WEDNESDAY'S RACES.

The races on Wednesday furnished excellent sport, and while they were won in straight heats, each was exciting and hotly contested. Black Wig proved the good thing in the 2.22 trot, while before the race many picked Lit, a Virginia entry, to win. Roan Hal had no trouble to land the 2.19 pace, but the race for the place was a corker. In this race Happy J., ably driven by John Mallalieu, made most excellent showing, finishing a close second in the last heat in 2.18. David M. took the 2.14 pace in straight heats, but he was driven out in the last heat by Alice M., a Washington mare, in 2.13, the fastest mile of the meet. The summary of the races follows:

THURSDAY'S EVENTS.

The greatest crowd ever assembled in Chestertown was present on Thursday, the banner day of the fair to see the boat races on Chester river, and to attend the fair. From early morning till afternoon teams and autos poured into town, and hotels, boarding houses and livery stables were taxed to their utmost to accommodate the crowd. Politicians and political candidates were as thick as hail, and they were endeavoring to make votes all day. The crowd was variously estimated at from 6,000 to 10,000 people. There were 4,200 paid admissions at the races besides season ticket holders, complimentary, etc. It is safe to say that 6,000 people were in the grounds.

THE BOAT RACES.

Chester bridge and the river front presented a beautiful spectacle on Thursday morning, when thousands of people lined the shores to witness the boat races, which were interesting and splendidly managed. There were four classes and each proved exciting. The Anna B. Smith piloted the course and Judge Thomas D. France gave the signal to turn back. These races were different from any ever held in Maryland waters. They were styled "hang and go back races."

All sorts of speed started in a class. When a pistol was fired all returned to the finish. The starters were:

THE RACES.

The great feature of the races on Thursday was the remarkable performance of Joe Boy, that grand son of Milantone, driven by Dan Leary, of West Chester. Joe Boy hrd pushed by Powell Peacock's fine mare Barnetta B. from Middletown, paced the first and second miles in the free-for-all race in the remarkable time of 2:10, lowering the track record of 2:12 made by Belton K. at the Fourth of July matinee, and establishing the record over any half mile track on the Eastern Shore. Joe Boy is a bad scorer, but he is as fast as lightning, and has a record of 2:03 over half mile track. The 2:17 pace was hotly contested, it being nip and tuck between Mary Ellen, St. Elmo and Flossie W., with the former winning first place and Flossie W. being given the place after a bruising race. The 2.29 trot was won in straight heats by Orrington, a Baltimore entry, which was sold at public auction after the race to Mr. Wilmer Gale, of Baltimore, for \$225.
