## Recounting the Ballots.

Messrs. Wickes, Beck and Vickers, as attorneys for E. M. Taylor, J. Henry Thompson and Wm. H. Stradley, candidates for County Commissioners and member of the State Central Committee, filed last Saturday a notice of a contest with the Board of Supervisors of Election and asked that the ballots be recounted. The supervisors granted the request, and yesterday morning at 9 o'clock a recounting of the ballots was begun by the supervisors in the court house. The recount is attracting the attention of voters from all parts of the county. Mr. Stradley was defeated for State Central Committeeman by Mr. William H. McKee by 10 votes, according to the official returns, and Mr. Thompson was defeated by 6 votes and Mr. Taylor by 13 votes by Messrs. Crew and Wood.

The contestants in their petitions allege that in the second precinct of the First District, in the first and second precincts of the Third District, in the second precinct of the Fourth District, in the first precinct of the Fifth District, and in the Sixth and Seventh Districts the result of said primary election was not truly, and accurately made and reported and that ballots were counted for the contestants which should have been rejected. The recount began with the Galena precinct of the First District, and at the rate at which it is being done, the recount will not be finished before Monday. The Anti-Organization has nothing whatever to do with this contest, except to defend the rights of their candidates.

The following telegram was received from Attorney-General Poe in regard to the counting of ballots printed for one precinct and voted in another, which is the basis of the contest: "In my opinion ballots printed for one district and precinct cannot legally be counted if voted in another district and precinct." Upon receipt of Mr. Poe's telegram the Supervisors of Election adjourned the count until they could see Mr. Poe in person and talk with him, which they expect to do the first of next week. They stated that they would abide by his opinion in counting the ballots that are in dispute.

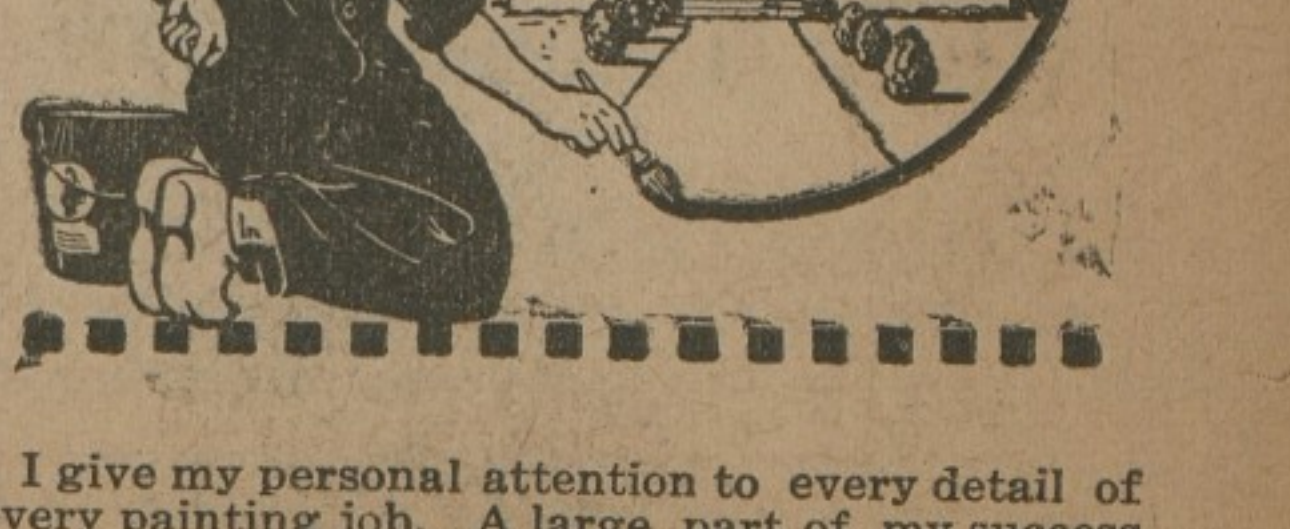
