TREASURER'S NOVEMBER SITTINGS.

In pursuance of an Act of Assembly passed at the session in 1911, Chapter 252, the undersigned, Treasurer of Kent County, hereby gives notice that for the purpose of receiving the

STATE AND COUNTY TAXES

in said county for the year 1913, he will sit for the November sittings in the several Election Districts between the hours of 10 A. M. and 3 P. M., on

Wednesday, November 19th, Still Pond—At Wm. Mathews' Store, Betterton—At Chas. H. Brice's Store, Wednesday, November 26th, Rock Hall—At Chesapeake House, Fairlee—At Kilbourn & Bramble's Store.

At all other times will be at Treasurer's Office in Chestertown. The Treasurer's Office in the Court House will not be open on the above days.

The Treasurer's Office in the Court House will open every day except on the above dates from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M. for the receipt of Taxes. Tax-payers will please take notice that taxes will be due and payable Sept. 1st, and that on all taxes unpaid on January 1st, interest will be charged and collected from Sept. 1st. On the first day of January all taxes unpaid are declared by law to be in arrears, and delinquents will be warned that unless settlement in full is made before April 1st, the claims against them will be placed in the hands of the Treasurer of the county, who will proceed to seize and sell their property to pay the taxes due with charges and all costs in law. The Treasurer would therefore respectfully urge all tax-payers to pay promptly.
