage." Ah! Ha! Mr. Ahern, the Organization candidate, sells lumber and coal. He has sold thousands of dollars worth of lumber to Kent county for bridges, etc. Is the fact that Mr. Ahern is a lumber dealer, "a binding argument for one's suffrage?" Ain't they bright on argument, though, and have they not some of the same issues upon which to go before the people?

CRITICISING THEIR OWN LAW. The Organization faction drew up and passed the present Road Law. They provided that so much money should be spent on the roads every year, and left it to the discretion of the County Commissioners as to whether any more money than they appropriated shall be spent. What do you think of them for criticising the commissioners for enforcing a law which they themselves made?

A FRANK ADMISSION. We do not believe that the writer, whoever he was, of the column editorial in the Kent News last Saturday had any idea of making such a frank admission as he did in his attack upon Mr. Bowers, but in view of the fact that "an honest confession is good for the soul," we presume that he adopted the method of easing a guilty conscience. He admitted first that the Transcript told the truth, a most unusual admission from that source, and secondly and far more important, he admits that if by any accident Messrs. Turner and

Shallcross, are fortunate enough to get to the Legislature, they will CARRY OUT THE POLICIES OF THE ORGANIZATION FACTION, WHICH IS A PART OF THE PEOPLE. Here is an admission even in the columns of the Organization paper, that Messrs. Turner and Shallcross, if elected to the Legislature, will carry out the wishes of the Organization and not those of the people, and in view of the fact that the writer would not dare discuss the policies and principles for which the Organization stands and for which it has stood for years, he devotes a column to a sarcastic attack upon Mr. Bowers, and in the same breath admits the truth of Mr. Bowers' statement in the TRANSCRIPT the week previous, in discussing the meaning of Messrs. Turner and Shallcross' candidacy. The following admission taken from the Kent News of last Saturday speaks volumes to the people.

"The Barroll organ introduces Messrs. Turner and Shallcross as the Organization candidates for the Legislature. In so doing, the Barroll organ is representing and carrying out the policies of the Organization; truthfully, too, that they would never have been selected but for their honesty; truthfully, too, that if they were elected they would carry out the policies of the Organization; truthfully, too, that they will endeavor to legislate in the interests of the people; truthfully, too, that such legislation will be in the interest of the Organization faction—being a part of the people."

This means that Messrs. Turner and Shallcross will do everything they can to keep the Road Engineer in office, that they will not raise their hands to repeal the iniquitous road law, and give the people decent road management. It means also that Messrs. Turner and Shallcross will do everything they can to pass those Organization bills calling for \$68,000 of the people's money, without giving the people a right to vote as to whether it shall be so spent. It means that they will pass such legislation as will enable the Organization to gain possession of the County Commissioners office and once more get their hands on the public purse strings. IT MEANS THAT TURNER AND SHALLCROSS WILL REPRESENT THE ORGANIZATION AND NOT THE PEOPLE. That is all there is to it. THE TRANSCRIPT stated they would do it, and the Kent News, admits THE TRANSCRIPT told the truth.

WHAT CAUSED OUR ARREST.

The following editorial published in last Saturday's issue as a reply to the attack of the Kent News of the week previous, charging Mr. Bowers with lying in reference to an offer to be on the result of the contest between Mr. Caldwell and Mr. Ahern for county treasurer, made by a gentleman in good faith, was the occasion for our arrest last Friday evening. The editorial speaks for itself. Read it.

CAUGHT IN THE TRAP. All you have to do is to make the odds high enough, and regardless of the law against betting the Organization will go after the money. Those young men came from Millington, we believe, with no idea of betting until they reached Chestertown. They went to see Mr. Barroll, and not a word was said about betting. They went from there to the State's Attorney's office and the ex-State's Attorney's office, then to the TRANSCRIPT office, and from there back to the State's Attorney's office, then to Mr. Barroll's office, then back to Mr. Beck's office, and from there the story of the betting got into the Beck organ. The scheme to get the young men to bet was hatched, we believe, either in the State's Attorney's office or in the office of the ex-State's Attorney. Why did not the State's Attorney or the ex-State's Attorney remind the young men that the law against betting on elections is very strict? You know the Organization forces are great for accusing the Antis of violating the Corrupt Practices Act, and it has been said that if the Organization forces lose this primary fight they are going to accuse the Antis of using money to beat them just as they did two years ago. The escape of the two young men from Millington, presumably at the instigation of the State's Attorney and the ex-State's Attorney, should serve to convince the people that the Organization leaders do not hesitate to violate the law when it suits their purposes. Adherents of the Organization faction can be induced to violate the law against betting on election or anything else with impunity, especially when the odds are high enough, but the slightest semblance of such a thing by the Antis is a sufficient cause for seeking to haul somebody before the grand jury. You set a trap for them, and you can catch them every time. In reference to Mr. Barroll we state that he played his end of the game with characteristic shrewdness. The odds were offered all right, and the game worked like a chapp.

