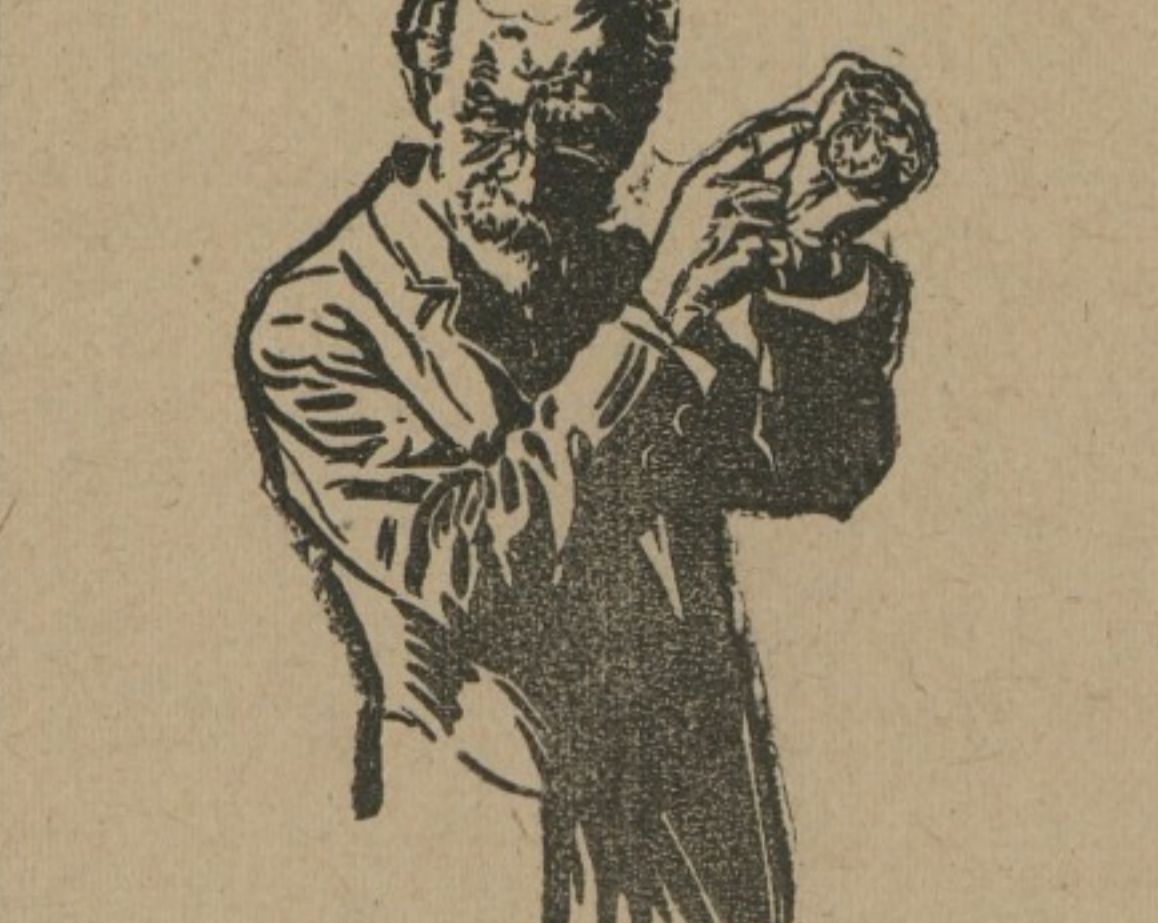

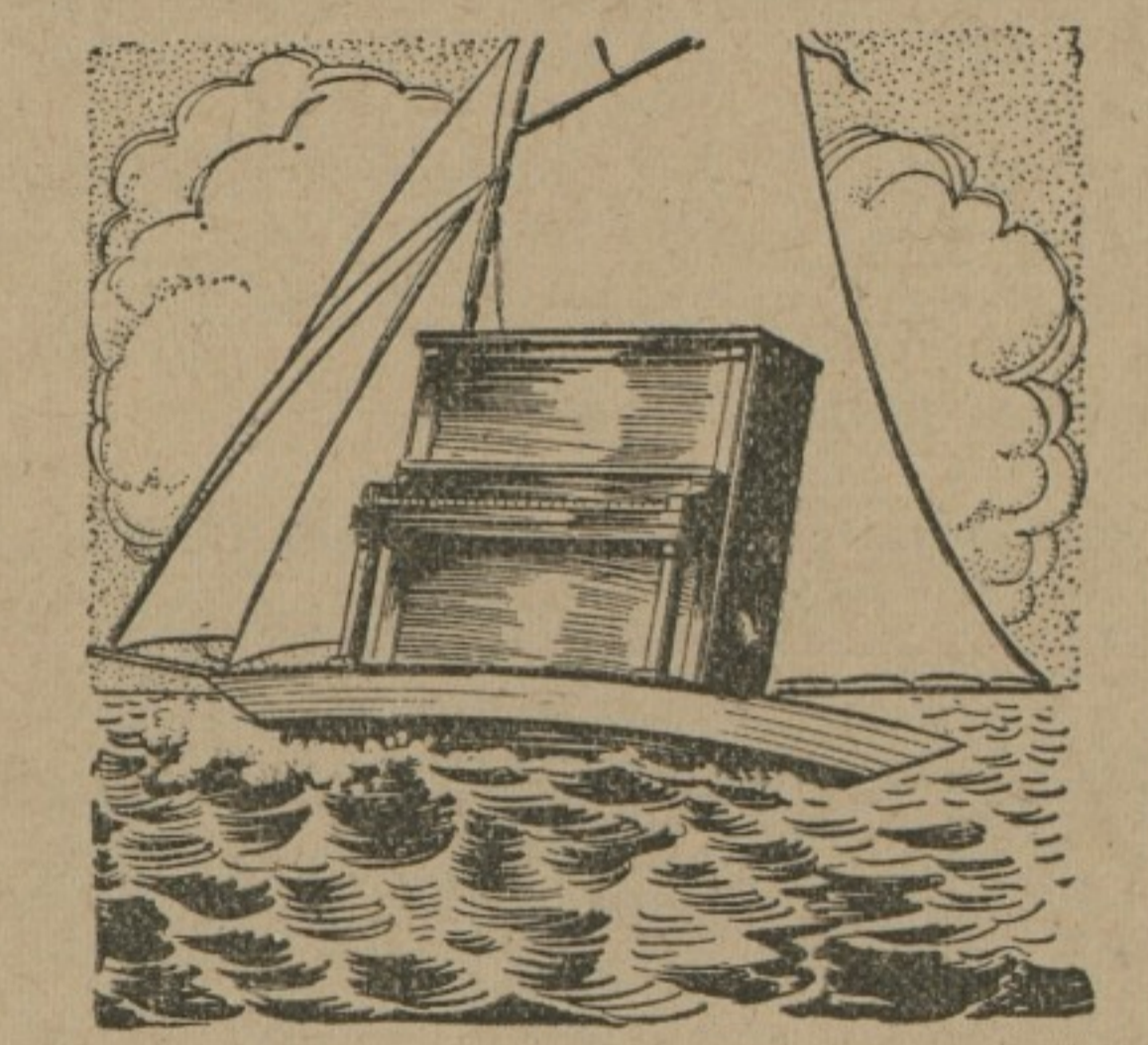

WILMER EMORY.

Wilmer Emory, lawyer, and for many years a justice of the peace, died early Saturday morning at his home, 2006 Maryland avenue, Baltimore, from an attack of acute kidney trouble. Mr. Emory was born at Landowne, Queen Annes county, August 17, 1847, and was the son of the late James W. Emory. He made his home in Baltimore about four years ago, when he became the leading factor in the organization of the Queen Anne Railroad. Besides his widow, he is survived by two daughters (Mrs. Charles W. Hunt and Mrs. Margaret Emory) and by one son (Wilmer Emory, Jr.). Funeral services were held on Sunday with interment in Centerville.

