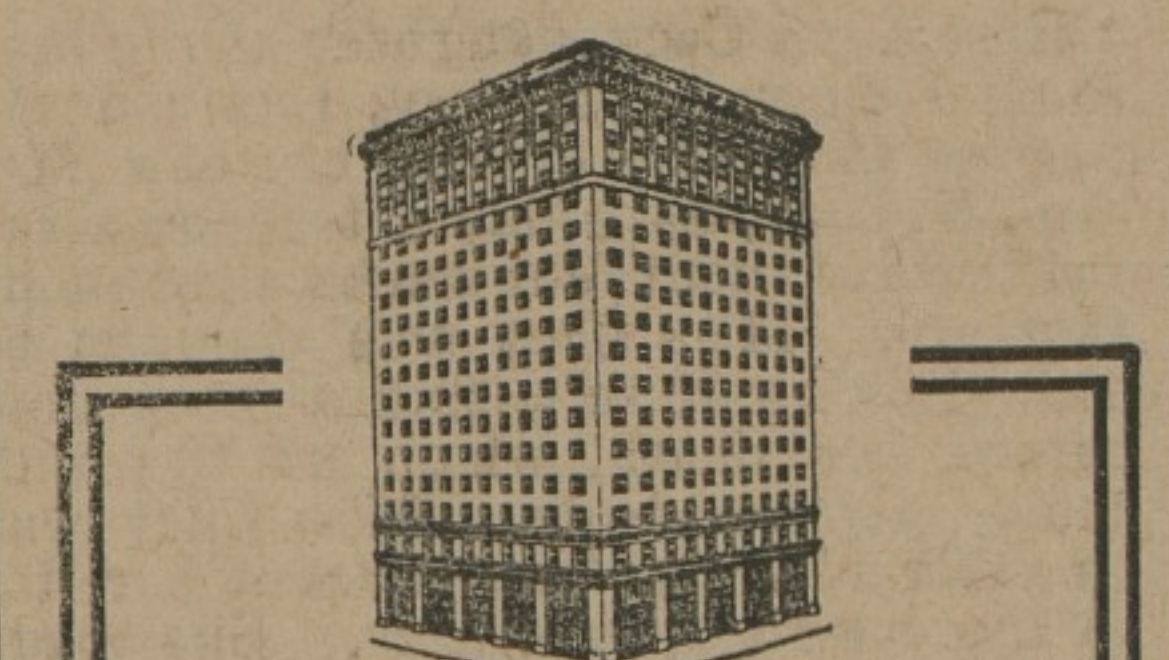

## OPPOSED TO GEN. VANDIVER.

Personally we have nothing in the world against Gen. Vandiver. He is a most lovable old gentleman, but he is reactionary, his methods are antiquated, and if the Democratic party is to be successful in future elections its directing head must be a younger and more progressive man than is Gen. Vandiver. Gen. Vandiver has given long years of valuable service to the party, but his age and the condition of his health are against his continuance in office, and he should give way to a younger and more progressive man. Gen. Vandiver has a perfect right to reactionary ideas. We do not criticize him for that because every man has the right to think and act as he believes proper, but the times demand a change in management, such as is in accordance with the policies and principles of President Wilson and his administration. The Organization candidates for delegates will of course be for Gen. Vandiver, although the fact is the force for Senator Lee because there is no one else to be for, but as Senator Smith will probably be for Gen. Vandiver, and the State Organization will support him, the Organization here will have to do as Senator Smith says and be for Gen. Vandiver. If you want a change vote for STONEWALL J. ## The Quality of Leadership.

