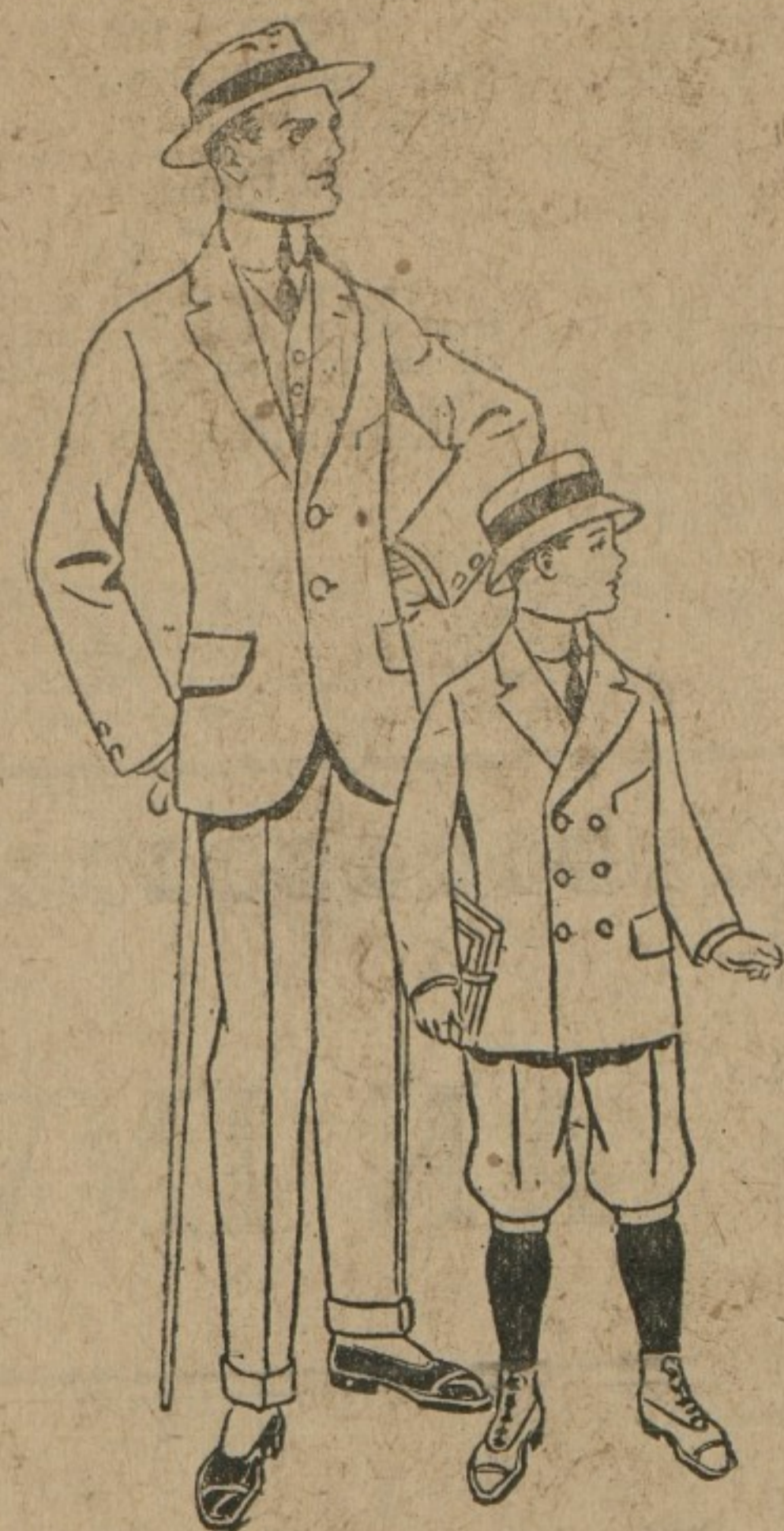

Kennedyville, for several years in succession, has had several cases of typhoid fever. The Grange became interested and wrote the State Board of Health. This was followed by an inspector being sent and the sanitary condition of the town was reported to the State Board of Health. After careful examination of the report, Dr. Fulton, of the State Board, sent his reply. A town meeting was called and the citizens, with those who own land adjoining, were present. Mr. Geo. B. Basin, Worthy Master of the Grange, presided. The report of Dr. Fulton was read by the secretary and every one was interested, as all were in favor of stamping out typhoid fever. After the report was read, Dr. Jones, the county health officer, who had been invited to attend the meeting, gave a very interesting talk on the health conditions. Mr. Richard Lockwood, who owns the farm adjoining the milk station and the cannery, was present with us and was in every way willing to do his part. Mr. Jas. West said the owners of the milk station were willing to do. And last, but not least, the county officials, in draining the road in our town, did work that has done more harm than good. It does not drain the road and prevents property owners from draining their property. Complaints were appointed to look after the work after which the meeting adjourned, subject to the call of the chair.

