It is said that the recent primary election throughout the State cost the tax-payers the enormous sum of \$100,000. The Democratic party should seek to remedy such a thing as this by the enactment of such legislation as will prevent the too frequent occurrence of elections in this State.

THE Republican party has no issue upon which to go before the people of this county or State in the coming election. The party is a "house divided against itself," and the past experience of the tax-payers with Republican control is such as to prevent them from giving any Republican ticket their support.

SIDNEY P. TOWNSHEND, Esq., chairman of the Progressive State Central Committee for Kent county, has issued a call for a meeting in Chestertown on Thursday, September 25th, at 11:30 o'clock A. M., of all voters who are allied with that element of the Republican party, to recommend the names of candidates for a full ticket in the coming election.

MR. FRANK E. WILLIAMS, editor of the Cecil Whig, and the Republican candidate for the State Senate in Cecil county, has challenged Mr. Byron Bouchele, the Democratic candidate for the Senate, to a discussion of the issues involved in the campaign in Cecil. Should Mr. Bouchele accept, there will be a most interesting campaign in Cecil.

If the factions of the Democratic party will be as active in their support of the ticket as they were in their efforts to nominate their candidates in the primaries, there will be no doubt about the election of the entire Democratic ticket in November. We have no reason whatever to doubt the activity of each, and certainly there were enough Democrats who voted in the primaries to defeat every Republican on the ticket by overwhelming majorities.

THE Democratic ticket has been nominated, and the TRANSCRIPT will give it the heartiest support. It behooves every man in Kent county who went into the primaries and voted for the candidates to "stand by" the entire ticket, whether all of your friends were nominated or not. You participated in a Democratic primary, and you are bound to support the ticket. We have no idea that a single candidate on the ticket will be defeated. Indeed, every man should win by a handsome majority if we are to judge from the number of votes polled in the primaries—2,430.

THE platform adopted by the Democratic convention on Tuesday is regarded as a strong and in the main a conservatively progressive document. The various planks are such as will appeal to all classes of voters, especially those of the tidewater counties of the State whose oyster and fish interests the party has gone upon record as favoring legislation that will benefit rather than hamper their interests. The platform as a whole will commend the favorable consideration of all Democrats of whatsoever shade of opinion, and while some things were omitted that should have been included and some things included that should have been omitted, the platform contains good Democratic doctrine and will furnish the basis upon which much remedial legislation may be enacted at the next session of the Legislature when all the Democratic candidates shall have been elected.

### Next Year's Chautauqua.

The Chautauqua is an assured thing for next year. There have been guaranteed already 650 tickets, and there remain only 50 more to dispose of. The list of guarantors for next year is as follows: W. B. Copper, Thomas W. Ellison, Jr., John D. Urie, Wm. F. Russell, L. Bates Russell, R. F. Parks, Bordley & Sons, Fred G. Usilton, Geo. R. Kouse, H. F. Jefferson & Bro., H. H. Klinefelter, W. Frank Jarrell, A. Parks Rasin, Wilbur W. Hubbard, Dr. H. Benge Simmons, Allan A. Harris, Dr. H. C. Hughes, Dr. H. G. Simpers, A. L. Sparks, Clinton C. Jones, S. Scott Beck, Thomas D. Bowers, James G. Beck, Wm. W. Beck, H. W. Vickers, M. Wilbur Thomas, M. A. Toulson, W. M. Slay, Chas. L. Dodd, James D. Pearce, Frank B. Hines, Jefferson L. Smyth, W. Irving Walker, J. D. Baechus and J. H. Sides. These guarantors will shortly have a meeting, organize and appoint various committees, whose business it will be to look after the various details of arrangement, and have some system about the management and distribution of the tickets next year. There was a deficiency of \$150, due to the location of 100 tickets after it was too late to sell them at season ticket prices and to the extra expense attached to Mr. Bryan's visit. This deficit has been made good by the old guarantors, and everything is in readiness to work the affair next year upon a systematic and business like basis.

Washington College opened on Wednesday with a large attendance of new students. Nearly all the old students will return before Monday, and the prospect is for a successful year. We shall publish the list of new students next week.

## DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

The Democratic State Convention assembled in Baltimore at the Auditorium Theatre on Tuesday, re-elected Murray Vandiver chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee for two years, and adopted a platform upon which the people will elect the Democratic ticket this fall. Leaders and members of the various delegations reached Baltimore on Monday, and the Lobby at the Kenner Hotel was alive with politicians, big and little from Monday afternoon until after the adjournment of the convention. Senator John W. Waymire and his friends were in control of the convention, and Vandiver was put over a winner and only such planks were placed on the platform as met the approval of Senator Smith. Early in the day on Monday there was a determined opposition to the re-election of Gen. Vandiver on the part of Senator Blair Lee's forces, but the failure to line up behind any acceptable opponent caused opposition to dwindle, and Gen. Vandiver was re-elected by Senator Blair Lee in the convention. The Kent county delegates voted as a whole for the re-election of Gen. Vandiver and stuck by the reactionaries led by Senator Blair Lee in every move made. A determined fight was made in the committee on resolutions for the insertion in the platform of a plank declaring in favor of the initiative and referendum, which Secretary of the State Bryan advocated in his great Chautauqua speech here, but the opposition of Senator Smith and his friends to its insertion in the platform led to its defeat, though Senator Arthur P. Gorman made a desperate fight for it. The plank endorsing Woman's Suffrage was defeated and the platform goes to the people without a plank upon which the women can stand.

