POTATO CROP MOVING.

Those farmers who have been growing early potatoes this year began moving their crop this week, and the first two carloads of early potatoes ever sent out from Chestertown station left on Wednesday morning.

They were sold by Mr. Edward A. Corey, the pioneer of potato culture in this county. For Mr. Ballinger, at 80 cents per bushel before they left the station.

Mr. Corey spoke very hopefully of potato culture in this county. He says the crop this year, in spite of the very poor start which the potatoes got at the beginning of the season, is a splendid one, and if potatoes can be grown profitably in a season like the present one, there is no doubt of the ability of our farmers to grow a fine crop of potatoes every year.

The yield this year ranges from 100 to 250 bushels of select potatoes, besides the "seconds," which Mr. Corey has disposed of to New York buyers for shipment to Cuba at a very satisfactory price. The cost of growing an acre in potatoes is \$50, and an average yield of 125 bushels per acre at 80 cents a bushel means a clear profit to the farmers of \$50 an acre or 100 per cent. profit.

This beats wheat raising to a frazzle, and is a most profitable substitute for the luscious peach which has about had its day in Kent. Those farmers who have grown potatoes this year are so "chummy" over their fine prospects that they have scarcely been able to come to Chestertown, and the TRANSCRIPT sincerely hopes that every farmer who made the venture will reap an abundant profit for his outlay. No man in the county deserves more commendation for the extra \$40,000 or \$50,000 that will come to our farmers this year than does Mr. E. A. Corey, who began potato culture here, and who got the farmers interested in the front in a potato crop.

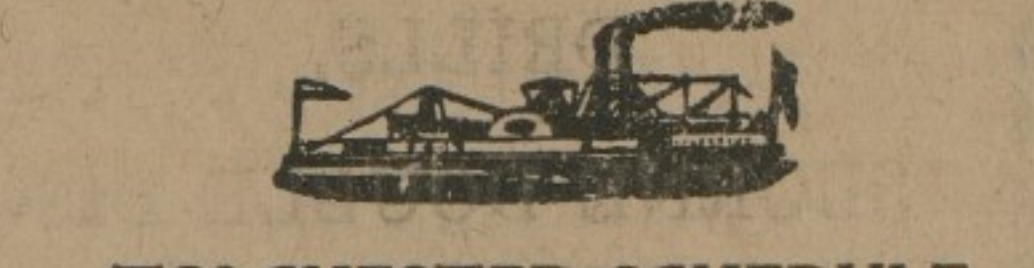
Mr. Corey has been untiring in his efforts to make the crop a success. He has given the benefit of his knowledge and of his time in securing implements and potatoes for seed, and he is to be complimented that he has not only been the means of beginning the growing of a valuable crop here, but he has been the means largely of inaugurating the system of selling through the Exchange, which is so much needed here.

Mr. Corey says that he expects to see the price of potatoes go to \$1 per bushel before the season is well under way, and that he expects to ship 100 carloads out of this county this season. This means from 50,000 to 60,000 bushels of potatoes.
