Will Exhibit in Chestertown for One Day Only.

Forepaugh is in charge of the advance forces of this big tented enterprise and a score of rapidly moving assistants were in Chestertown extensively billing the town and surrounding country with elegantly colored posters announcing the appearance of the show. The gentlemanly business manner of Mr. Forepaugh and his assistants, and the superior quality of the paper posters would indicate there was something of more than ordinary magnitude following. The press and public in the large cities in which this show has been exhibiting are exceedingly liberal in their praise of the excellent quality of the performance and claim that there is not a misstatement made by the management of the enterprise, but that they positively present everything as advertised. Horse Notes.

Joe Boy, the great pacer which lowered the track record here during the fair from 2:12 to 2:04, won second money at Allentown last week, Ella Amulator beating him in a five heat race in 2:07. Joe Boy won the second heat in 2:07.

Lord Dewey, son of Admiral Dewey, owned by Dr. J. C. McCoy, of Kirkwood, Del., has won several \$10,000 purses on the Grand Circuit this season. He has a record of 2:08 and is a trotter.

The management of the Kent and Queen Anne's Driving Association is at work upon plans for next year's fair. The management proposes to erect more buildings and make other improvements that will furnish space for the exhibition of farm products, poultry and household goods, so that the Agricultural interests of the counties may be developed.

Sweet Anna and Flossie W., two of Enoch Johnson's string, won first money in their races at Oxford, Pa. last week.

Mr. John Mallalieu has Happy J. and one other in his stable entered at Lancaster, Pa., this week. Mr. Joe Rising is at Trenton with his string, where Pony Boy and Belton K. were hitched up in a race.

Mr. Samuel Loller's fine cold stepped an easy mile in 2:24 at the Matinees races at Worton last Saturday. This mare promises to be one of the fastest trotters ever raised in this county.

The management of the Kent and Queen Anne's Driving Association is arranging to give the classiest matinee in its history sometime in October after the racing for money season is over. Mr. Powell Peacock, who is now in Columbus, Ohio, with his string, and who will be at Lexington, Ky., next week, has promised to be here with his stable, and he has also stated that he will induce other drivers now on the "money" circuit to come here. An effort is being made by the management also to arrange a match race between Pony Boy and Belton K. for a large purse, and you may look out for something to be doing when the bell rings for the horses at Radcliffe Park again.

Hicks' Forecasts for October.

The new moon being at an eclipse node on September 23rd, will greatly augment the tendency to earthquake and volcanic disturbances up to the 4th of the 9th of October. Autumnal hurricanes, especially in the Southern States, would be most natural at this period, with boreal storms of great energy coming out of the northwest to meet them.

A reactionary storm period falls on the 6th, 7th and 8th, coincident with the moon's first quarter on the 6th. Falling barometer, softening, southerly wind, and return of general falling weather will be the natural order on touching the 6th, 7th and 8th. Autumnal, chilly nights will come with the rising barometer from the northwest, progressively eastward and southward, on and about the 8th, 9th and 10th.

A regular storm period extends from the 10th to the 13th, having its center on the 12th. The moon is on the celestial equator on the 13th, indicating that low barometer, cloudiness and autumnal thunder storms will gather, and visit many localities in an eastward sweep from the 13th to the 15th.

A reactionary storm period centers on the 15th, 16th and 20th. The Venus disturbance, which reaches its center in November, will begin to affect storm weather conditions by this time.

A regular storm period covers the 22nd to the 27th, being central on the 24th. Falling barometer and other growing storm conditions will appear in western parts early in this period, all of which will move eastward, increasing in strength and magnitude.

A reactionary storm period covers the last three days of the month. The new moon on the 29th will bring the culmination of this period on and touching that day.

To Give Reception.

