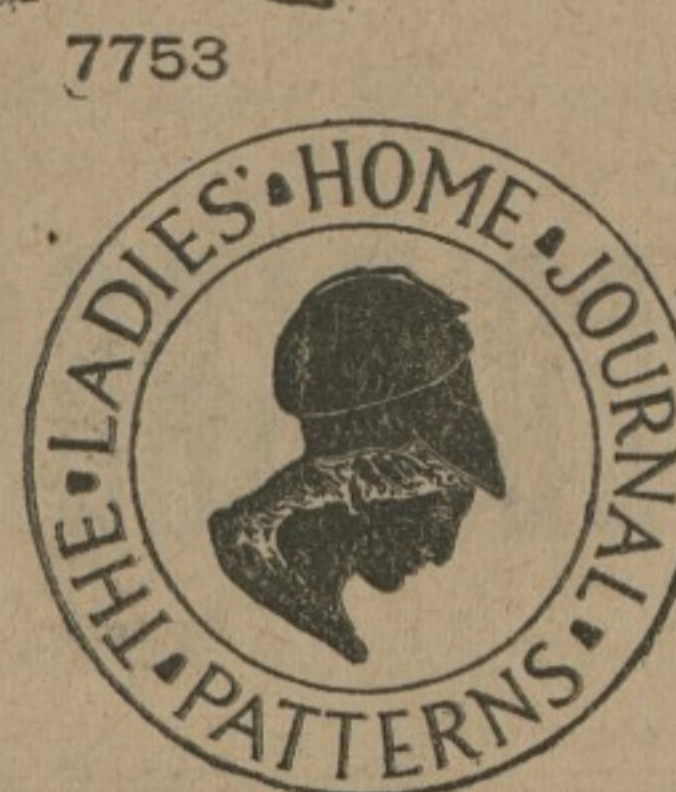


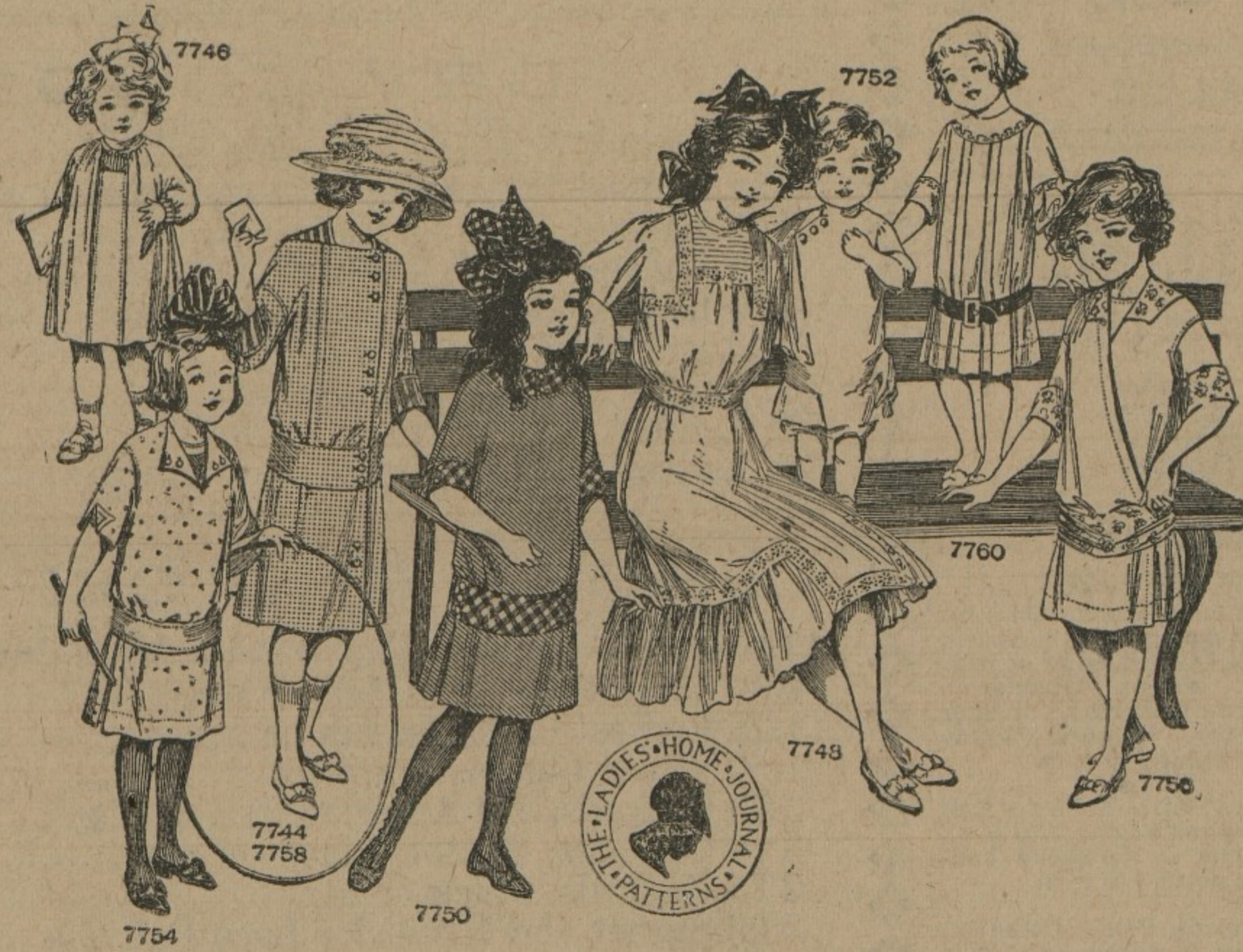

OUR DEATH RECORD.

MRS. MARGARET A. GETSHALL.
Mrs. Margaret A. Getshall, wife of Mr. Francis Getshall, died at Earleville on Monday night, aged 75 years. The remains were brought to Chestertown on the train on Thursday and conveyed to the home of her daughter, Mrs. James Crossley, whence funeral services were held at 10 o'clock yesterday morning conducted by Rev. Dr. W. R. Graham. Interment was made in Chester cemetery. The following were the pall-bearers: Messrs. Enoch Latham, Daniel P. Cox, Thomas Holdson, J. B. McIntire, Samuel Loller, James S. Leates. The deceased is survived by a husband and the following children: J. Frank, of Wilmington, a former night officer of Chestertown; W. S., of Earleville; Joseph D. Getshall, of Baltimore; Miss Etta Getshall, of Earleville, and Mrs. James T. Crossley, of Chestertown. Undertaker Chas. L. Dodd had charge of the funeral arrangements.

MR. THEODORE F. DILL.
Mr. Theodore Freelinghausen Dill, a well-known and highly respected farmer residing near Gale's Wharf, died very suddenly at his home last Saturday, aged 69 years. The deceased was apparently in excellent health. He ate a hearty supper Saturday and went to the cow barn to help milk. He was found an hour or so later dead in one of the cow stalls. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Edmonia Dill, and the following children: Mrs. Harry Thompson, Mrs. Ida Rodney, Wilmer, James Milton, Hope and Norman Dill. He came east immediately upon the receipt of a telegram announcing his wife's death. The deceased was born in Dover, Del., where her husband was formerly employed in the office of the Index.
