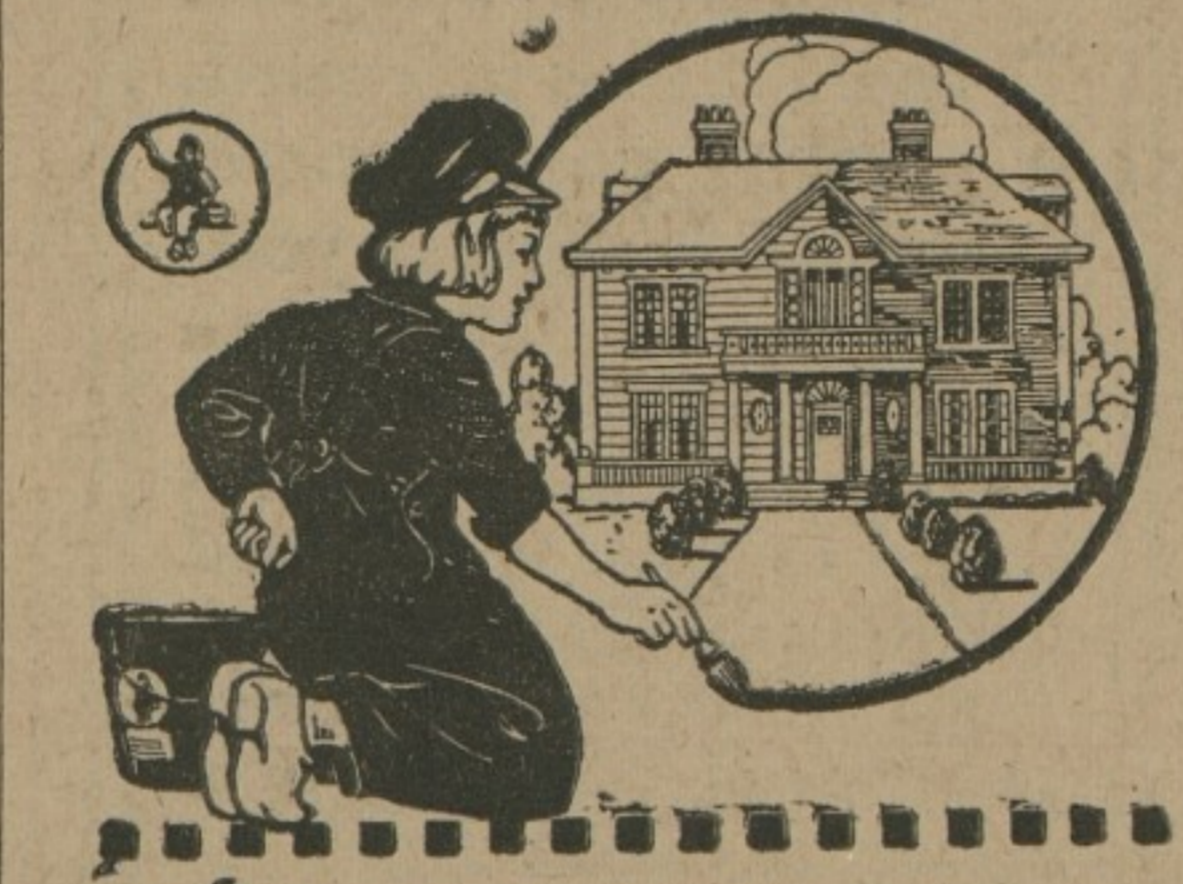

Grange Notes.

Faithful Grange held a most instructive and enjoyable meeting on Wednesday last beginning at 4.30 P. M. The hall was beautifully decorated with autumn leaves, asparagus and flowers. A horn of plenty in the center of the long table filled with fruits and vegetables, also baskets of the same around it presented a scene to be remembered. After supper the fruits, etc. were packed and sent to the "Free Kindergarten", Baltimore. After the business session at which time important matters were discussed, worthy Poma, Miss Ida C. Crew, presided. Her address on fruit, vegetables and nuts was a new feature and the audience was much pleased with the description of tropical fruits, their cultivation, etc. The Bentztown Bard's "Maryland Peaches" was well read by Miss Caroline Smyth. Mrs. T. E. W. Crew read in her usual clear and happy manner, "Down With Sulphur in Dried Fruits," showing that the fruit should be evaporated without using chemicals for bleaching, which is injurious. Mrs. W. G. Smyth read a highly instructive paper on "Food Value of Fruits." After the reading of a paper written by Mr. Walter Harris, (which will be published in county papers next week) was read by Mr. E. A. Corey, upon the subject of "Reclaiming Old Apple Orchards for the Production of High-grade Fruit." Mr. James T. Anthony took up the subject and gave a clear and comprehensive discussion in his usually pleasing manner, certainly if followed, Kent would produce many more and better apples. Attractive ways of sewing fruit was responded to by several. The program was interspersed with music by the Grange choir, and solos by Miss Katie Kendall and Mr. Frank Crow. Regular meeting next Wednesday evening.

Killed at Negro Dance.

A free fight and whiskey drinking occurred at the home of one Dorsey, colored, at Sandy Hook, on the outskirts of Galena, at a dance about midnight on Tuesday, at which George Tilson was shot and killed by a person unknown to the jury of inquest. Ohio Rasin, Esau Carter and Sam Gleaves were shot in the leg and hand by Preston Perkins it is alleged, and Harris Davis was badly cut by Marshall Carter. Howard Gleaves was arrested and lodged in jail, charged with selling whiskey. Sheriff McKee was notified of the affair and he and his deputy, Mr. Startt, arrested Preston Perkins, Marshall Carter and Howard Gleaves and lodged them in jail. Buddie, alias Napoleon Wilmer, who is under suspicion of having killed Tilson, made his escape, and a diligent search is now being made by the authorities for him. Coroner Frank Smith summoned a jury of inquest over the body of the deceased and a verdict was rendered that the cause came to his death from the effects of a wound from a pistol in the hands of a person unknown to the jury. The accused were given a hearing and held for the action of the grand jury, at the October term of court which convenes on Monday.

Wednesday evening the Mite Society of Kennedyville Presbyterian Church met at the home of Mr. Webster Hill. There was a very large attendance. Everybody was made to enjoy themselves by the playing of an act called "The Little Rebel," by Mr. and Mrs. Clews, Miss Blanche Redmile and Mrs. John Hesser, each of whom displayed unusual ability, the evening was filled with amusement. The subject for the sermon next Sabbath is "Give us This Day Our Daily Bread."
