CONGRESSMAN TALBOTT has decided not to enter the senatorial race against Senator Blair Lee. This gives Senator Lee a clear field unless Dr. C. J. Owens, of Prince George's county, who stated Thursday night that he was considering being a candidate against Senator Lee, decides to run.

Mr. ADDIE STARTT announces by card in this issue that he has concluded to withdraw as a candidate for sheriff, and requests all his friends to vote for Mr. Robert J. McWhorter. Mr. Startt has many friends in the county, and if they wish to please him they will cast their votes for Bob McWhorter and the entire Anti-Organization ticket.

The Kent News made the startling statement last Saturday morning in an editorial headed "The Anties are Beaten," claiming that a candidate on the Anti ticket had admitted that the Organization would carry the 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th districts. Will the Kent News be kind enough to publish the name of this candidate. The Anti-Organization expect to carry every district in the county, and have excellent grounds upon which to base their claim. New recruits are coming to the Anties every day from every section of the county.

The Anti-Organization have been in control of the affairs of Kent county less than 4 years, yet the Kent News charges the Anties in their comparative statement last week with four years expenses. Is the News mistaken in their statement or are they endeavoring to mislead the voters, in trying to make it appear that the Anties are responsible for the enormous debt left on the county by the Organization commissioners and their clerk, Mr. Charles L. Dodd, when they retired from office. The \$1.85 tax rate was levied by the Anties to pay the Organization debts which they left the Anties as a legacy. We do not believe for one moment that anybody gives any serious consideration to the News' statement, nor can we believe the News expects anyone to believe it. The figures given by the News for 1911, as county expenses, are \$190,544.57 when in reality they should have been \$109,544.57, a mistake of \$81,000. Was this a typographical error or was it done to fool the people?

MESSENGERS, EDITORS OF THE CHESTERTOWN TRANSCRIPT:

The Kent News in its issue of Saturday last, August 2nd, under the above caption, states that the Organization spent less in an average of three years than has the Anti-Organization Board of County Commissioners. To prove this the News in its editorial claims that in 1911 the Anti-Organization spent \$190,544.57. There cannot be any question but that this amount must have been a typographical error, and was not put in intentionally.

The News, however, withholds from the public the fact that the amount levied in 1910 \$166,181.67 had to be levied in order to pay the outrageous and extravagant bills which were contracted by the Organization Board prior to December 1st, 1910, the date they went out of office. The people have not forgotten that in this \$166,181.67 there were included the following items: Roads, bridges, etc., for less than 6 months from June 5th, to Dec. 1st, 1909..... \$35,441.08
Balance due the School Commissioners for which the Organization had levied \$24,000 and gave a certificate for..... 11,000.00
Election bills due interest on defaulted County Bonds, Hospital, Rock Hall, etc., all due but never provided for by the Organization Board..... 5,342.32
Also many other items which were made known to the people by letters in the TRANSCRIPT at the time the levy was struck, and which have not been forgotten by the tax-payers.

The tax-payers will note that since this indebtedness was paid the amount levied each year, regardless of the rate, by the Anti-Organization Board, when they were free and clear of the entangling net of Organization debts, were as follows:

In 1911.....	\$109,544.57
In 1912.....	112,057.50
In 1913.....	100,259.84

Or a total in 3 years of..... \$321,861.91

An average yearly tax of..... \$107,287.27

This shows to the tax-payers that the Anti-Organization in 1913, after paying every debt, every liability known on the day the levy was struck in June last, has succeeded, by economy and prudence, in conducting the affairs of this county by expending only the sum of \$100,259.84.

How does this compare with Organization expenditure of \$166,181.67 and a tax rate of \$1.85?

The Organization Board in the last three years faced the tax-payers with these levies:

1908.....	\$100,071.96
1909.....	113,339.13
1910.....	166,181.67

Total levied in 3 years..... \$379,592.76

An average yearly tax of..... \$126,530.92

And the tax-payers will recall that in 1911 the NEW BOARD had to provide for over \$6,000 debts of the Organization Board, which were not known at the time the levy was struck in 1910!

AN INTERESTING STATEMENT.
The Organization leaders are up to their old tricks of trying to scare somebody. The following is a statement made to us by an Anti-Organization Election official of a conversation between Harry W. Vickers and himself. We publish the statement to show the voters of the county the desperate straits to which the Organization is driven, and how they play the game of politics.

