In Memoriam.

On the morning of the 8th inst, every home in Betterton became a house of mourning, and every heart was bowed down with sadness. During the night, while the town was wrapt in slumber, in one of the homes fond parents, sisters and friends were watching, by a bedside with almost breaking hearts, hoping against hope; but in the stillness of the night death entered and plucked therefrom a lovely flower, a sweet young life.

But Myrtle Taylor did not fear death, being a splendid christian character, her life, though short, had been a beautiful one, and when the angel of death came, she could well have exclaimed: "Oh death, where is thy sting; O grave, where is thy victory." Although scarcely twenty years of age, she had been teaching school nearly two years, never was a teacher loved more by her pupils than was she. Being peculiarly fitted for the various duties of a teacher, ambitious, always bright, cheerful, full of hope and inspiration, she endeared herself to the hearts of her scholars, and with open hands and hearts she was welcomed into the homes of the patrons of the school, who counted it a joy and pleasure to have her with them. Myrtle was an affectionate daughter, and a kind and loving sister. She was never heard to speak evil of any one, but seemed to consider it her mission to scatter rays of sunshine into darkened hearts and homes, and to bring joy and gladness into the hearts of all with whom she associated. She was devoted to her church, active in christian work, manifesting a deep interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of the church and the promotion of the cause of her Lord and Saviour, whom she loved so well. During the few days of her illness, she was patient and uncomplaining, grateful for all that was being done for her. A few minutes before the final separation came, conscious that her young life was fast ebbing away, she bade those at her bedside a fond farewell, and after giving some directions as to her burial, calmly and peacefully her young spirit took its flight to be with its Maker and to join the innumerable hosts of the redeemed around the throne of glory. On Sunday afternoon a large concourse of friends attended her funeral to pay their last tribute of love and respect. She was laid to rest in Still Pond cemetery.

The day was a beautiful one; the bright October sun, and the great mass of flowers contributed by her many friends as a mark of love, was indeed fitting emblematic of the beautiful life that Myrtle Taylor had lived, and who had fallen asleep to this earth fully prepared for the breaking of Heaven's bright morning on her immortal soul.

Unbroken by the last of foes.

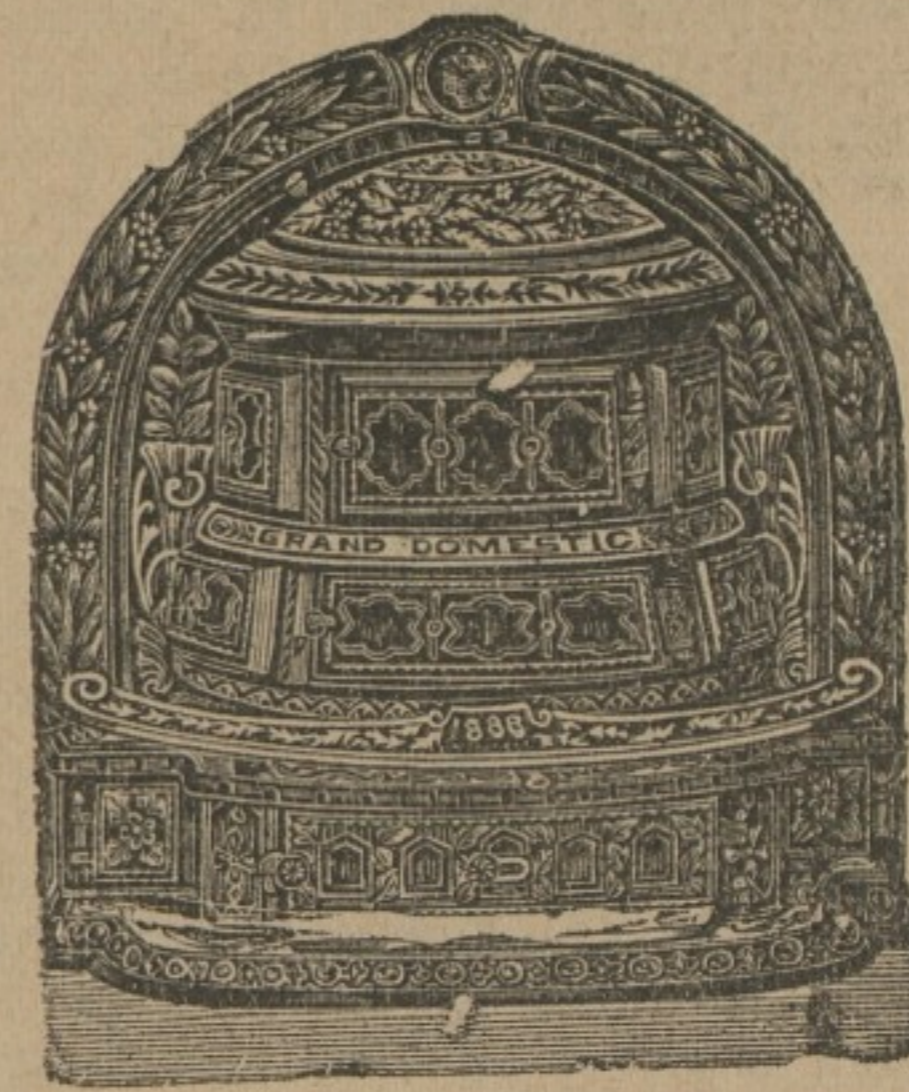
Asleep in Jesus, peaceful rest,
