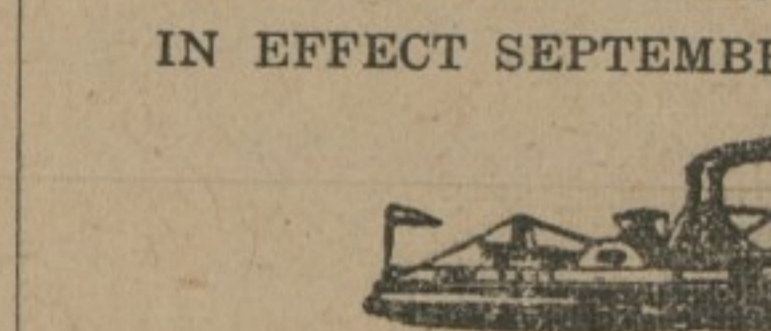

THE LAUNDRY BUSINESS.

MESSRS. EDITORS: The Home Laundry calls its patrons and the public's attention to some matters about which there is some misunderstanding. Just preceding the time when the present manager, Mr. Holmes took charge of the Home Laundry, the work was not up to the standard and there occurred some mistakes, which, while not a matter of life or death seemed to cause some serious criticism by those prone to kick.

Due to cause that will arise in any business, we could not finish the work quite as fast as it came in, keeping us back with our deliveries.

We have now so systemized our departments that the work will be finished with usual promptness. Now, in reference to the patrons' criticism. There seems to be a belief that linen or other goods ought never to wear out. The housewife has discovered that when laundered in her own kitchen or by help away from home, that all goods of necessity will give way and tear. The Steam Laundry is no exception. Any washing process is a wearing out process for the laundry assumes no liability for articles defaced or torn. The owner assumes this risk in sending work here. This is both reasonable and right. If your laundress was compelled to pay for all articles which tear in the wash, she would abandon the job after the first wash. The Penn. R. R. aims to avoid accidents and wrecks, but no amount of skill has been able to eliminate the 'occasional' train wreck. We use every care to deface nothing, but no plant can prevent the dissolution of wearing apparel.

About lost articles: The average man has not and few women have an infallible memory when it comes to the number of articles sent to a laundry. Ninety nine men out of a hundred cannot identify their own apparel, and yet they become endowed with a wonderful memory (imagination) when they think a collar is short.

It is possible that this laundry will err in one collar now and then, but our books are a decidedly better guide than the average person's recollection. The patron is usually to blame when a mistake occurs. For instance they leave collars with 'Mr. Smith' written on the package. Well, there are about 100 Smiths on our books. Whose fault is it if a mistake occurs.

We have had patrons of sound intelligence to call twice for the same bundle after having several hours previously received it. Now we don't stand responsible for all goods customers 'claim' we have of theirs. And in this connection if we should send out an article belonging not to you but some one else you call us up at once. This will help us to remedy any possible mistake. The two or three lost articles when our plant was not running smoothly constitute no reason for any hesitancy in sending work here and we promise the utmost attention in preventing mistakes. We want the patronage of the public but only want it upon a sane, businesslike understanding.

Now about the collar work. The new manager determined to launder goods without an excessive use of acids, which many city laundries use to get a white finish in quick time. This of necessity shortens the life of a collar.

With soaps, it requires several weeks of experimenting, by our present manager, with this water and several varieties of soap to effect a white finish without acids. But we propose to first wash and wash with pure soap and them to adjust the color.

Our present Collar Machine is the third on the Peninsula, and will make the collar last longer than machines in city laundries.

This Laundry spends in the town \$100 per week. We have less complaint from other towns than from Chestertown, which leads us to believe that a part of the criticism is unfounded.

Consider that that work and finery at Home Laundry is turned out in a pure, and sanitary condition, not worn by laundress' children and not permeated with foul odors.

When Chestertown has been without a laundry, it has been at the mercy of extortion, and unsatisfactory help.

You think this matter over and see if you are actually benefiting yourself when you make 'groundless kicks' and send work to the city.