STATEMENT.
"On Friday last, August 1, I was coming down the Avenue where I had been up to see Mr. Foxwell. Harry Vickers waited for me to come down and when I reached him he was standing in front of Mr. Jim Brice's on Mr. Jarrell's side of the pavement. He said to me: 'As a friend I want to warn you to be careful and not have any violations of the Corrupt Practices Act. You might get yourself in trouble. The higher men would step out and leave you in the lurch.'"

I replied, "I have not violated any Corrupt Practices Act, and don't intend to, so far as I am concerned. But, Vic, a man told me that he was looking right out the window at you two years ago when you were in the alley where Mr. Vandegrift was building his barber shop and saw you trying to buy a vote."

Vickers replied, "All I have to say that is a falsehood, that is a falsehood." I replied, "Well, as far as I am concerned, I am not that kind to violate any law."

Vickers said, "What do you think of Turner and Charlie Dodd?" The Anties have conceded their nomination. The election official replied: "Well I'll be darned if that is not the first time I ever heard that."

Does anybody for a moment believe that Mr. Vickers approached this official with a friendly motive and to give him a friendly warning? Isn't it plain to every one that it was intended as a threat and for the purpose of intimidation. This is not the first time that members of the Anti-Organization faction have been approached and threatened under the guise of friendship by Organization officials who afterwards themselves secretly violated the Corrupt Practices Act. Shame on the man who would cowardly stoop, under the hypocritical guise of friendship, to endeavor to accomplish a political end. Such duplicity deserves the severest rebuke that can be administered.

