WHO IS PAYING THE BILLS?

On the 19th of April Isaac Gibbs, Jr., the Road Engineer for this county, advertised the following notice in the Kent News:

NOTICE.

The public is hereby notified not to do any more work on the public roads except upon my order as Commissioners refuse to allow me any more money.

ISAAC GIBBS, Engineer.

This was nearly two months before the striking of the tax rate last Friday by the Board of Commissioners, and the Road Engineer had exhausted his entire appropriation of \$21,236.00, notwithstanding the fact that he had spent \$25,000, which was \$7,000 more than the law which the Organization forces had passed, just at a time when he needs the money most. The Kent News reminded the road workers editorially that there was no more money for roads, and published a letter from Mr. Samuel Hicks, clerk to the Board of Commissioners, to that effect. Mr. Gibbs' notice had scarcely been published before more work than ever was being done on the roads. Several of the banks of Chestertown received a number of bills for road work done after the engineer's advertisement was inserted in the Kent News, but we have understood that these bills were not accepted by the banks. The TRANSCRIPT warned the Board of Commissioners what was being done, and advised the board to refuse to pay these bills when they are presented along in October or November. The TRANSCRIPT advised the county taxes are collected and the road engineer has access to the coming year's appropriation. One gentleman who had done some work on the roads presented his bill to one of our banks the latter part of May and asked to have it discounted. THE BILL WAS FOR \$25 FOR WORK DONE UPON THE ROADS THE DAY BEFORE MAY THE DAY IT WAS PRESENTED AT THE BANK, AND YET THE BILL WAS DATED JUNE SO AS TO GIVE IT A CLAIM UPON THE COMING YEAR'S APPROPRIATION, and judging from the vast amount of work that has been and is still being done on the roads since Mr. Gibbs advertised that no work shall be done on the roads except by his order because the commissioners won't give him any more money, it is safe to say that there are thousands of dollars in such bills outstanding, and they are spending just as much money on the roads to-day as they spent under the old system. The Road Engineer overspent his appropriation of \$18,000 in 1911 by about \$7,000, and every dollar of that \$7,000 was taken out of the appropriation for the year 1912. And that is the reason why he exhausted his road fund before the 19th of last April. And the money he spent on the roads from April 19th to June 6th, last Friday, amounting we are sure to between \$7,000 and \$10,000, are sure to be between \$7,000 and \$10,000, and we shall advise the county taxes to secure from the Road Engineer shortly a statement of just how much money he has spent and provided for spending the present year. The Organ- ization forces were compelled to pass a law to make them spend less money on the roads, and instead of obeying the law, and giving the tax-payers a dol- lar's worth of work for a dollar, they are spending every year more money than their own law allows, and the con- sequence is that the road fund is almost a year short, and they say that the saving on the roads caused the low tax rate.

PEOPLE'S COLUMN.

The Whole Show.

DEER SIRS—I read a peace in yore paper last Sat about taxes. I want to let you that you was just braggin. Braggin about nothin. You know as well as anybody that the organization haint had only adviced about \$20,000 a yere to spend on roads. 430 mile of roads in the county, or say a average of 145 a mile, and a dollar and a half a day fer work, or 30 days work fer one man on every mile of rode in the county every yere. Thats all. And ware is these 430 men that has bin workin the roads? Have they kiked 'em durin this time the orgazation ought to of had 1 thousand men at work. But that aint the point. You sed the antys has cut down the det from 110 thousand dollars to 88 thousand in 3 yere. Do you think that is enything? If the orgazation had been doin that kind of business they would of cut that det away and had 35 or maybe 40 thousand dollars on hand now. And you sed the antys has cut the tax rate down from \$1.85 cents to 94 cents in three yere. Well when that \$1.85 cents tax rate cum out you antys was gitten redy to cut it down, and if the orgazation would of cut the rate down it would of bin down to 64 cents or less by this time. And dont fergit that the orgazation has only bin able to spend anouf money to hire 430 men two weeks in the fall and spring every yere. Thats what has cut the taxes down and I say if the orgazation had of don this we would of had money on had to spend, all detts paid, and 44 cents tax rate this yere. If you dont beleve this ask any orgazation man about it. Now sir you write another peace and quit braggin and excuse spellin.