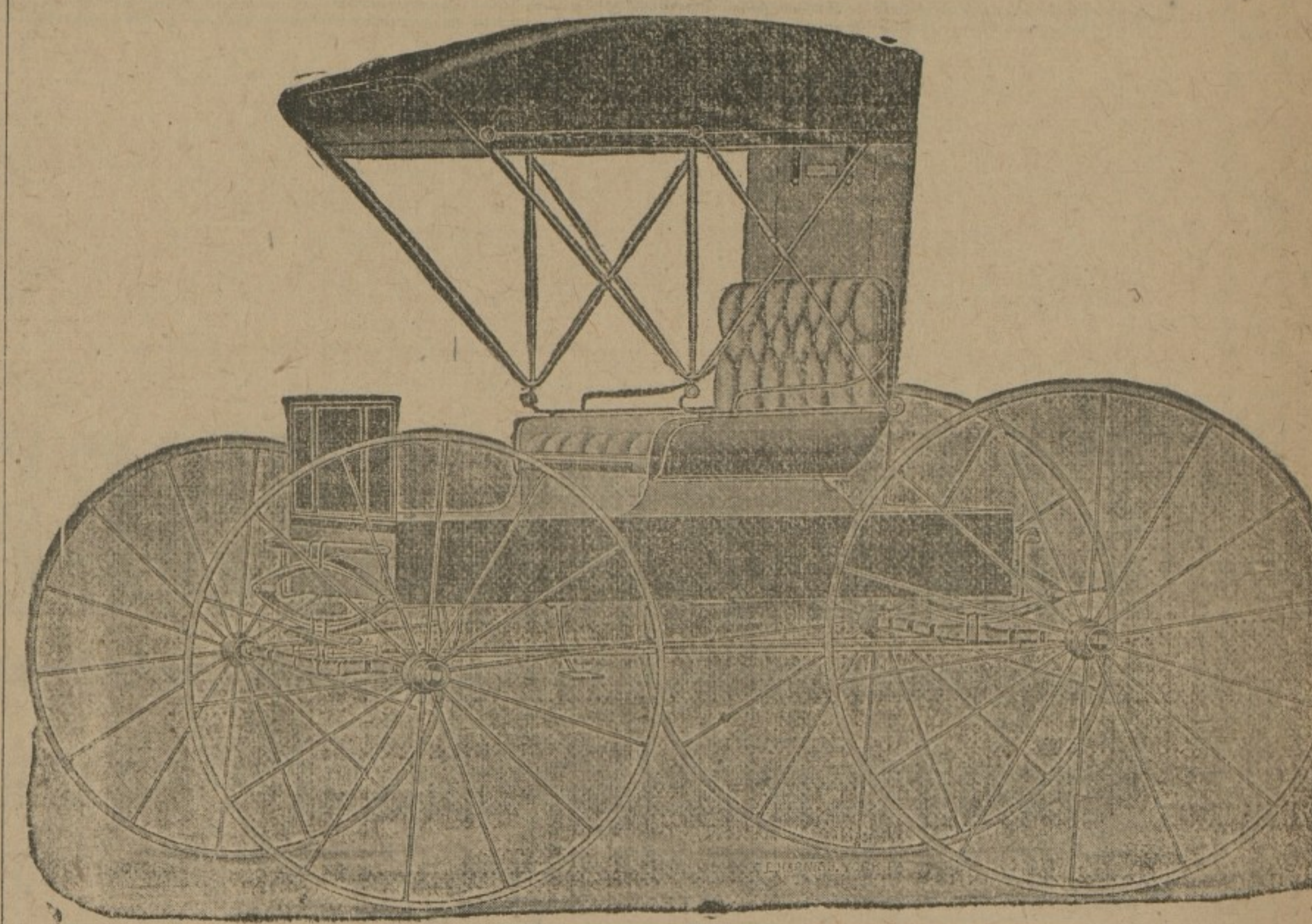