One of our neighboring papers contained a recent editorial which so aptly expresses what is in our minds regarding the character and quality of leadership which we are hearing so much about from our opponents now days that we give it a place in our columns. Every thoughtful and intelligent man should study it carefully. It says: "One cannot help wondering why good citizens cannot give to matters of rest and great public importance something of the same time, thought and activity which they give to matters of purely factional or partisan significance. It seems a strangely inconsistent sort of procedure on the part of gentlemen who are intelligent and conscientious and who are supposed to be animated by some measure of devotion to their community's welfare. And yet these same gentlemen will expend any amount of time and energy in securing some fractional advantage or partisan victory, while declining utterly to give of their counsel or their co-operation to the solution of problems which are of the greatest public interest. How they will strive for the things that are rather inconsequential, and how they will ignore the things that are most worth while. And, that, we say, is passing strange, on the part of men, who possess some measure of intelligence and a healthy conscience. It shows such a complete failure to understand what is the prime characteristic of good citizenship. It also shows an unfortunate failure to understand what is a prime requisite of anything like permanent leadership. The average man, the general run of folk, never fails in time to take the measure of those who aspire to leadership. No man can last long in public confidence, who fails to show some broad and generous grasp of public questions and some real devotion to the public welfare. Petty politics may win it points today, but the victory, like Dead Sea fruit, only turns to ashes in the grasp. There is only one decent and permanent reward for political activity—the reward of feeling that one has been of some service to his community. You don't think so. Well, you had better think so my friend if you expect to get any permanent personal comfort or public confidence out of all your political activities. An enlightened and independent public is coming to have less and less respect for the little political heelers and it is coming to more and more decline to be led by their little political "frame-ups." That public is not going to respect or tolerate the man or set of men who show themselves actuated only by the smallest and most selfish political motives, and who are likewise indifferent to the things that public wants and needs."

