



**Damage Case Compromised.**—The case of Harry R. Richardson vs. the Board of County Commissioners of Kent county which has been pending in the courts for the past two years, has been compromised by the commissioners agreeing to pay to Mr. Richardson the sum of \$100 for injuries to a valuable horse on the public road near Lankford.

**Will of Late Silas Weller.**—The last will and testament of Silas Weller was admitted to probate in the Orphans' Court on Tuesday. It bequeathes \$1000 absolutely to his widow; \$250 to each of his sons, Louis H. and James W. Weller, \$100 to his grandson, Elmer Weller. The other children and grandchildren are each given one dollar. The residue of the estate is directed to be invested in mortgages at 6 per cent. the income therefrom to be paid to the widow. At her death the residue is to be equally divided among his sons, Messrs. Louis H., James W., Jacob and Charles S. Weller. The will is dated May 15th, 1911, and is witnessed by Messrs. Sidney F. Townshend and Denny Hoffecker.

**Charles H. Jefferson is named as executor, and he has been granted permission by the Orphans' Court to fill the farm in 1914, which the deceased had rented from Mr. Thos. W. Eliason.**
