Why does not Mr. Howard Turner explain his attitude in the Betterton Town Commissioner fight which he opposed a Democrat for election?

The primaries will be held throughout the State on Tuesday, September 9th, at which time a short term United State's Senator will be nominated. The Anti-Organization delegates are for Senator Blair Lee.

The announcement of the candidacy of Mr. Robert J. McWhorter for sheriff has put ginger in the Anti-Organization ranks. Mr. McWhorter is a splendid man for this position, and he is receiving assurances of support every day right in the Organization ranks. Bob McWhorter is a winner.

Mr. JOHN D. URIB is not only the chief adviser and director of the Organization Democratic forces in this campaign, but he is at the helm in their fight to nominate Mr. Howard Turner. Mr. Urrie, it is said, is using his efforts to affiliate as Democrats in the primaries in September, in order that they may vote for Mr. Turner. We shall have more to say about this next week.

If the schools of Kent county could have been run in 1911 by a Democratic Board of Commissioners, and show an actual balance of \$1,828, after spending some extra \$3,000 for new school buildings, \$312 for a building lot in Betterton, \$625 in extra coal bill, \$250 in extra rental, certainly the Republican Board should have run the schools in 1912-13 and had a much larger surplus, in view of the fact that they had the same amount of money with which to run the schools, and not a single building was erected or building site purchased.

The author of that column and a quarter editorial on county finances last Saturday in the Urie organ is a pastmaster at inconsistency and the art of deception. He is a member of that force who believes in deceiving the people as well as claiming credit for everything that is done and for much that is not done. There was absolutely nothing in the article worthy of comment, but we deem it best to keep the people advised of the attempts of the Urie organ and its editorial writers to keep their past political mistakes in the background.

WHO ARE THESE PEOPLE? The Road Engineer's report published elsewhere in this issue shows that Mr. A. BOUGHT received \$7.50 for working roads in the Second District; Mr. J. HAMBOUGHT \$13.65 for bridges and \$3.75 for road work, while Mr. W. WYLLIS in the Third District got \$10.95 for road work. Who are these people?

THE SCHOOL SITUATION. If it requires an appropriation by the County Commissioners of Wicomico of only \$40,000 to help run 106 schools in that county, certainly it should not require \$40,000 to run 72 schools in Kent county. And if the County Commissioners of Caroline county appropriate \$36,000 to run 77 schools of that county, such as they did last week, why can't Kent county get along on an appropriation of \$35,000 from the County Commissioners here for 72 schools? That is the all-absorbing question to the taxpayers.

INSATIATE DESIRE FOR MONEY. If the Organization faction tried their hardest to get \$83,000 from the taxpayers last year, without having control of the Board of County Commissioners, what do you imagine they would do if they had control of the Board of County Commissioners? The desire of the Organization to spend money seems to be insatiate. They were driven from power by the people because they spent money extravagantly on the roads, and ever since they have been out of power they have been concocting some scheme to spend the people's money, and yet the Urie organ says the Organization is fighting for ECONOMY. It must be political economy, for it surely is not financial economy.

AN expert accountant is at work in the County Commissioners office, having appeared on the scene last Thursday. He says he is here in the interest of the tax-payers, though he is not employed by the County Commissioners. The commissioners gave him ready access to the books and extended to him a cordial welcome. It is to be hoped that the accountant will make a thorough examination of the books of the office, and publish a report of his findings. The sooner the report is published the worse it will be for those who have employed him and the better it will be for the Antis. So hurry the thing along and don't wait until the day before the primaries to spring the sensation.

HERE IT GOES AGAIN. Somerset county commissioners last week declared a tax rate of 98 cents on the \$100. They appropriated \$22,000 for schools, and \$20,000 for roads. Somerset county has 85 schools, 5,455 different pupils, and the total amount of expenses for running their 85 schools was \$72,036.24. How do these figures compare with Kent's 71 schools.

IN THE NAME OF ECONOMY. The Organization in Kent is fighting against Slavery and Bossism and for Economy, Temperance and Fitness. Kent News, July 5th. This is the way the Organization is fighting for Economy—They spent \$25,000 on the roads last year when their law which they passed to compel them to be more economical than they had been, only appropriated \$18,000. They tried their hardest to get a law through the last Legislature to spend \$48,000 of the tax-payers' money, without saying a word to the tax-payers about it. They wanted the Board of County Commissioners to appropriate \$3,000 more for roads after they had spent \$25,000 instead of \$18,000, and they have been assisting Mr. Urie to get \$5,000 more of the tax-payers' money for schools. Had it not been for the Anti-Organization the Organization would have gotten an extra \$83,000 during the past year out of the tax-payers IN THE NAME OF ECONOMY. Of course their fight for TEMPERANCE and FITNESS is about on a par with the sincerity of their fight for ECONOMY.

