SECRET OF THE \$1.85 TAX RATE.

If the Organization forces had done as they should have done and paid the indebtedness which the Republicans Organization assumed charge of the commissioners office in 1903, and had stopped right there, they could very easily have declared a tax rate of less than \$1.00 in 1904. But instead of that they had business methods and less interest in the welfare of the tax-payers of the county, they kept on piling up the expenses and wasting the people's money till in 1909 the people drove them from power and placed the Antis in control of the commissioners office. An expert accountant was employed, and he found that the Organization forces had run the county expenses up to an astounding sum of more than \$166,000 by wasting the tax-payers money on the roads, and acting with good business judgment and sound common sense the Anti-Commissioners determined that the business like thing to do was to pay all the debts which the Organization had piled up at one time as far as the Antis knew them, and it required a tax rate of \$1.85 to pay this \$166,000 of expenses which the Organization had incurred. Bowers, the secretary, and as many tickets as may be desired will be reserved. The program is far better than last year. You may see every feature on the program for \$2, but if you attend only one, two or three entertainments, it will cost you 35 cents for each. Every one who desires one or more season tickets should let the committee know at once, and our people should purchase their season tickets through the committee and thus assist in raising the necessary guarantee.
There will be seven full days this year for \$2. The program is a grand one, and everyone can afford to invest \$2 for the moral and educational uplift of his community.
Another pleasing feature of this year's Chautauqua every morning in charge of an experienced instructor. This will be a most pleasing feature for the children.
