**OUR DEATH RECORD.**

**Mr. George B. McWhorter.**  
Mr. George B. McWhorter, one of our oldest and most highly esteemed residents, died at his home on Washington avenue at a quarter before one o'clock on Thursday, after a long illness, aged 75 years. Mr. McWhorter had been in ill-health for a long time, but through his long illness he never complained of his condition, and sought in every way to relieve his devoted wife and family of the anxiety incident to his affliction. His death was quiet and peaceful and his mind was perfectly clear up to the moment of his death. The deceased was born near Blackiston's Cross Roads in Delaware. For some years he engaged in farming on the Brown farm in Queen Anne's. He removed to Chestertown in December, 1878, and on January 1, 1879, he began the livery business in the Russell stables on High street. Owing to the condition of his health he sold his livery business in September, 1903, to his son, Mr. George W. McWhorter, and retired to private life, though up to the moment of his death he maintained a keen interest in the business of his sons, and every day during his illness he inquired for his sons' welfare and wanted to know what was going on in the community. Mr. McWhorter was keenly interested in the public welfare, and though of a quiet and reserved manner, he had the happy faculty of always knowing what was going on around him. He was an ardent Democrat, and some years ago was also candidate for sheriff. A more generous hearted man than George B. McWhorter never lived. He was honest in the extreme, and in every business transaction in which he engaged he stood for his fairness and integrity. We never heard Mr. McWhorter say an unkind word about anybody, and his heart was so large, that his deeds of charity and his acts of kindness were known to every one. His family life was beautiful. The devotion of himself and wife to each other was complete, and while she ministered to his every want, with a devotion and self-sacrifice that was as beautiful as it was lavish, he strove always to relieve his family of the strain of his suffering, and looked on the bright side of life until his sufferings were ended. We know that George B. McWhorter was a grand man, a devoted husband and staunch friend, and he enjoyed the confidence and respect of the town and county because of his sterling character. We believe that his is the reward of the just, because of the life he lived here.