PEOPLE'S COLUMN.

Statement of Taxes Under the Old Organization Board Compared With the Taxes Levied by the Anti-Organization Board.

It will thus be seen that in the years 1905 to 1908 the Organization Board of County Commissioners levied only a part of what they spent each year. In 1909, finding that such levies would any longer be impossible, and that it was absolutely necessary to provide more money, they increased the levy by more than \$13,000. But this failed to pay off the accumulated back debts by considerably over \$90,000. In 1910, when the Anti-Organization Commissioners took hold it was found that it was necessary to raise the sum of \$166,181.67 in order to levy for the actual running expense of the county and to pay money which had already been spent in preceding years by the Organization Board but which had not been actually levied. Details which had been known by the Old Organization Board were subsequently discovered by the new Board, and instead of this levy being \$166,000 it was shown that it should have been over \$177,000.

After paying this accumulated back indebtedness—a large part of it fairly squandered and piled up during the last few weeks the Organization were in office—by the levy of 1910: the Anti-Organization Commissioners in 1911 levied the balance of the cost of the new assessment, over \$6,800, and other indebtedness of the Old Board which they did not discover in time for the levy of 1910, and then spent only \$109,544.57. In 1912 they had to provide for the expense of two primaries and one election, and the tax-payers had to foot a bill of \$112,057.50. In the present year, through economy and careful management of the county's finances, the tax-payers' bill is \$100,259.84. Every dollar which the county owed up to the 7th day of June, 1913, when the levy was struck, is included in this sum of \$100,259.84. Not one penny of indebtedness known or presented remains to be included in the levy for 1914.

GENTLEMEN: What is your straw worth to you as a fertilizer? The Bureau of Plant Industry, No. "A" 77, issued by the U. S. Government, gives the value of various litters for use in barn yard, as follows:

Table with 4 columns: Kind of straw or litter, Nitrogen, Phosphoric acid, Potash. Rows include Wheat straw, Rye straw, Oat straw, Barley straw, Pea straw, Soy-bean straw, Buckwheat straw, Millet straw, Marsh hay, Rice straw.

Saw dust contains the same values as wheat straw per ton as a fertilizer. You will note that Marsh Hay (Salt Grass) has more than double the manuring value per ton than wheat straw has, as it contains more than three times as much Potash as wheat straw, and over twice as much Phosphoric Acid and Nitrogen that wheat straw contains.

You will note that wheat straw has the lowest fertilizing value of any of the litters above named. We quote from Farmers' Bulletin No. 56, issued by U. S. Government, and the last paragraph on page 27.

"ONE POINT WHICH HAS BEEN CLEARLY BROUGHT OUT BY RECENT INVESTIGATIONS is that the addition of straw may very decidedly reduce the fertilizing value of manure THE INJURIOUS EFFECT BEING GREATER THE LARGER THE AMOUNT OF STRAW USED. This is explained by the fact that straw contains organism which convert the available nitrogen in manures and in the soil into forms which the plants cannot utilize. THE EXCESSIVE USE OF STRAW AS A LITTER UNDER ANIMALS SHOULD THEREFORE BE CAREFULLY AVOIDED IF THE MOST EFFECTIVE MANURE IS DESIRED."

We further quote you from "FARM FERTILIZERS, in Bulletin No. "A" 77, BUREAU OF PLANT INDUSTRY, issued by the U. S. Government, under the heading of "Farmers Cooperative Demonstration Work," page 5, latter part of first paragraph.

"Straw and saw dust similarly worth about \$3.00 each per ton. These values, of course, are based on their total composition. In actual practice it is safe to assume that half of these values are available, but it is only after undergoing decomposition that these values are available." If these statements, based on actual experiments, are correct, then your straw has a fertilizing value (if decomposed) of about \$1.50 per ton. If not decomposed it is a detriment, as quoted from "Farmers' Bulletin" No. 56.

We will be pleased to send you copies of Bureau of Plant Industry No. "A" 77, also Farmers' Bulletin No. 56, upon request, as we have quoted from these to impress you with the results of practical tests.

If you spread your straw and plow it under, its action is mechanical and is of not as much value as "rag weeds." If you spread it and burn it, it is practically wasted, as the few pounds of Potash which a ton of burned straw will produce makes it a high cost per pound to you, as you will not get six pounds of Potash from a ton of burned straw, and the nitrogen and phosphoric acid go up in smoke. Whereas, a ton of Marsh Hay (salt grass) which is ignored by farmers who have marshes and do not utilize this "marsh grass" contains 54 pounds of potash per ton.
