WHEN a pig is about to get stuck he begins to squeal. The Kent county pig is no exception to the rule.

SECRETARY OF STATE Wm. Jennings Bryan cleared \$6500 through his summer lecture tours. Keep it up, Mr. Bryan. You are doing your country a far greater service by your unflinching lectures than your newspaper critics could possibly do, and the people will always hear you gladly.

THE Supervisors of Election give notice that the registration days are Tuesday, September 30th, and Tuesday, October 7th. Tuesday, October 14th, is for revision only. The voters of the county are urged to hear this in mind and see that their names appear properly affiliated on the registration books.

JUST suppose those wrong precinct tickets found in the Galena precinct of the First District had been Anti-Organization tickets, and the Attorney-General had said they could not be counted, would the Organization have asked to have the recount stopped? Oh! FAIRNESS, how many sins are committed in this name.

A CONFERENCE of the Progressive Republicans was held in the office of Sidney P. Townshend, Esq., on Thursday for the purpose of arranging to place a full Bull Moose ticket in the field for the election. A committee was appointed to select the names of men for a strong ticket, and a future meeting will be held at which a ticket will be named.

THE attitude of the Maryland Congressman towards President Wilson is just the sweetest thing in this wide world. Uncle Marsie Fred has got the boys in such a submissive attitude that they will get behind any good man the President names for Collector of Internal Revenue. How different was their attitude before the primaries. But, you know, these are such changeable times.

ON THURSDAY of last week the Republican State Convention declared for the submission of the initiative and referendum to the people in the nature of a proposed Constitutional Amendment. On the following day, Friday, the Dorchester Standard, Governor Goldsborough's official organ, contained a strong editorial in opposition to the plank in the platform. What are the Republicans doing? Making a play to the grandstand?

THE Bull Moosers, or Roosevelt Republicans, assembled in State convention in Baltimore on Tuesday evening and nominated former United States Senator George L. Wellington for the short term in the United States Senate; Joseph R. Baldwin for Comptroller, and William C. Smith for Clerk of the Court of Appeals. The Convention adopted a Progressive platform embracing nearly everything that the Democratic party stands, and adjourned prepared to make a hot fight throughout the State.

DR. JOSHUA W. HERING, former Comptroller of the State, until recently a member of the Public Service Commission and one of the foremost Methodist Protestants in this country, died at his home in Westminster on Tuesday. It is difficult to estimate the loss of this grand good man to both the State and church. His life was one of the sweetest christian spirit and devotion to public and religious duties, and his memory will be cherished by his State and his church because of the great service which he rendered in the uplifting and ennobling of each. His was indeed a christian character, and a whole State pauses to do him honor.

LATEST dispatches from Washington state that the Republican leaders are willing to take Roosevelt as their candidate for the presidency in 1915. Which is equivalent to saying that instead of the G. O. P. Republicans swallowing up the Bull Moosers it looks more apparent every day that Teddy and his followers will eventually capture the G. O. P. To us that is certain death, for the regular Republican cannot put up anybody to beat Roosevelt for the Republican party nomination in 1915. In our judgment, Mr. Roosevelt will never merge his interests with the regular Republicans. And for this reason the position of the Bull Moosers is much safer than that of the standpat Republicans.

THE ACME OF UNFAIRNESS.

The quantity of fairness seems to be a very indeterminate thing, when it affects certain interests, and the method of its application is such that the light of day is applied. Several weeks ago the Kent News accused the Anti-Organization of sending wrong precinct tickets throughout the county, and indirectly charged the Transcript with being responsible for it. We desire to state that we knew absolutely nothing about any such tickets, and we also declare that not a single wrong precinct ticket was sent out by any member of the Anti-Organization faction. On the other hand we have good reason to believe that it was done by the Organization faction, who did the same thing two years ago, and secured thereby the nomination of Wm. W. Beck to the Senate. When nine days after the last primaries, the Organization filed a notice of contest with the Board of Supervisors of Election, and asked for a recount of the ballots in certain precincts and districts, hoping thereby to unseat those Anti candidates whom Senator Smith's influence and Republican votes could not defeat in the primaries. The supervisors granted the recount, and it had proceeded only as far as the Galena precinct, when the Organization faction, who had been preaching fairness and justice, suddenly discovered that the ballot boxes were about to disclose the secret of their deeply purchased victory and they begged the Supervisors of Election to stop the recount. Where is the FAIRNESS in procedure like that?