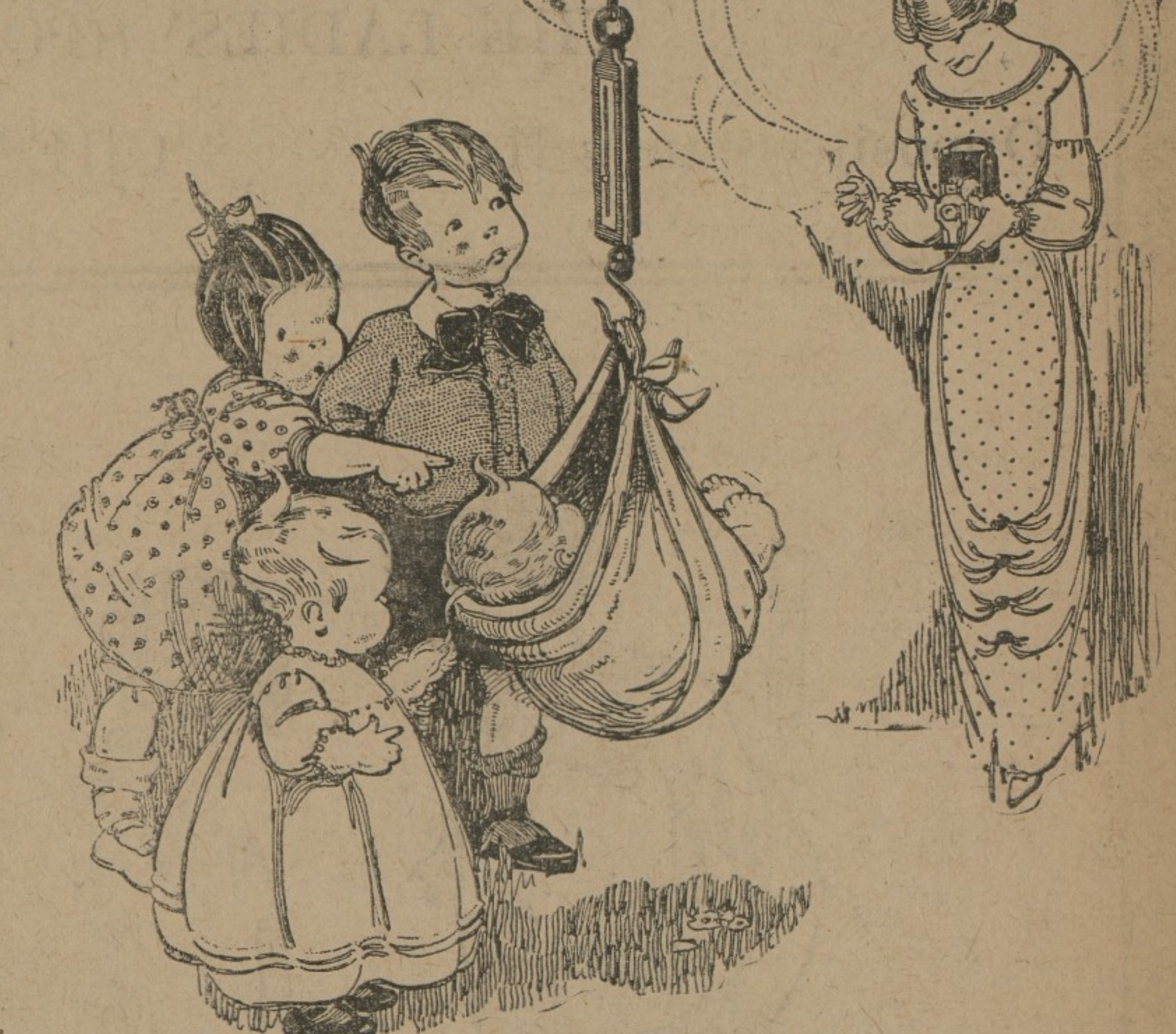
## To Revise Johnson's History.

