

Commits Suicide in Baltimore.

Before he fired a bullet into his brain early Tuesday morning, Edward Proctor, 65 years old, of Rock Hall, went into a room adjoining the one he occupied at the Anchor Hotel, 612 East Pratt street, Baltimore, and put all his money in the trousers pocket of his grandson, Leslie Sewell, 14 years old, who lay asleep on a bed.

Ill health and the fear that he might be arrested on a trival charge are believed to have been responsible for Proctor's deed. The body was found by Richard Benjies, proprietor of the hotel, who occupied a room just across the hall. The boy still lay asleep and had no knowledge of his grandfather's death, until awakened.

Coroner Hyde gave a verdict of suicide. On Monday Proctor told Walter Tall, a close friend who also lives at the hotel, "I have suffered from numerous sick spells of late, and I am afraid one of them will result in my death. If I do die while I am at the hotel, I want you to take charge of my body and see that it is sent back to Rock Hall." This was done. Why Proctor feared arrest is said to have been that a week ago, while he was repairing his grandson's bicycle at Rock Hall, a man approached him and Proctor pointed a monkey wrench at the man, who, believing it to be a pistol, fled.


