CIRCUIT COURT.

The October term of the Circuit Court for Kent county was convened on Monday with Associate Judge P. B. Hopper, on the bench.

Immediately upon the convening of Court the July term was called and adjourned *sine die*.

Associate Judge W. H. Adkins, arrived on the 11:00 A. M. train and took his chair beside Judge Hopper. The Court ordered the drawing of the Grand Jury and the following were drawn:

Wilbur W. Hubbard, Foreman; John C. Redmile, Samuel F. Cooper, Edward W. Emory, Albert Jarvis, George W. Watts, John C. Jones, James E. Hurlock, Wm. B. Plummer, Harry T. Rash, Richard E. Wilson, Joshua H. Jarrell, Charles M. Hurr, Geo. W. Sutton.

The petit jury is as follows: Edward C. Walters, Richard Haggerty, Louis E. Smith, Robert Kennedy, Wm. S. Seon, Arthur Bradley, Ralph W. Barnett, James B. Willson, Harry Stavely, Chas. M. Walters, Chas. M. Brown, L. Vansant.

The eight last named were tallismen drawn in place of the following, who were excused from jury service during the present term, to-wit: T. Eric, James C. Calhoun, Joseph R. Usilton, Thomas H. Casey, Virgil W. Kendall, James K. Downey, and Geo. W. Jones. Mr. Charles P. Hodgkin was appointed Court Bailiff in place of Mr. S. Q. Moody, resigned; and Mr. Daniel Cox, was appointed bailiff to Grand Jury in place of Mr. Hodgkin, promoted.

The several dockets were called and read, cases marked for trial, orders taken, etc. At 12:30 the Court took recess until 1:30. Upon reconvening the case of Milton E. Baker vs. Mrs. Bessie Hall, was called. This was a suit over a disputed claim being an appeal from docket of Samuel L. Wright, J. P., Jury trial. Verdict for appellant; R. Groome Parks, for appellee.

Case of Worton Merchandise Co. vs. International Tailoring Co., suit for debt; appeal from docket of Samuel L. Wright, J. P. On trial upon adjournment of Court; Hope H. Barroll, att'y for appellant; H. W. Vickers, for appellee. The Grand Jury returned presentment against Norman D. Skinner for larceny.

Court adjourned until 9:30 A. M. Tuesday. The case of the Worton Merchandising Company was not proseed.

TUESDAY. Court convened at 9:30 o'clock with Judges Adkins and Hopper on the bench. First case called was that of Clarence Murray vs. State. Appeal from Justice Wright. Court trial; verdict guilty. Sentence suspended. Townshend for Murray, Vickers for State. Case of State vs. Benj. Blake, appeal from Justice Wright. Court trial; verdict guilty.

The case of M. Kate Crew vs. the Chadwick Engineering Company was called and consumed the entire day. This was a case in which Miss Crew sought to recover on the sale of an automobile for \$550, which she alleged was not as represented and of no use to her. The grand jury brought in the following presentments: Edw. Gibson, violating local option law; Wm. Waters for assault with intent to kill.

A plea of not guilty was entered in the case of State vs. Edward Kennard. The grand jury brought in other presentments as follows: Percy Jones, larceny; Wm. H. Bowers, destroying a fence; Clements Hicks, larceny; Wallace Cann, disorderly conduct. True bills: Wm. Walters, Norman D. Skinner and Edw. Gibson.

WEDNESDAY. Court convened at 9:30 o'clock. The case of Crew vs. Chadwick Engineering Company was resumed and occupied the attention of court all morning. The grand jury brought in presentments against Geo. P. Perkins for assault with intent to kill; George Cann, unlawfully entering a house; Harrison Gleaves for violating local option law; Napoleon Wilmer, assault with intent to kill, and Marshall Coleman, assault and cutting. True bills—Wm. H. Bowers, Clements Hicks and Percy Jones.

AFTERNOON. The case of Crew vs. Chadwick Engineering Company was concluded. Jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff, Miss Crew, in the sum of \$598.40, the full amount claimed with interest. L. W. Wickes for Miss Crew; Wm. W. Beck for company. The grand jury brought in the following true bills: George Cann, Marshall Coleman, Geo. P. Perkins, Hanson Gleaves and Napoleon Wilmer. The grand jury submitted its report after having been in session only three days, the shortest session for years and was discharged with the thanks of the court. The report is as follows:

TO THE HONORABLE JUDGES OF THE CIRCUIT COURT FOR KENT COUNTY—GENTLEMEN: As per your charge to us when we were drawn, as Grand Jurors, we have tried faithfully to perform our duty as we know it. We have examined 22 indictments, heard 13 cases, tried 11 and 12 dismissed. We have found 13 presentments and 3 true bills and 3 cases prosequed for want of sufficient evidence to sustain the charge. The greatest difficulty we have found is to obtain evidence in the local option cases, but we are in hopes that the new federal law will aid very materially our successors in their investigations, and as suggested by the Honorable Court in your charge, that our newly elected Legislatures and our Senator do everything in their power at the next session to pass a State law that will enable our courts to break up such flagrant violations as we believe exist. We have visited the jail and find it well kept and the prisoners as comfortable as you could expect. We have been a congenial body, and we trust our deliberations have been satisfactory. We appreciate the assistance rendered us by this Honorable Court, the Clerk and the State's Attorney, all of whom have done everything in their power to aid us in our deliberations and investigations.

Respectfully submitted, WILBUR W. HUBBARD, Foreman. All tallismen were excused from further attendance. The case of Hugh Mcklosky vs. Jos. Downey, agent of the Rock Hall Cannery Company, was called, and occupied the attention of the court for the remainder of the session and all day Thursday, when the jury rendered a verdict for the plaintiff for \$75. W. W. Beck for Mcklosky and L. W. Wickes for Downey.

FRIDAY. The case of Bevan vs. County Commissioners of Talbot county was removed to Cecil county by consent of counsel. The case of Garner vs. Wm. H. Bowers for destroying boundary fence was continued to April term. The case of State vs. Clements Hicks for larceny of chickens, etc., from Mr. Joseph Atwell, was called. Jury trial. A non pro was granted in the case of the estate of R. D. Hynson vs. the estate of Thomas Gale. Wm. M. Slay, counsel for the estate of Mr. Hynson, asking to have the case non prosed. Those petit jurors not on duty were excused, and the court was expected to adjourn after the trial of several criminal cases last night.

Fairlee Grange met in regular session Wednesday evening. Important matters were discussed, which will be decided upon next Wednesday evening. A full attendance is requested. Next special meeting will be held November 12. Mrs. E. A. Corey will edit the Garner.
