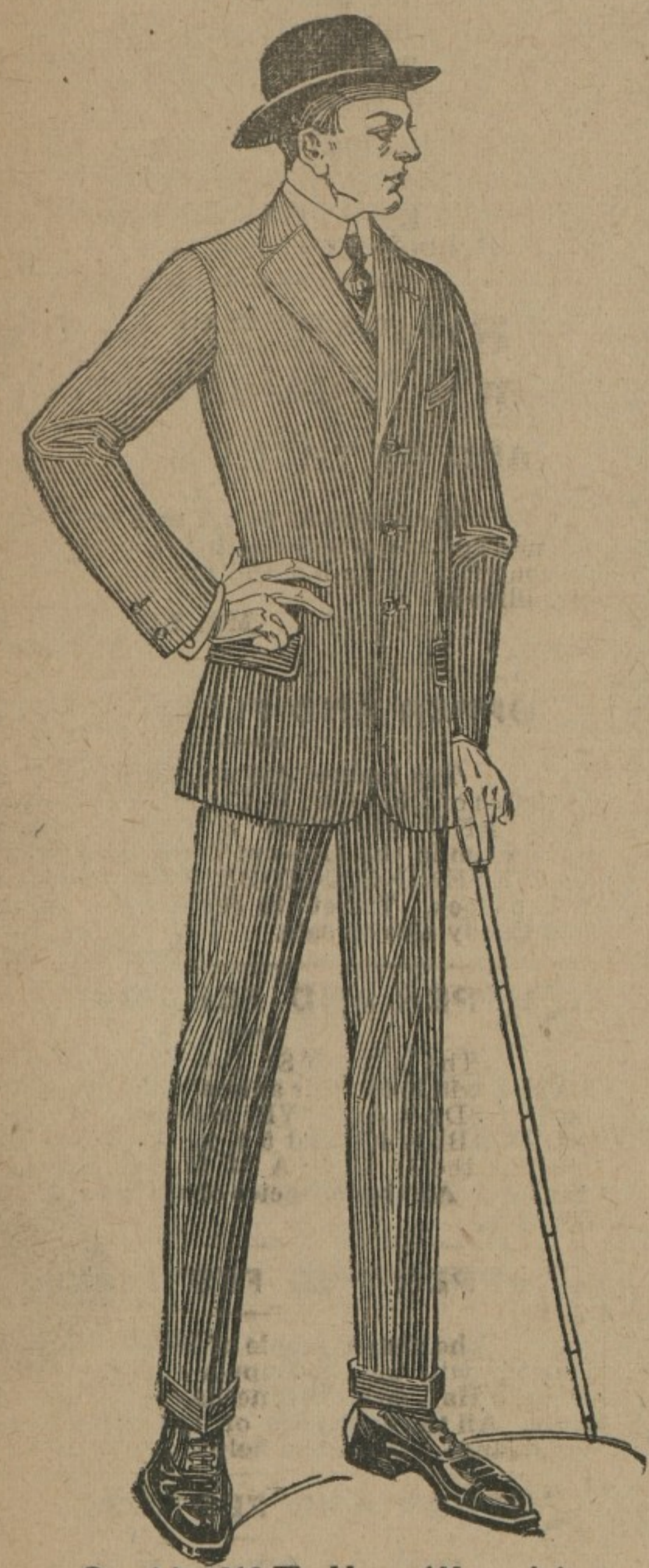

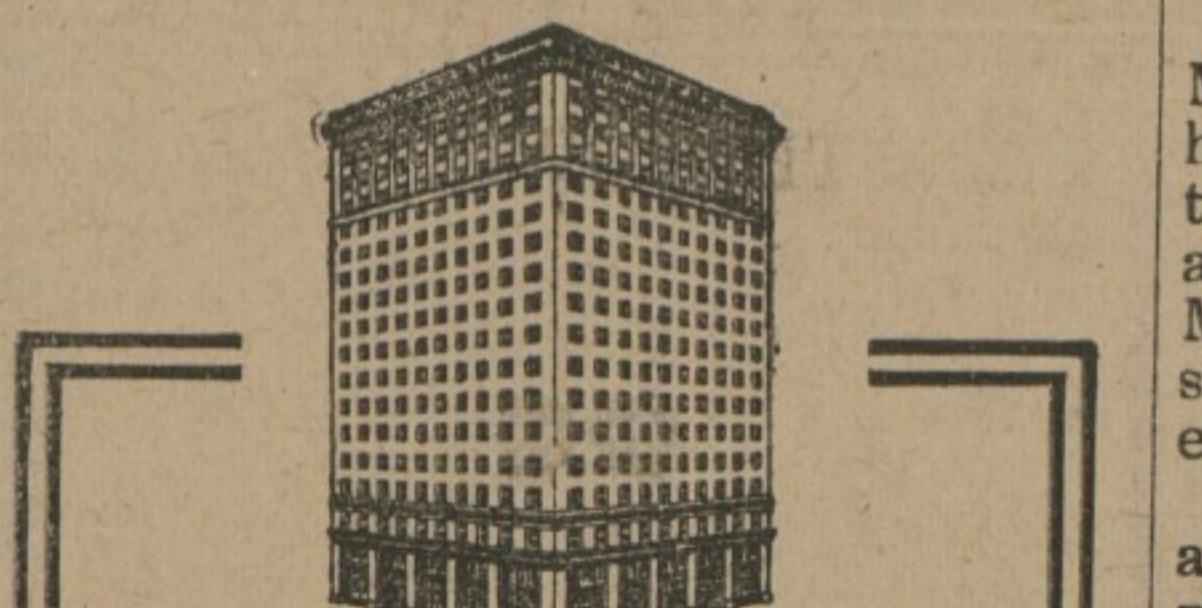

SENATOR BLAIR LEE is big enough and shrewd enough to pay no attention to the attacks made upon him from week to week by Wm. H. Anderson Supt. of the Anti-Saloon League through the columns of his paper, the *American Issue*. There is no more honest man in this state than Senator Lee, and in view of the fact that M. **Big Wind Storm.**  
The heavy wind storm on Monday did considerable damage to motorboats and other small craft in the harbor here. The wind blew a gale from the South and Chester river was on a rampage. Nearly all of the motorboats broke from their moorings and were blown ashore, while others were dashed against the shore walls and their combs smashed. Mr. Alan Harris' boat broke loose and his son waded out up to his neck, caught the boat, and endeavored to start the engine. It failed to work. The boat drifted up the river and Mr. Harris put her in harbor at Buckingham. He found a welcome at the home of Mr. Sewell Lee in Morgenc, and telephoned to his parents to send for him. He reached home in safety. This was one of the heaviest ever experienced on the Chester and the river looked more like Swan Point bar in a nor'wester than a placid river. Dr. H. C. Hughes' launch was damaged by being dashed against the shore walls and Mr. Wm. E. Moody's speed boat was sunk. Other boats were more or less damaged, but no harm was done to shipping craft.

High and dry on the shore of Lankford's bay the two masted schooner William McNamee is a wreck. Her crew was taken to the Kent county shore, after being buffeted all night by the wind that swept over the stranded craft. An unidentified schooner also stranded on the Chester river shore near My Lord's Gift creek, but was lifted by the rising tide and carried up the river.

While the wind reached the proportions of a hurricane almost on the bay we have learned of no other damage than the blowing ashore of small pleasure boats. The water in Chester river rose to within a few feet of the bridge floor and all of the Front street flower yards and cellars were submerged, the water reaching to the northwest side of Front street. The storm throughout the entire Eastern Shore from Elkton to Crisfield was the heaviest for years and the damage to Eastern Shore towns and shipping was heavy.