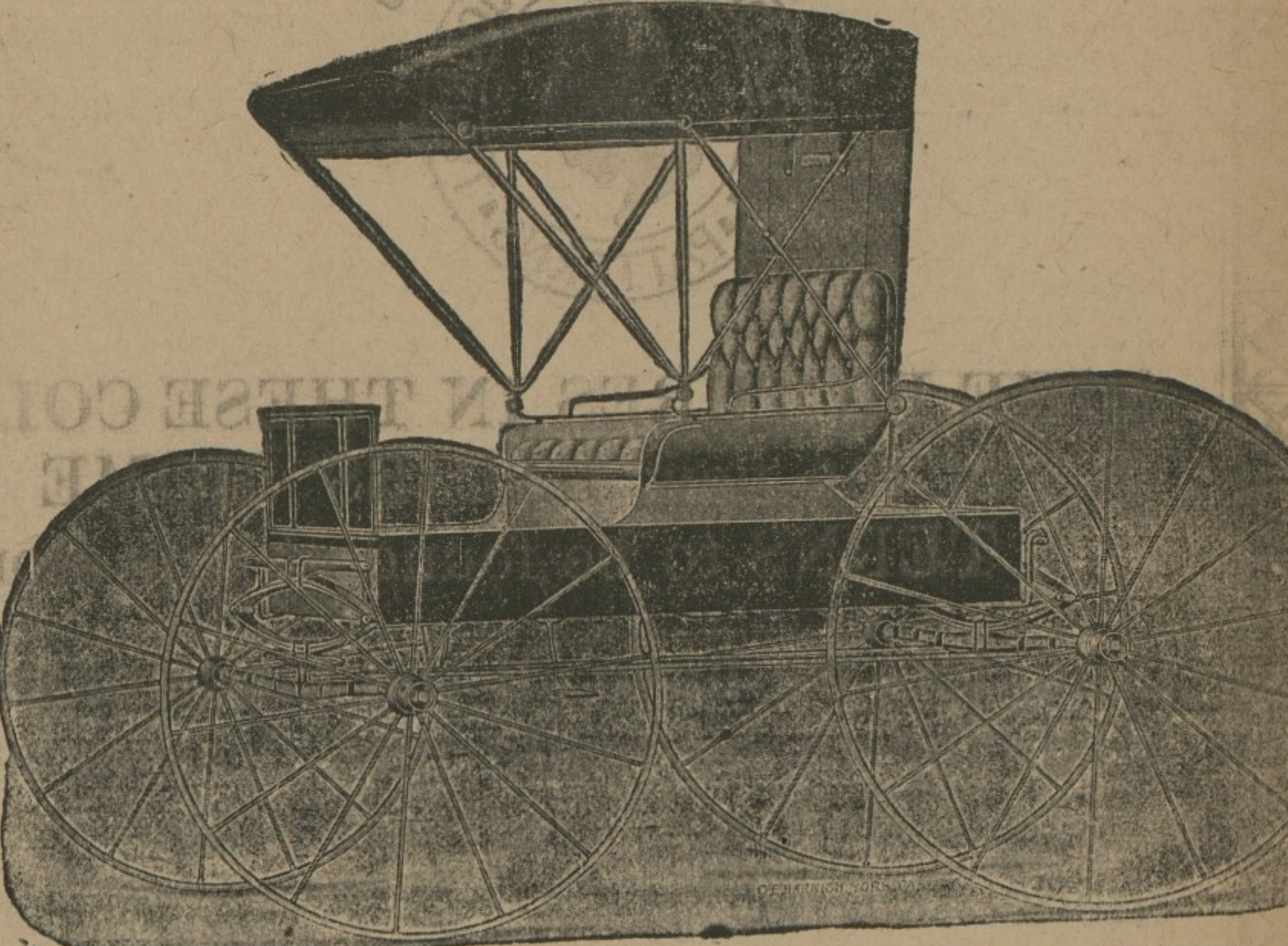