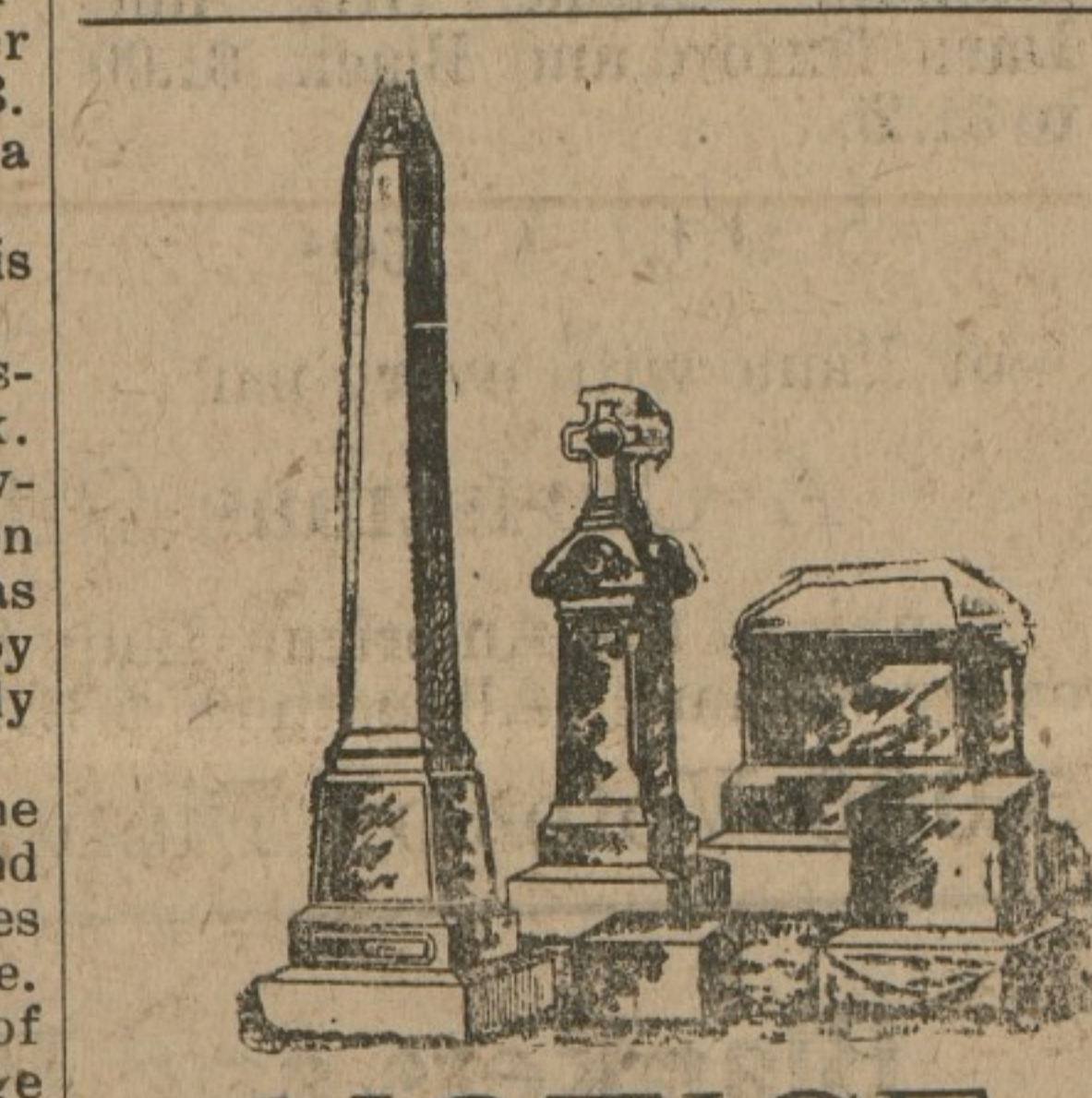
