"A Bold Burglar."

"Lumheart" Cann was arrested on Saturday afternoon by Bailiff Samuel Cooper on the charge of entering the home of Mr. J. H. Sides, on Washington avenue. Mrs. Sides and her sister, Miss Edith Fallowfield, had returned from the afternoon train, where they had seen a friend off, and each repaired to their rooms for an afternoon nap. Sometime afterwards Mrs. Sides was awakened by some one touching her, and when she opened her eyes, she saw a colored man standing in the room. Very naturally Mrs. Sides screamed, and her screams frightened the negro away. He got only a small amount of change. Mrs. Sides was terribly frightened by seeing the boy in her room, but she recovered sufficiently to give chase to him, and in her efforts to catch up with him, she fell down the stairway, bruising herself quite badly. Mrs. Fred Usilton's cook next door happened to see Cann when he ran out of Mrs. Sides' house by the back door, and she identified him. Cann had on overalls when he was in Mrs. Sides' home, but when he was arrested in front of the postoffice at half past five, he had changed his clothes. He was lodged in jail and held for trial. This was one of the boldest attempts at burglary ever made in the town. It is the first time to our knowledge that a man has attempted to rob a place in broad daylight. Such an act deserves the severest punishment.

Thompson Quits Athletics.

M. J. Thompson, the well-known director of athletic and football official, formerly of Washington College, has resigned as faculty member and athletic instructor at Mount St. Mary's College, Emmitsburg, Md. Thompson has been connected with Mount St. Mary's for three years, and under his direction the athletic teams have met with success. His work as football and baseball coach has attracted much attention, and records of his teams during his regime have brought the college into a more prominent place in the college athletic work. Thompson's name has been identified with the big football games for several seasons. He has refereed many important contests and he ranks as one of the best officials in the country. Thompson has been in athletics since his graduation from Georgetown in 1901, and for a time was graduate manager of athletics there. He has developed a number of well-known track athletes. Athletics have not taken up all of Thompson's attention at Mount St. Mary's, for he was also instructor in mathematics. Although Thompson has had offers to continue in college athletic work he is contemplating an opportunity for a business career. Thompson will spend the summer in Emmitsburg and will not decide upon his plans until fall.

Good Music.

The Eastern Shore of Maryland has produced about everything that is "produceable" within the last quarter century, except a popular song, and several weeks ago this vacancy was filled by two young Eastern Shoremen, who reside at Centreville, Queen Annes county. They have had a song accepted by one of the large New York music publishing houses, and it is now being popularized in New York, Baltimore and other eastern cities, and will eventually reach Kent county. The song is a sentimental ballad entitled, "I'd Give the World to Know," and is meeting with great success wherever it has been introduced. The title page is in three colors and contains a portrait of Miss Antonette Loraine, one of New York's famous play-house song-birds, who introduced the song in the eastern metropolis. The song is now being sold in Chestertown and Betterton at Newman's and the pier. The music of the song was written by A. A. M. Dewing and the words by S. Chas. Walls.