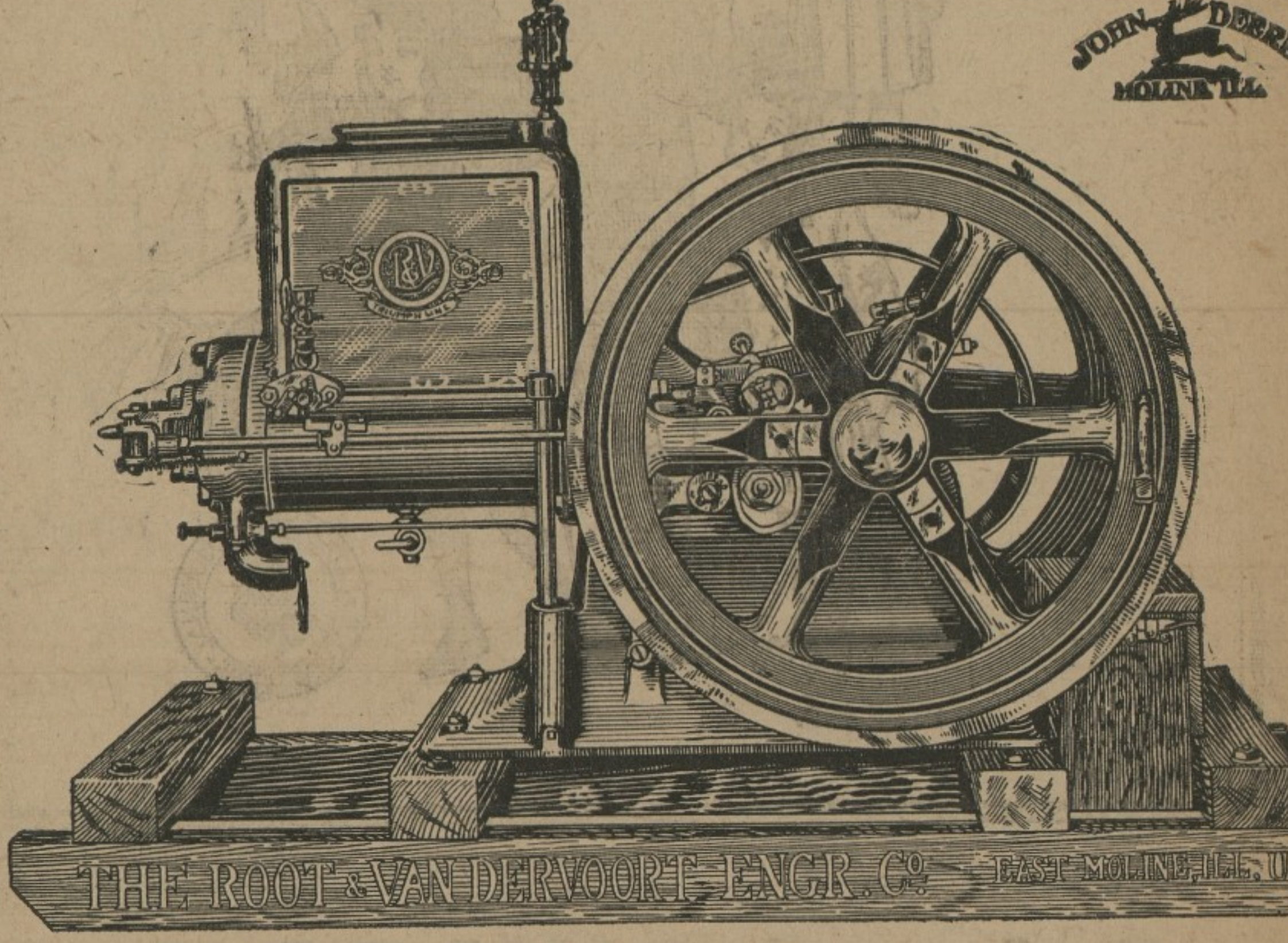

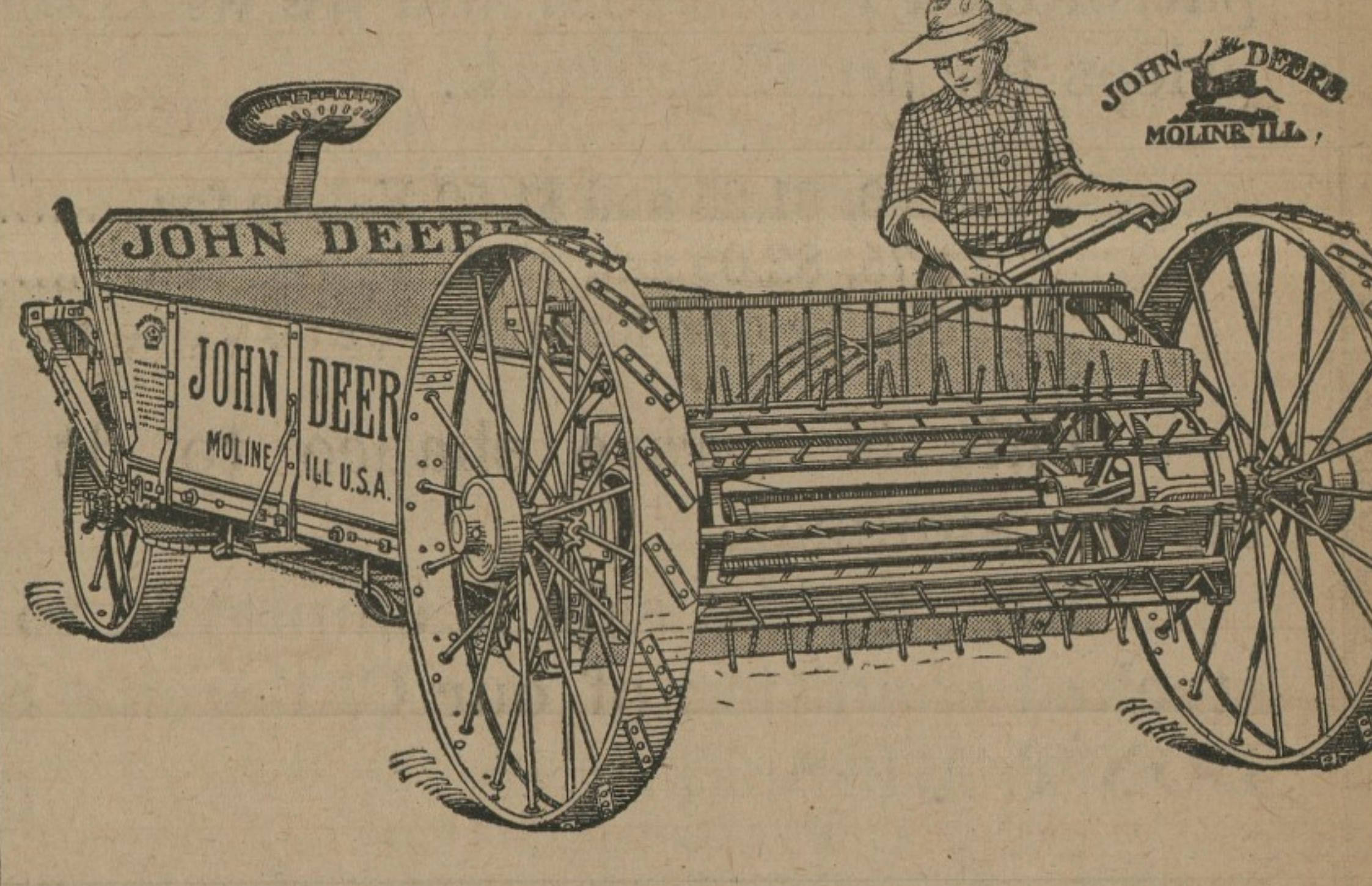
