**EPISCOPAL CONVENTION.**  
To Assemble in Christ Church, Easton, next Wednesday and Thursday.  
The Middle Convocation of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Easton will be held at Trinity Cathedral, Easton, on Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 21 and 22 and a large attendance is expected. Lay delegates from each parish of the diocese have been particularly urged to be present.  
The convocation will open on Wednesday morning with the celebration of the holy communion at 11 o'clock. The sermon will be preached by Rev. Henry Davis, Ph. D., rector of Christ Church, Easton. At 3 P. M., there will be a business session and at 7.30 P. M. a missionary service, and addresses by Rev. S. S. Hepburn, Dean of the Northern Convocation; Dr. W. W. Davis, of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland, and Rev. G. C. F. Bratenahl, D. D., subject, "The Provincial Synod and the Work of the Provincial Synod."  
On Thursday there will again be a communion service at 7.30 A. M., followed at 10.30 by morning prayer and sermon by Rev. William H. Darbie, Rector of Christ Church, Kent Island.  
The afternoon program, beginning at 3 o'clock, will include an essay by Rev. William Roberts, Rector of Christ Church, St. Michaels, exegesis by Rev. George C. Sutton D. D., Rector of Trinity Church, Oxford.  
The convocation will close with evening song and an historical address by Right Rev. Frederick Joseph Kinsman, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Delaware.  
The diocesan officials are Right Rev. Wm. F. Adams, D. D., LL. D., D. C. L., Bishop; Rev. J. Gibson Cant, Dean, Rev. H. B. Bryan, vice-president, and Rev. Thomas H. M. Ockford, secretary and treasurer.
