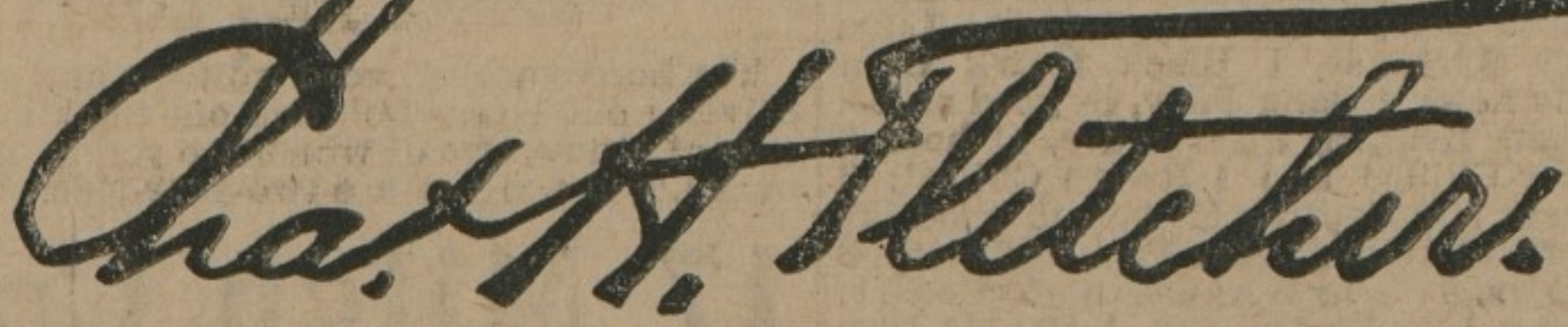

KENT POMONA GRANGE.

Interesting Meeting Held at Fairlee Grange Farm.

Kent Pomona Grange was entertained on Thursday by Fairlee Grange on the lawn of Fairlee Grove Farm. This beautiful lawn is an ideal spot for just such an occasion as an open air meeting. Although the day was warm, this meeting was one of the most pleasant Grange sessions we have attended. We regret very much that the wheat threshing and potato harvesting prevented many from attending; however, five of the Kent Granges were represented.

The business session was one of unusual interest to Grangers. One resolution passed will be of State-wide interest to farmers, which asks for a law passed providing for a State Inspector of grain, so that the grain will be graded correctly when put on the market.

The sum of \$10 was voted to be donated toward the Baby Health Contest to be held at the Fair in Chestertown late in August.

Our neighbor, Mr. J. T. Anthony, from whom we always receive help and advice in Grange work—he being a Grange Organizer, the Chairman of State Executive Committee and Chaplain of State Grange—was unanimously elected honorary member of Kent Pomona Grange.

Mrs. T. E. W. Crew announced the rehearsal in music for the Kent and Queen Anne Grange Picnic to be held in Klhnefelders Woods August 7th. She asked for one hundred or more volunteer singers for the choruses. Through the courtesy of Mr. L. Bates Russell permission was given to hold the rehearsal in the new Lyceum Theatre at 2 o'clock on last Wednesday afternoon.

The Grange was saddened by the mention of the death of Sister Martha Griffith. A committee was appointed to draw the following resolutions of sympathy which were adopted:

Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God in His inscrutable wisdom to remove from our midst Sister Martha Griffith, late Ceres of Kent Pomona Grange and beloved wife of Brother Harry Griffith, Postmaster of Kent Pomona Grange, it Resolved, That this Pomona Grange has lost a valuable member, one whose presence and manner were always helpful to her fellow grangers, and that we extend to Brother Griffith and his daughters our profound sympathy in their loss. Be it further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to Brother Griffith, and the same be inscribed upon the minutes of this Pomona Grange on a page dedicated to that purpose.

"What would you do if you were her father?"

"What would you say if you were her mother?"

The invitation extended by Kennedyville Grange to hold the next meeting at Kennedyville, unless Galena or Sassafras Granges should prefer to entertain at that time, was accepted by the grange.

RULES FOR BABY HEALTH CONTEST.

No Entrance Fee Required—to be Held in Chestertown Week of August 25th at Fair Grounds.

1—Entries in this department close at 12 o'clock noon, on Monday, August 19th.

2—No entrance fee or exhibitors ticket required.

3—Entries must be made with Evelyn Harris, Betterton, secretary; by mail or by parent or guardian in person, in blank forms which will be furnished free by addressing the secretary. All information asked for in this form must begin at time entry is made.

4—Appointments for examination by the judges will be made in the order in which entries are received.

5—Notice of the time of appointment for examination will be mailed to all making their entries early. If this notice is not received, apply at the office of the secretary at the fair grounds for appointment.

6—No child suffering from any acute or constitutional disease may be entered.

7—Examinations will begin at 9 A. M. on Tuesday August 26.

8—Prizes will be awarded at 3.30 P. M. the same day.