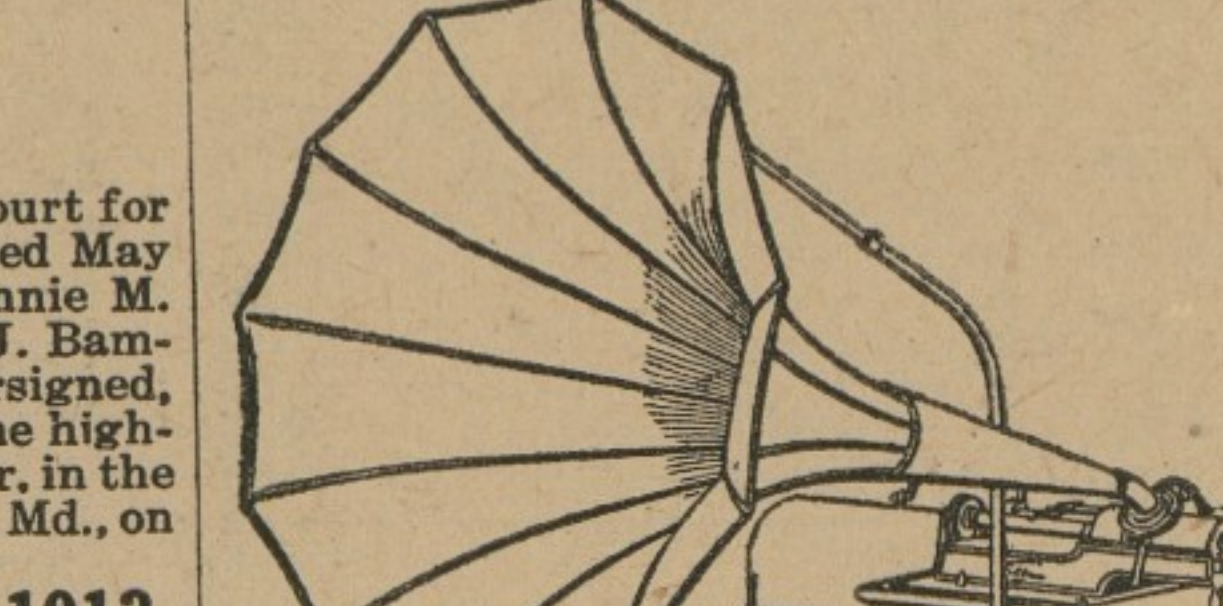

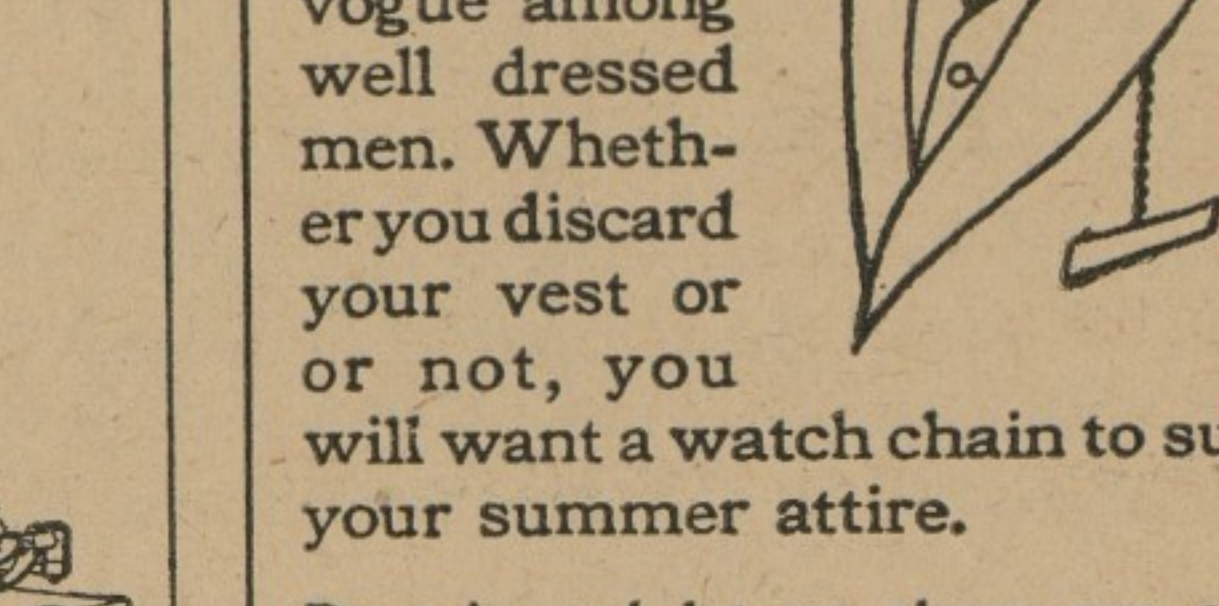