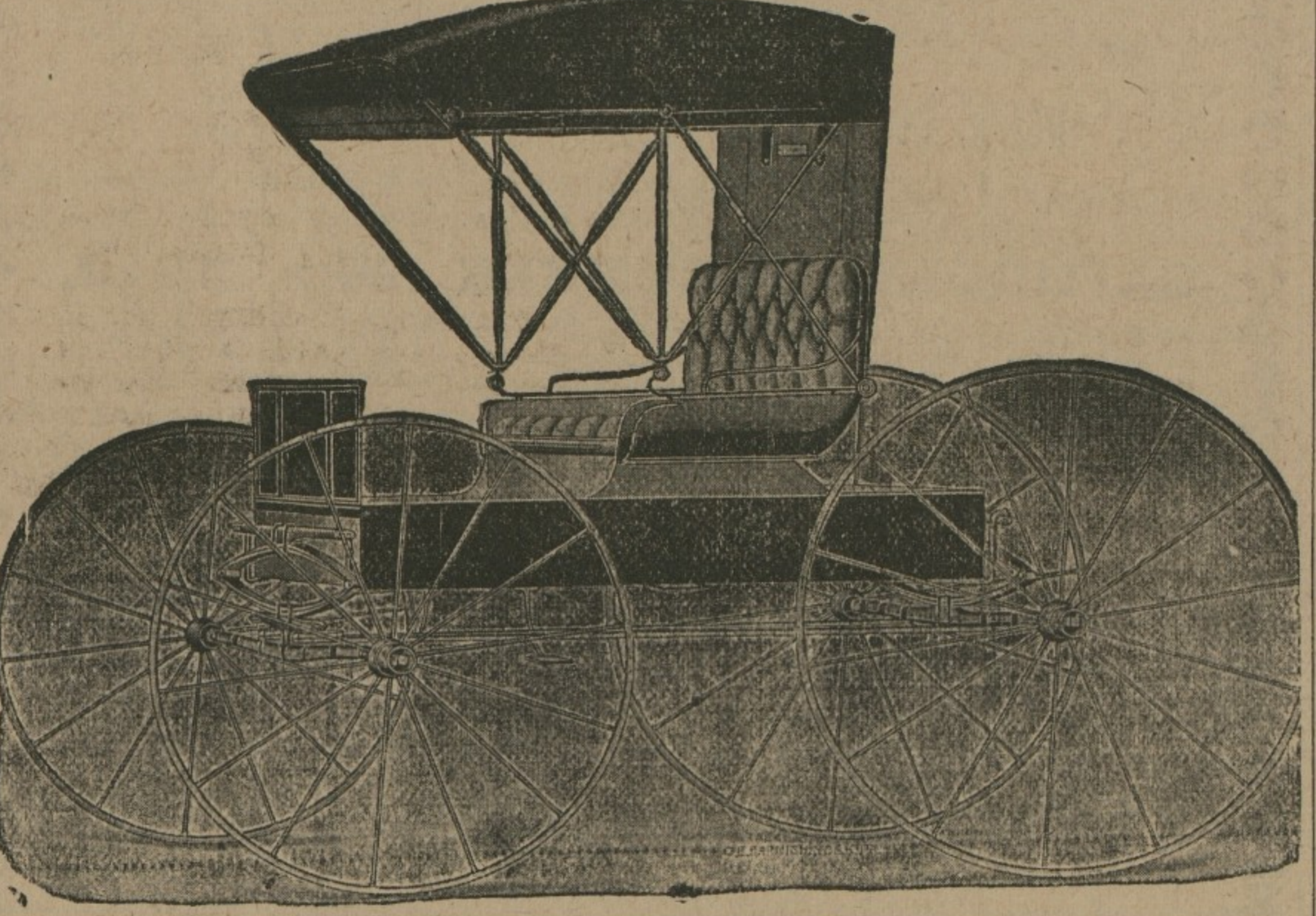

