FINE MATINEE.

The one thousand and more people who attended the big matinee races at Radcliffe Park on Wednesday afternoon witnessed some of the finest and most exciting races seen at the park this season. It may be said to the credit of the association that it always gives the public the worth of their money. Besides the great match race between Pony Boy 2.17 and Princess March 2.14, which was one of the most exciting and hotly contested races ever seen at the track, there were four other races, which furnished the spectators enough to talk about from now until the spring racing season opens up. In each race the time was good, and the result proved that there are some very promising colts in Kent and Queen Annes counties. The match race went five heats, and showed that Pony Boy and Princess March are two of the most evenly matched horses in speed qualities on the Eastern Shore. Each horse had its friends at the track, and as first one and then the other took a heat the enthusiasm of their backers became at fever heat, and the result was in doubt until Princess March pushed under the wire a winner in the fifth heat in 2.15. The time by quarters in some of these heats was the fastest ever made over a half mile track, and even Joe being able to excel. The race was in our judgment on the level, and each driver did his best to win. Mr. S. Powell Peacock proved himself a past master at the art of driving a great little mare and Joe Rising, just popular Joe, did his level best to put one of the most wonderful little race horses in this country under the wire a winner. It is a toss-up as to which of these horses has the most speed, and on the quiet, boys, we believe that Pony Boy can beat Princess March as often as the latter can beat the former. We hope Mr. Peacock will remain here and use the track for training purposes. He is a good fellow, and we would like to see Honest John Mallieu, Joe Rising and good natured "Murphy" Stafford, as well as the old reliable George Sutton and Ed. Stouffer at Worton track, and the Smiths at Pine Plains. Cecil Kent and Queen Annes counties would be supplied with every facility for developing the speed qualities of our horses. Work of Federated Club.

There was a meeting of the Federated Club of Chestertown, at the home of Mrs. W. Hubbard on Saturday evening last, the guests of the evening being Mrs. Hester Dorsey Richardson, author of "Side Lights on Maryland History"; and Mrs. Robert Hogan, State Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, having succeeded the late Mrs. Pembroke Thom, of Baltimore. Each of these ladies gave interesting talks, Mrs. Richardson reading a letter from Ella Wheeler Wilcox written at the time Mrs. Richardson was forming the first woman's club in Baltimore.

Mrs. Hogan gave a short talk upon the Patriotic work of her society at the conclusion of which Judge Pearce gave a delightful account of the Patriotism and sentiment expressed in some of our poor counties by putting good pictures of Patriots in their Court Houses. Among other educational features of the evening Prof. Smyth, our County School Superintendent, gave a talk at the request of the ladies, upon the law of compulsory school attendance. Kent county is today exempt from this law, but our school officials think that with the industrial training now going on in our schools, teaching the colored children as well as the white, how to cook and serve a meal, that in a short while it will help to uplift the entire domestic problem and with no extra expense to the tax-payers as we already have the schools and the teachers employed, but with no compulsory attendance law, some white and many colored parents only send their children a few days in the week leaving the schools largely empty the other days.

All present were surprised and delighted with the work Prof. Smyth was doing in industrial education. The object of the Federated Club of Chestertown is to further all questions of social uplift and their work in no way interferes with the work of any other club in town. It is a field that is entirely unoccupied, and are questions that virtually concern women, but have never been taken up by them in Chestertown before. The club belongs to the State Organization of Federated Clubs and their work in the beginning will largely be educational. The treasurer, Miss Blanche Constable, reported \$204.00 in bank. On Saturday, November 8th, Mr. Raymond Moody will address the club upon the work that he is doing in Baltimore for social uplift, and all ladies in the town and county who are interested are invited to attend these meetings and become members of the club. The yearly dues are 50 cents, but as one half of the year is gone, any one wishing to become a member, may do so for 25 cents, which will pay their dues until next April. The winter Chautauqua entertainments, which will be given under the auspices of the Federated Club to continue the Chautauqua spirit during the winter, will have tickets ready soon and will advertise extensively during the coming week.
