OUR DEATH RECORD.

MR. JOHN M. REED. Mr. John M. Reed, one of the oldest merchants on the Maryland-Delaware peninsula, died at his home in Chesapeake City last week, aged 79 years. He had been in the mercantile business for 52 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Emma Smithers Reed, and four children, Mrs. E. D. Graves, of Manetta, Pa.; John M. Reed, Jr., Mrs. Hugh W. Caldwell, Miss Lucinda M. Reed, of Chesapeake City, and a sister, Elizabeth H. Brooks, and a brother, George Reed, of Philadelphia. Mr. Reed had been an elder, a trustee and treasurer of the Presbyterian Church of Chesapeake City for 43 years. He was also superintendent of the Sunday school and a trustee of the Chesapeake City schools. All business places in the town were closed during the funeral services last Saturday. The deceased was a relative of Mrs. John R. Bennett, of Kennedyville.

THOMAS AUGUSTUS AYRES. Mr. Thomas Augustus Ayres died at his home on High street, Chestertown, last Saturday night of tuberculosis of the throat, aged 63 years. He is survived by his widow, who was before marriage, Miss Hallie Lambert, and five small children. Funeral services were held from his late home Tuesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Dr. Walter R. Graham. The pall-bearers were S. J. Coleman, Wm. B. Coleman and R. F. Elburn, of Chestertown; Council J. O. U. A. M.; Charles Elburn, Wm. J. J. Beck and William W. Clayton, members of Rock Hall Council, Jr. U. M., of which the deceased was a member. Interment in Chester cemetery. Undertaker Chas. L. Dodd had charge of funeral arrangements.

ANDREW MEDDERS. Mr. Andrew Medders, died at his home in Chestertown early Tuesday morning of Bright's kidney disease, aged 60 years. He is survived by his widow and two children--Mrs. Roland Matthews, of Florida, and Miss Stacey Medders, at home. The deceased served two terms as sheriff of Kent county. Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock, from Christ M. P. Church, Chestertown, conducted by the Rev. Dr. W. R. Graham. Mr. Medders was a member Washington Camp No. 34, P. O.