Tri-County Produce Exchange.—After their autumn work is done, farmers of Queen Annes, Caroline and Talbot counties will meet to discuss the formation of a produce exchange for the sale and purchase of all products and necessities of the farm. Sheriff Eugene Welch, William C. Laing and other prominent farmers of Queen Annes assert that wheat shipments are grading unsatisfactorily in Baltimore and complaints have been made against the system of the Baltimore Chamber of Commerce. M. B. Nichols and W. Irving Walker are agitating the movement for a tri-county farmers' exchange. It is expected that the exchange will be modeled somewhat after the Rich Neck Farmers' Exchange.

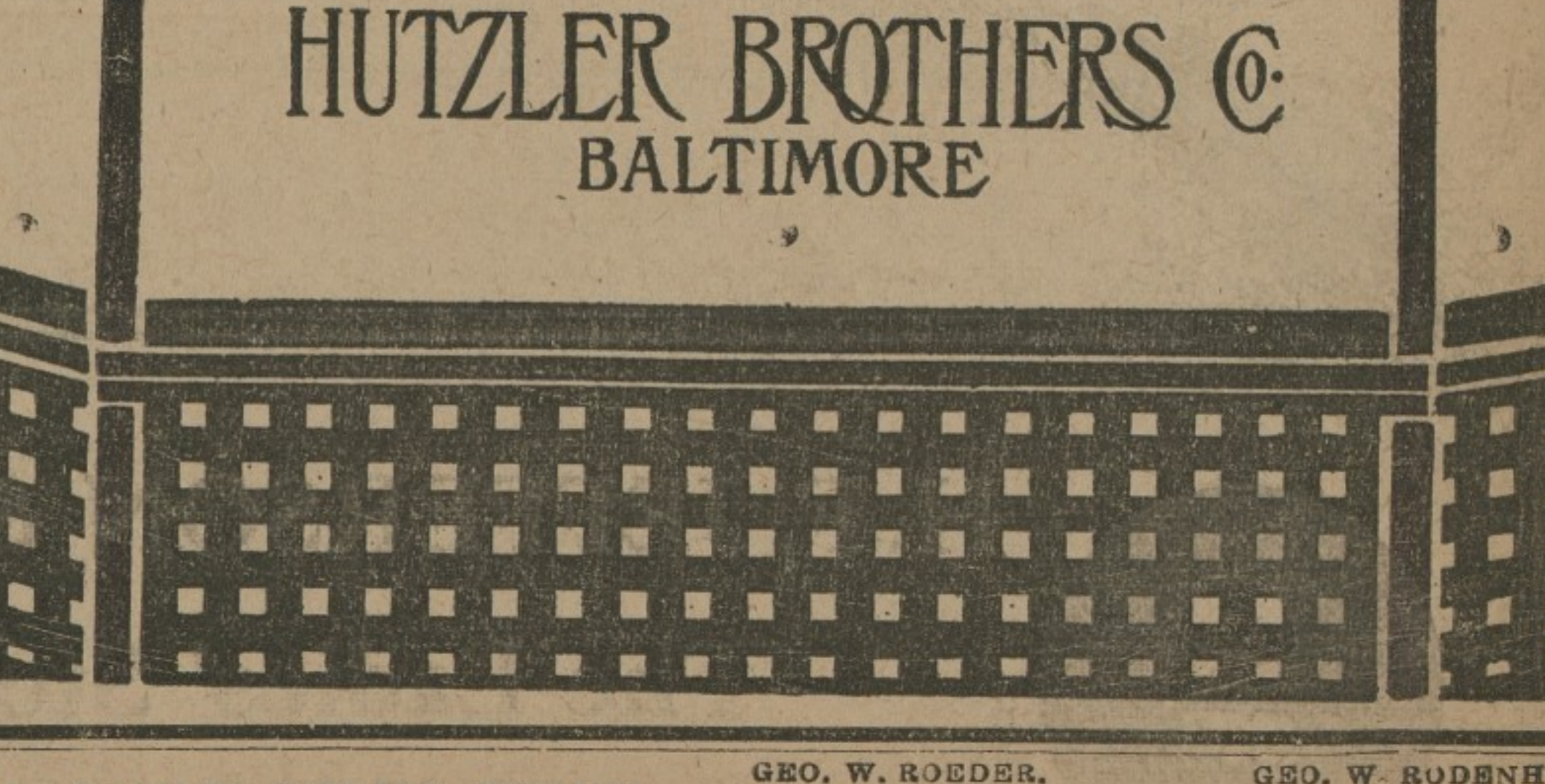