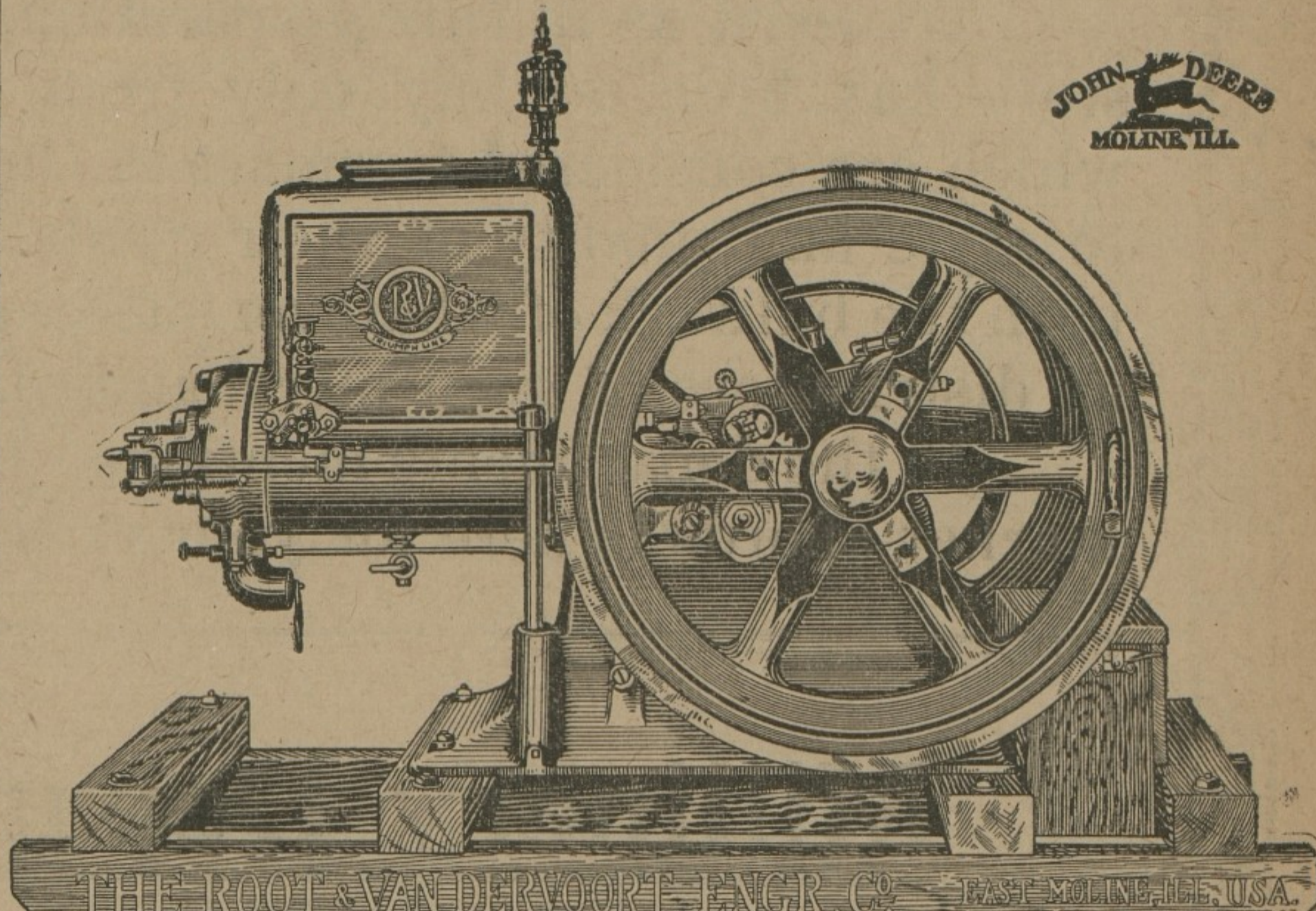

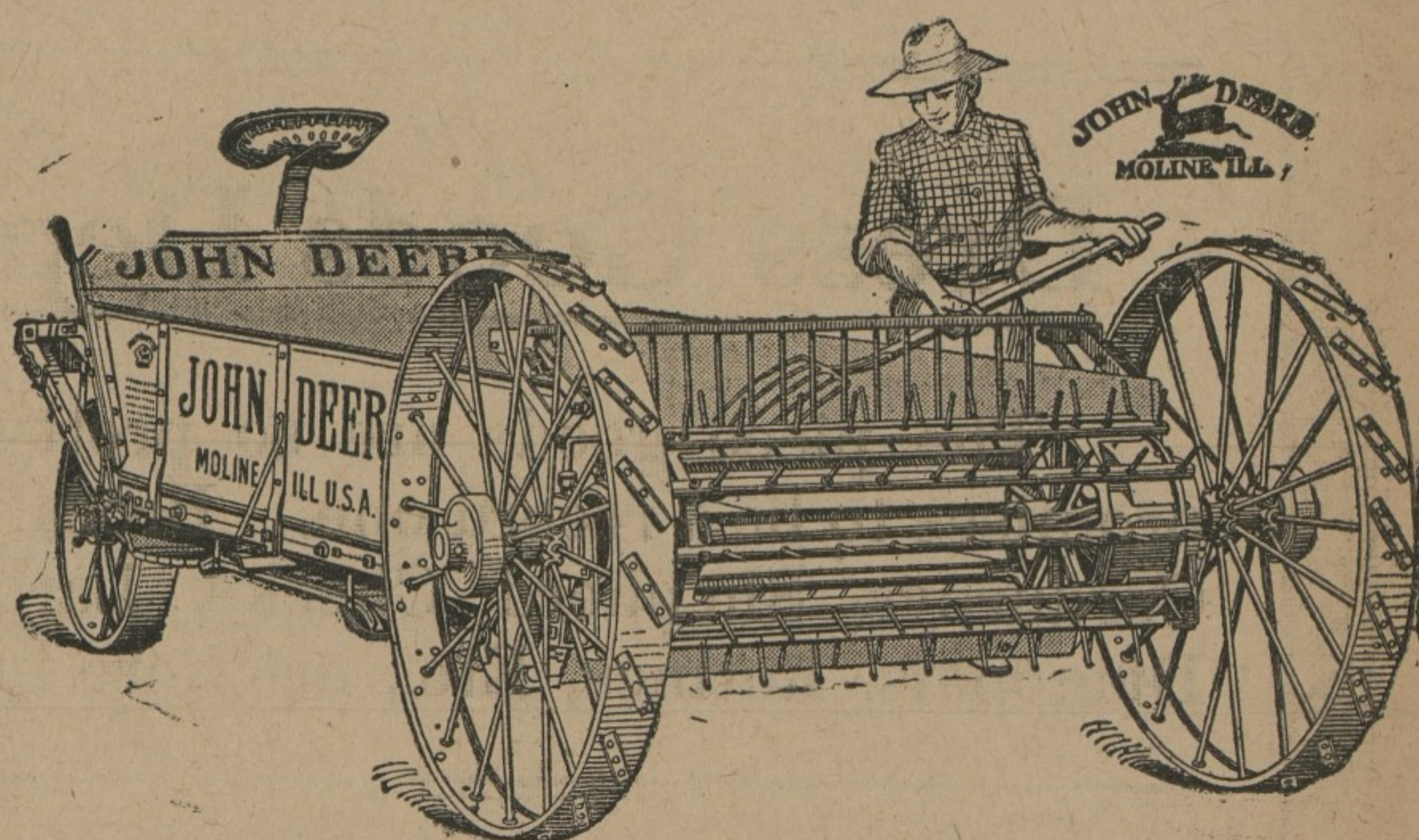