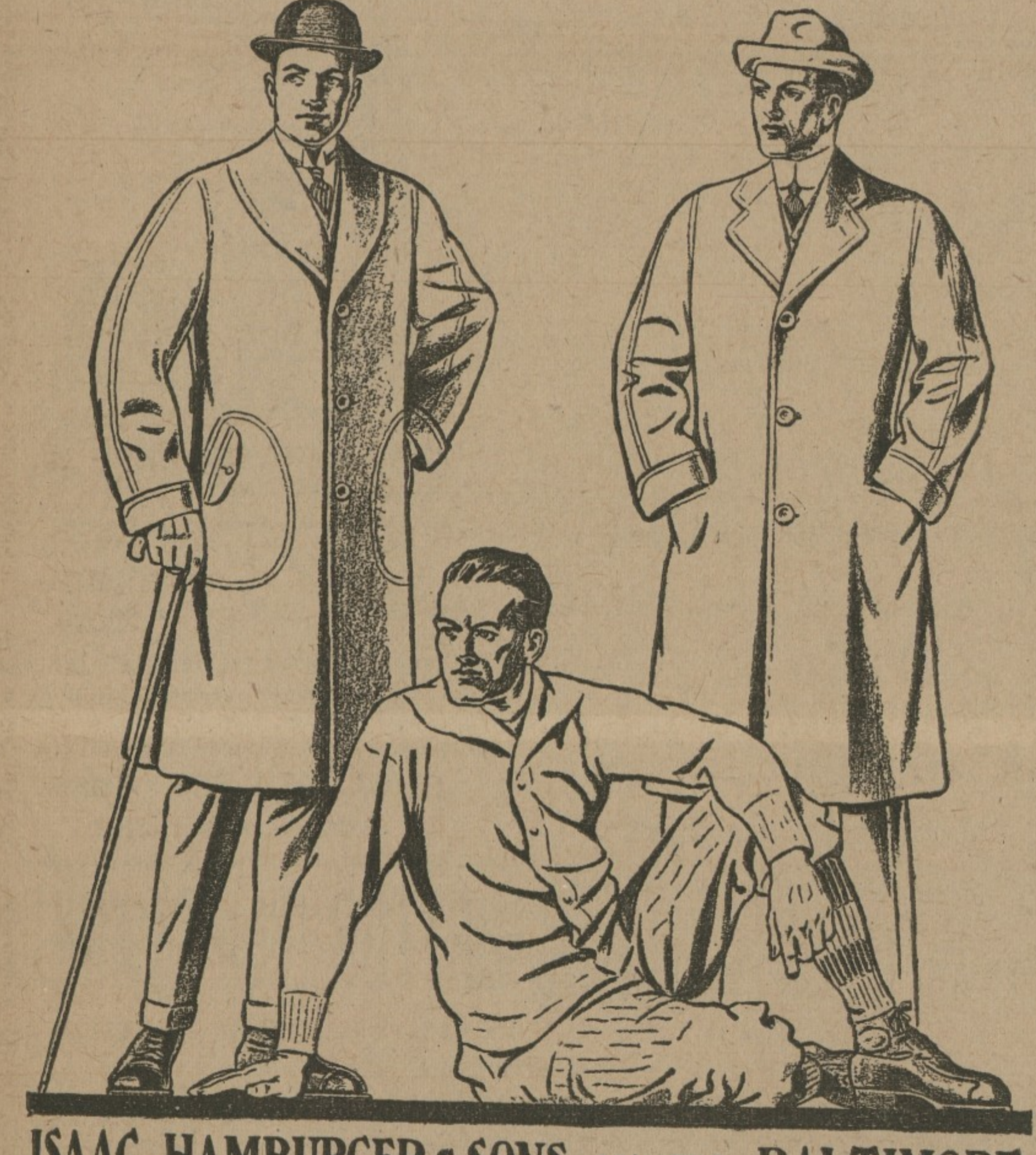