Where is the FAIRNESS in procedure like that? Where is the justice in asking the Supervisors of Election to stop uncovering the proof to the people of the county that the Organization is not entitled to the partial victory which the official vote showed they had won? In the face of such procedure their sermons on fairness and their semblance of a desire for reform goes to the winds and they stand before the people of this county and of the State of Maryland as the sponsors for unfairness and trickery. As to the attitude of the Board of Supervisors of Election in this matter we have nothing to say, except that we believe that the board would have been commended by the people had they demanded that the ballots of the entire county be recounted after it had been discovered that there was a discrepancy in the Galena precinct, where nine ballots—seven Organization and two Anti—were counted that should not have been counted. The Antis were willing to take the consequences of a recount, not knowing whether they would lose or gain a single candidate. In the interest of fairness and justice why were not the Organization willing to do the same thing? Simply because they believed they would be the losers, and they were afraid to let the people know the secret of the ballot boxes. Another farce has been enacted, another injustice has been done the people. But whatever happens, you may rest assured that the Antis will prove loyal to the ticket as nominated.

RECOUNTING BALLOTS.

The Organization Faction Not Satisfied With What They Got, Endeavor to Stir Up Trouble and Discord by Asking for a Recount.

After the bitter primary fight was over and it was found that each faction had won a part of the ticket, it was generally hoped that all elements of the party would unite and bend their energies towards the work of electing the ticket in the election. The Anti-Organization acquiesced in the apparent decision of the voters, and never dreamed for a moment of entering a protest or asking for a recount, though they had in their possession sufficient information that would enable them to ask for a recounting of all the ballots cast in the primaries. The Organization faction on the other hand was not satisfied with what it got, and wanted the recount, notwithstanding the fact that the multiplicity of lawyers who form the large part of their leadership, knew that they had absolutely no grounds for contesting the vote cast, and they knew especially that the law forbids the counting of such ballots which formed the basis of their request for a contest. Some of the leaders here in Chestertown perhaps thought they could put one more trick over on the Antis by inducing the Supervisors of Election to count illegal ballots, and with a desire to deprive the Antis of scarcely any representation on the Democratic ticket, they plunged in, and did the bid fair to prove exceedingly costly to the Organization faction by the time the recount was over. The supervisors began the recounting of the ballots in certain districts last Friday morning, and after counting the Galena precinct of the First District a number of wrong precinct tickets were found in the box which had been counted for the Organization.

These tickets were objected to by Hope H. Barroll and L. Wethered Barroll, counsel for the Anti candidates. A discussion ensued after which the Supervisors stated that they would not count these tickets if a telegram could be produced from Attorney General Poe stating that they should not be counted. Whereupon Mr. Barroll produced a telegram from the Attorney-General stating that these tickets could not be counted. The Supervisors stated then that they would suspend the count until they could confer with the Attorney-General, which they did on Monday, when they received the following written opinion:

SEPTEMBER 22nd, 1913. SUPERVISORS OF ELECTIONS FOR KENT COUNTY, CHESTERTOWN, MD. DEAR SIR: I have considered the contents of your letter of September 21st, which you handed to me to-day in person, and I see no reason to change the views expressed by me to you at that time; namely, that ballots voted in Kent county in the Galena precinct and other than that indicated on the back of the ballot, should not be counted. Very truly yours, EDGAR ALLEN POE.