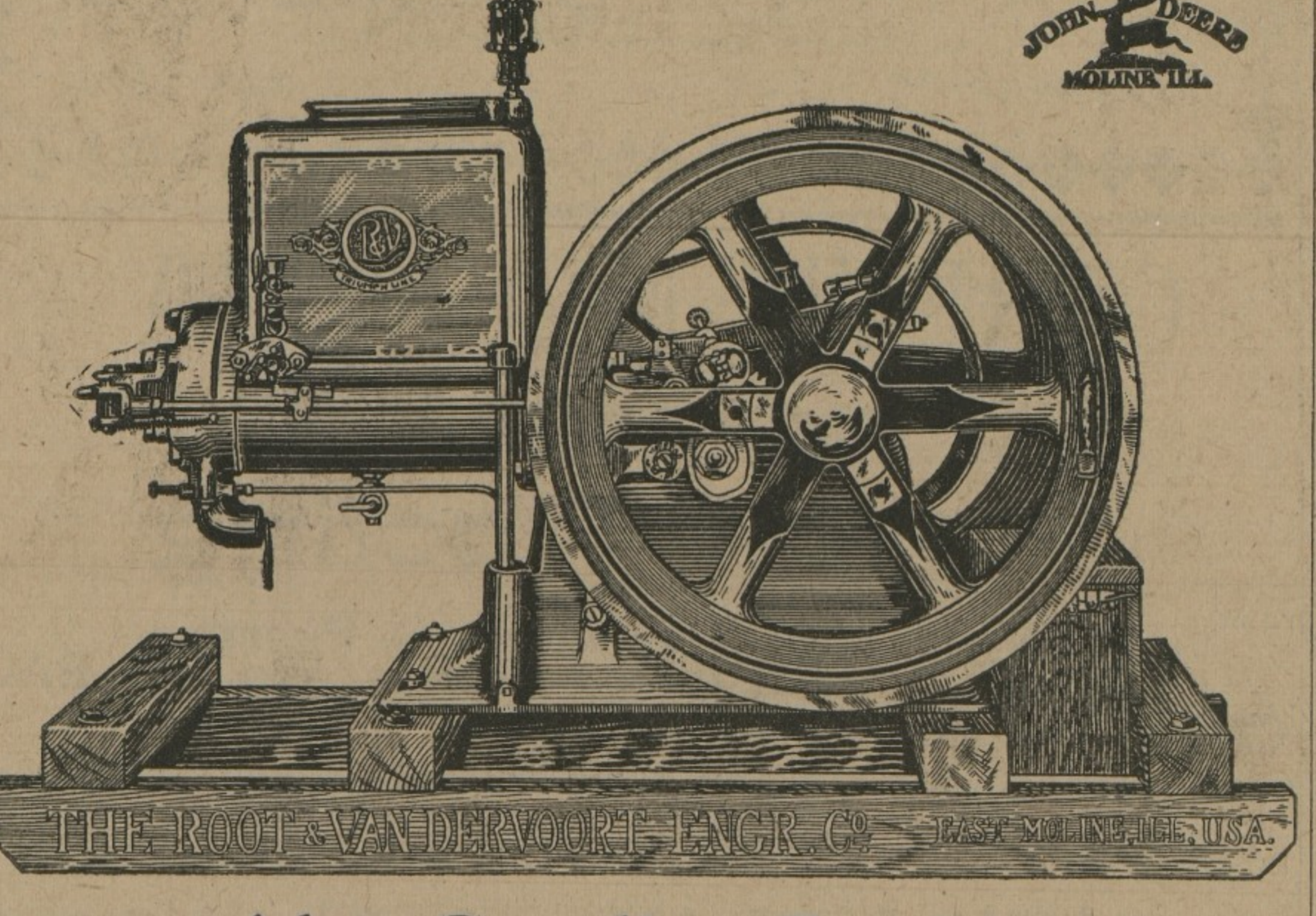

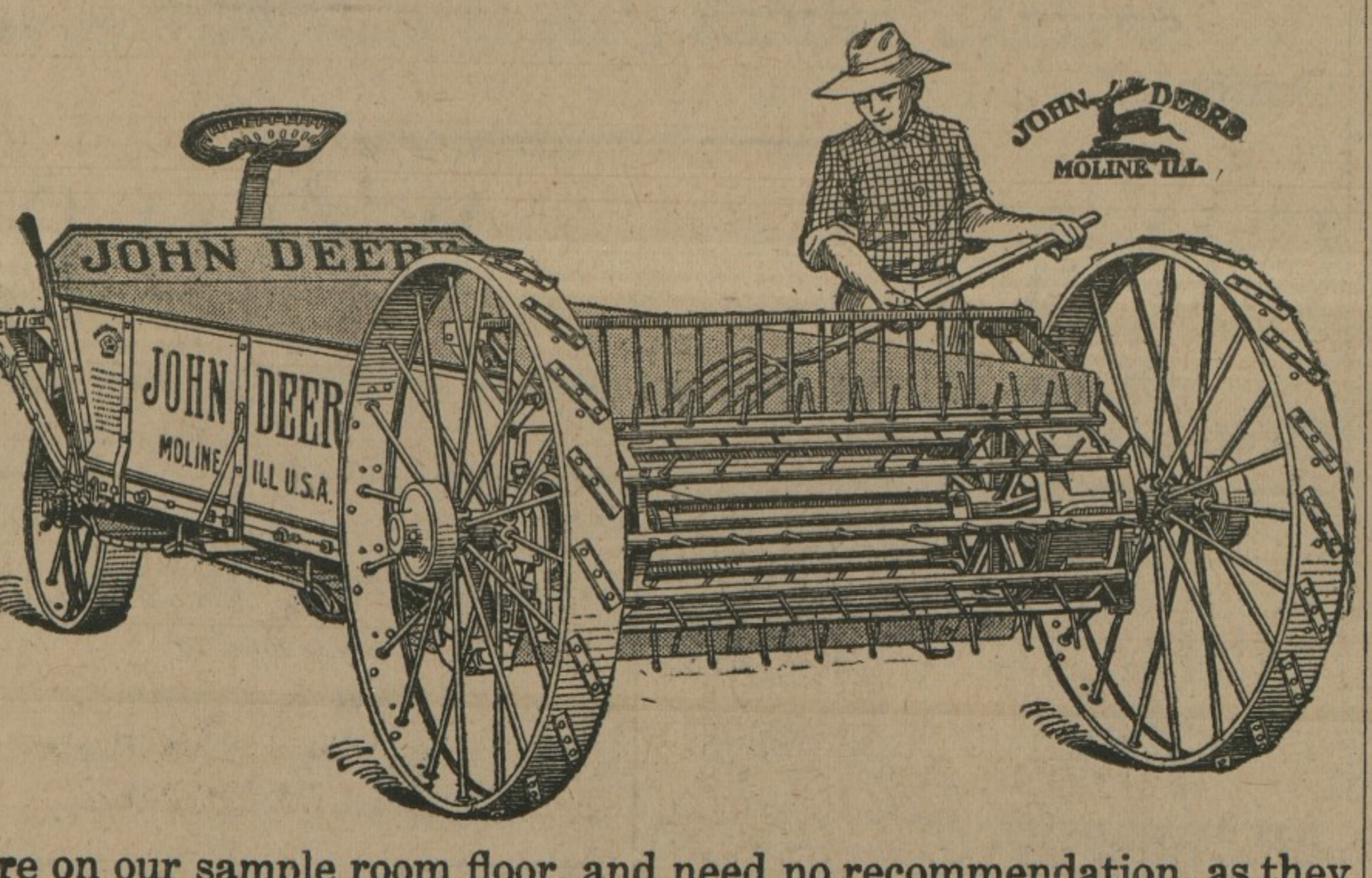
