To Organize Race Circuit.

Plans are on foot to organize a Matinee Race Circuit on the Maryland-Delaware peninsula for next season. While there have been no definite arrangements made as yet, it can be stated authoritatively that a circuit composed of Chestertown, and four or five tracks in Delaware will be arranged during the winter. The tracks entering this circuit will agree each to furnish from four to five horses for the matinee, which besides other good classes to be arranged, will furnish fine sport for each matinee.
