Game Protection.
The Star-Democrat, of Easton, is interested in establishing a game reserve in Talbot for the protection of game in that county. Would it not be well for our gunners to join in such a move for this county. W. Scott Way, an authority on game protection in a letter to the Star-Democrat says in part:
"It is high time that something was done in Maryland to save the game. With the office of State game warden peddled out to pay party debts and no effective machinery or money to enforce the laws for the protection of the game, there is certainly slim chance of saving the remnants, under existing conditions, without some radical action of the landowners themselves. In the matter of game protection Maryland and North Carolina seem to be lagging at the very tail end of the procession. Both of these States are under the incubus of the county act system and are floundering along with game protection methods about thirty years behind the times."
"In the name of common sense and common decency, let us have game protection separated from political graft. "Until we can have some effective means of protection in Maryland it is well for the landowners to take the matter of game protection, so far as their holdings are concerned, into their own hands."

Fine Maryland Peaches.
Worcester county is the most attractive spot in Maryland. While some folks are talking about senators the Harrisons, at Berlin, are picking peaches from two thousand trees, four and eight years old. To date, five refrigerator cars have been sold which brought to the shippers an amount to exceed \$4000. There are still on the same trees, to be picked, from two to three cars of peaches. This is the greatest crop of peaches in the State, and possibly east of the Mississippi river.
Hundreds of visitors come to the orchard daily, and all say it is the grandest sight they ever saw. The next variety of peaches to ripen will be Champion, of which they have 500 trees. These to be followed by 500 Belle of Georgia, 2000 Ray, 4000 Elberta and 1000 Crawford's Late, the orchard having been planted with a view of having peaches to market each day during the season. An assistant of the State entomologist, W. C. Travers, is at the orchards showing visitors who are interested in fruit growing how the orchards have been sprayed. George A. Harrison demonstrates how the trees were pruned, cultivated and taken care of in general.—Evening Journal.
