## POULTRY NOTES.

### Vigor Necessary For Laying

If neither cornfield nor orchard is available, give the pullets range over mowing fields after the grass has been cut for hay, or over the pasture land; the latter has special advantages if there are trees scattered here and there or if there is wood adjoining. The essential thing is that the pullets have liberal range, since ranging promotes body-growth, the developing of bone and muscle and building up of bodily strength and vigor, for these are essential for pullets that we want to have to do the best work on the nest.

It is only the pullets that come into the laying quarters in full bodily strength and vigor that have the necessary "staying power" to produce eggs continuously, that lay well through the late fall and early winter months, and then continue to lay steadily, until it is time to sell them off to market. Otherwise they go into the molt preparatory to growing their new crop of clothes.

It has been objected by some that there was much labor in caring for pullets that were spread out over a considerable range, but such is not the case where up-to-date feeding methods are employed; if one continued the old method of feeding three times a day there would be both time and labor expended in feeding.

The simple method of keeping the food before the growing pullets all the time and letting them help themselves at will reduces the labor to a minimum. By using field food hoppers, which hold a week's supply of food for each family, and refilling the hoppers once a week there is extremely little labor expended.