The platform is regarded as a strong one by the Democrats, though it provides for the enactment of certain forms of legislation which the party cannot well afford to enact. Its planks are as follows:

Commendation of President Wilson's administration and the constructive legislation passed by Congress.  
Indorsement of Senator Smith and the 5 Democratic Congressmen from Maryland for their support of the tariff bill.  
Women's compensation act.  
Reform in legislative procedure.  
Protection for oystermen in their rights and provision for legislative action granting resurveyers where evidence appears that natural bars have been included in ground set apart for planting.  
Indorsing plan to put penalty for election bribery on vote-buyer.  
Home rule for Baltimore city and other political subdivisions of the State.  
Commission to promote closer relations between Eastern and Western Shore.  
Abolition of fee system where possible.  
Modern penal legislation and abolition of contract labor.  
Non-political study of good roads system to ascertain cost of completion of State system and to investigate past costs.  
Against participation in primaries of party organizations, and allowing all elements in primary contests equal access to party paraphernalia, poll books, etc.

Strengthening where needed of Public Service, Primary, Full Train Crew, Health, Education and Agriculture laws.  
Indorsement of Blair Lee, Emerson C. Harrington and Caleb C. Magruder for Senator, Comptroller and Clerk of the Court of Appeals, respectively.

Mr. J. H. Hadaway of the Kent delegation, was a member of the resolution committee which drafted the platform. He voted with the friends of Senator Smith against the insertion of a plank in the platform favoring the Initiative and Referendum, which is so popular with the masses of the people, and one of the chief reforms advocated by William Jennings Bryan, Frank Dixon and other Progressive thinkers of the country. Mr. Hadaway was among the six delegates who voted for Woman's Suffrage.

Senator Blair Lee and his friends were a controlling factor in the convention, and had much to do with the shaping of the party platform. There was a big contingent of Organization politicians from Kent in the convention, but the Antis were almost as scarce at the convention as was friend John E. George, of Queen Annes, who was busy with his duties at home. The Kent county delegates in the convention showed their Progressiveness by voting unanimously for the re-election of Gen. Vandiver for chairman of the State Central Committee, lining up against the insertion of the Initiative and Referendum in the platform and voting for a Woman's Suffrage plank. Sheriff William H. McKee, member of the State Central Committee, had very little to do at the convention except to endeavor to entertain himself. It is no trouble for the sheriff to do that, for he is a good mixer and a fine sociable gentleman.

### Adventists Under Canvas.

The Willis apple grove is the scene of great activity, and has been transformed into a veritable city of tents. The Seventh Day Adventists of the Chesapeake Conference are again in camp meeting and conference session from Sept. 13 to 25. The main pavilion is 60x80 feet and seats 700. The large dining tent has been fitted up and meals are served on the cafeteria plan. Nearly 50 tents have been erected to provide ample accommodation for the campers. The camp was pitched under the direction of Evangelist F. W. Paap, of Baltimore. The opening address was delivered Thursday evening by Evangelist R. T. Bear, president of the Chesapeake Conference of D. A. The evening addresses are on subjects of vital interest to all. Prominent among the speakers are: Pastor W. A. Spicer, secretary of the General Conference of S. D. A.; Pastor G. B. Thompson, secretary of the North American Division; Prof. G. B. Wilkinson, president of the Columbia Union Conference, and the evangelists of the Chesapeake Conference. The bright singing adds to the interest. The choir under the direction of Evangelist L. E. Proom, of Baltimore, assists in the song services. Special music by the choir, solists, violin and piano makes this feature one to be enjoyed. The camp meeting is a part of a world movement that is being carried on not only in this country, but in 87 foreign mission fields. Bible studies are conducted daily at 9:30 A. M. and 2:30 P. M. The big service is in the evening at 7:45, preceded by a fifteen minute song service.

## THE JOHNS HOPKINS UNIVERSITY

### STATE SCHOLARSHIPS IN ENGINEERING COURSES.

Applications for scholarships in the Department of Engineering, established in the Johns Hopkins University under the provisions of the Laws of Maryland, Chapter 80, 1913, should now be made. Entrance examinations for all students will be held in McCoy Hall, the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, on SEPTEMBER 30th-OCTOBER 2nd, 1913, beginning at 9 A. M.  
If there is more than one applicant for a particular scholarship a competitive examination will be held at the University immediately following the examinations for entrance.  
In addition to certain collegiate scholarships, the Act provides for 6 scholarships at large and 102 scholarships, each for one year, to be appointed among the counties and Legislative districts of Baltimore city, the same number of awards so far as possible to be made each year. The undergraduate course in Engineering will extend through four years, and it has been determined that 50 of the scholarships in the year 1913-1914, Althony, Baltimore, Frederick, Washington counties and the four Legislative districts of Baltimore city will each be entitled to two scholarships, and each of the other counties to one scholarship in October, 1913. The six scholarships at large may also be awarded at that time. Applicants for scholarships should address the Registrar, the Johns Hopkins University, for the blank forms of application and for further information as to the examinations and the award of scholarships.
