WHEN the Organization assumed control of the County Commissioners office in 1903, they started with a rate of \$1.35. When they were driven out of power in 1909 by the people, they left a tax rate of \$1.85. It is said that experience is the best teacher, and surely the tax-payers in this county have had experience enough with the management of affairs by Urie and the Organization Democrats not to want any more of it.

WE proved conclusively that the Road Engineer spent \$7,000 over his appropriation last year, and Mr. Barroll, in a series of letters in the TRANSCRIPT, showed where it went and who got it. The Kent News nor the Road Engineer did not dare contradict these statements, because they knew we had the proof. It is the consensus of opinion that there has been more work done on the roads since the Road Engineer advertised that no more work should be done because he had exhausted his fund of \$21,236 before the 19th of April, than has been done during the whole year previous, and we have heard of numerous bills being presented to the banks for discount, and that the banks have refused to take them. Mr. Frank Gilpin presented a bill to one of the banks in town some time the latter part of May, WHICH BILL WAS DATED JUNE. This bill was for \$25, and the cashier refused to accept it, stating that the bank did not transact such business. We do not censure Mr. Gilpin in the least. He did the work, by order of the Road Engineer we presume, and was entitled to his pay. The fault is that the Road Engineer has allowed all this work to be done, after he knew his appropriation had been exhausted practically. And while we know that he spent \$7,000 more than his appropriation last year, we are sure that the excess for this past year is as large if not larger, and when the bills come in and we can get possession of them we expect to be able to show that instead of expending \$21,236 as the law appropriated to him, he has actually spent from \$28,000 to \$30,000 on the roads. If this is not true let the Road Engineer publish every account that he has made since he advertised that no more work should be done, and the people will then see what has been done.

OUR DEATH RECORD.

RICHARD T. CARTER.
Richard T. Carter, one of the most prominent men in Caroline county, died at his home in Denton on Saturday. For many years he was active in business and was the first cashier of the Denton National Bank. Mr. Carter had been suffering from kidney trouble for some months. He was about 55 years old and a son of Col. Richard T. Carter. Mr. Carter married Miss Carrie Sigler, a daughter of the late Isaac Sigler, of Ridgeley, and his only daughter, Miss Annie Sigler Carter, recently graduated from Goucher College. Mr. Carter was educated at Dickinson College, and among his classmates were a number who afterward attained distinction in various parts of the country. Of late years he had managed a large landed estate. He was a relative of Mrs. Wm. E. Jarrell, of this town. Mr. and Mrs. W. Frank Jarrell attended the funeral.

MR. SAMUEL W. DUNN.
Mr. Samuel W. Dunn, of Philadelphia, well-known in this county, where he owns large landed interests, died June 20th, at his home in Philadelphia. Interment was made last week at Salem, N. J. Mr. Dunn had frequently been the guest of Mr. Walter T. Morris, who manages his farms here.

MR. LOUIS PETERS SMITH.
Mr. Louis Peters Smith, 55 years old, who for the past seven or eight years had made his home with Col. and Mrs. John H. Evans, at Rolph's wharf, died on Sunday evening at the home of his aunt, Mrs. A. W. Litzig, in Baltimore, of pneumonia. The deceased was a native of Kent county. He leaves two brothers, Henry and Edward Smith.