It is also interesting to note the following affidavit from Mr. Wm. W. Camp, one of the Republican judges in the Rock Hall precinct, in which Mr. Camp states that John D. Urie, counsel for the Board of Supervisors of Election, had told him over the phone on inquiry on the night of the primary that the wrong precinct tickets found in Rock Hall could not be counted. Mr. Camp's affidavit is as follows:

STATE OF MARYLAND, KENT COUNTY, TO WIT: Be it remembered, and I hereby certify, that on this 22nd day of September, 1913, before me, the subscriber, personally appeared William W. Camp, and having been first sworn deposes and says as follows: That at the Primary Election held in Kent county on Monday, September 21st, he was one of the Judges of Election at Rock Hall, the First Precinct of the Fifth Election District in Kent county, and that as Judge of Election he called up John D. Urie, the attorney for the Board of Election Supervisors of Kent county, and asked him whether or not ballots which were found in the box, but which were not printed for the First Precinct of the Fifth Election District should be counted, and the said John D. Urie advised him over the telephone if any same should not be counted, and that on account of the advice of the said John D. Urie, the Judges of the said Primary contest threw out all such ballots, rejected same and did not count them.

We wish to state that there were no ballots sent out by any member of the Anti-Organization faction to voters in

any precinct other than the precinct where such ballots could be legally voted. On the day of the primary in 1911 certain Organization leaders throughout the county deliberately distributed ballots for the wrong precincts to Anti voters. On September 8, 1913, we have good reason to believe that the Organization did the same thing. In 1911 this trick caught the Anti voters—it defeated Mr. Foxwell. This year the Organization was caught.

The recounting was about to be resumed on Thursday morning, when I, and behold, the counsel for the contestants, Messrs. Lewin W. Wickes, S. Scott Beck, and Harrison W. Vickers, petitioned the Board of Supervisors to stop the recount upon the grounds that the contestants could gain nothing by a continuance. Hope H. Barroll, Esq., counsel for the Anti candidates, protested vigorously against a discontinuance of the recount, arguing that the petitioners had asked for a recount of certain districts and precincts, and demanded. The Supervisors of Election or a majority of the Board, decided that the petitioners had the right to stop for a discontinuance, and their request was granted. The Anti-Organization has no redress. The primary election was held on Tuesday, September 23rd, and the recount, and here the matter must end. The Organization forces evidently saw what was coming. They had already lost seven votes in the recount, and the Galena precinct, and there is not a question of doubt that the Antis would have gained at least one member of the Legislature and probably the remainder of their ticket. As it is, they must take the count as it is. The evidence was entirely against the Organization, and for the second time in two years must bear the stigma of having nominated their ticket by questionable methods. We have heard a great deal during the past campaign about being FAIR. If there is any FAIRNESS or JUSTICE in the action of the Organization forces asking for a discontinuance of the recount for which they alone were responsible, AFTER THEY SAW BY THE RECOUNTING OF THE GALENA PRECINCT THAT THEY WOULD CERTAINLY LOSE SEVERAL OF THEIR CANDIDATES, they fail to see it, and if we had been a member of the Board of Supervisors of Election we would have refused to discontinue the recount upon such a pretext. Mr. Samuel G. Caldwell, the Democratic member of the Board of Supervisors, refused to sign the petition asking for a discontinuance of the recount, and the matter was settled by the two Republican members, Messrs. John C. Davis and Walter S. Tresw.

The notice of a contest was filed with Mr. John C. Davis, president of the Board of Supervisors of Election on Saturday afternoon at five o'clock preceding the Friday morning when the count began, and yet not a single Anti candidate whose nomination was contested was notified of the contest until Tuesday, which was a day too late for the Antis to file a counter petition, and some of the Anti candidates did not receive their notice until the Wednesday before the recount began. In view of this fact, the Antis were prevented from asking for a recount of the entire county, and getting what every fair-minded man is convinced rightfully belongs to them. And here is another illustration of the fact that it required the influence of nearly the entire State of Maryland to enable the Organization to get even a part of the ticket.
