#### PROPERLY PACKED APPLES COMMAND TOP PRICES.

Growers Should Make An Especial Effort To Pack This Year According To Approved Method.

Well-grown, carefully packed apples seldom go begging on any market. As a rule, it is the wormy, diseased, poorly colored fruit, packed in a careless, haphazard manner that has a depressing effect on market prices.

Before beginning to pack, consider the kind of packages best suited to the variety, and for which there is the greatest demand on the market to which you expect to consign. Many growers do not consider the relation which the package bears to the selling value of their fruit. On some markets there is a good demand for fancy Stayman, Grimes, Jonathan and similar varieties packed in boxes, while other markets prefer these same varieties in barrels. Such varieties as Wine-sap, York, Ben Davis, etc., can best be marketed in barrels on most markets.

Do not attempt to pack more than one grade in boxes. Select the choicest fruit for this package, using that which is entirely free from blemishes of all kinds and of the highest color. Market all other grades in barrels.

In barrel-packing face with the stems to the head. Fruit used for facing should not misrepresent the contents of the barrel, either in size, color or quality. Shake the barrel frequently during the filling to insure a tight pack. Place the top layer stems up, extending about an inch above the ends of the staves. Corrugated paper padding can be used to good advantage at both ends of the barrel. No matter what package is used or the grade packed, have each container filled with the same size and quality of fruit throughout. Mark each package accordingly.

Improved methods of production and packing will make marketing easier and more profitable. The Extension Service of the Maryland Agricultural College is giving detailed information, through demonstrations or otherwise, to growers in Maryland who want to know more about grading and packing apples. If there is an Agricultural Agent in your county, get in touch with him and arrange for a packing demonstration in your community. Where there is no County Agent the Maryland Agricultural College arranges for the holding of such demonstrations at the request of local growers.

#### SELECTING HEAVY LAYERS FROM YOUR FLOCK.

It has been rather conclusively proven by experiments and observations at several of the Government Experiment Stations that it is possible to select the heavy laying hens with a remarkable degree of accuracy by rather simple methods. This happens to be about the best time of the year to make the selection. Of course, the method is of use only in selecting the hens to be kept for breeders. Their first year's laying period is over and therefore, the system is of no use in

weeding out the drones. It has been observed that the high layers invariably have much lighter colored shanks than the others. This is explained by the fact that the hen uses up the coloring matter from her body and puts it into the eggs. Of course, if the flock has been fed on highly colored feed, like yellow corn, green grass, etc., the shanks will not be so light colored. The heavy layer, however, will have much paler shanks than the others.

It has also been noted that almost invariably the heavy laying hen is the last to moult in the fall and her feathers nearly all drop out at one time. Such a hen has been tending strictly a business and almost forgot to get her new clothes. More recently it has been observed that the ear lobes of white ear lobed breeds are much less yellow in a heavy laying bird.

It is also pretty definitely known that a hen which lays well into the fall is apt to have been a rather heavy layer all during the year.

Taking all these things together, we can get a pretty good line on the individuals of the flock by making observations in October and November. Hens that have pale shanks, are moulting late and have little yellow in the ear lobes as compared with the rest of the birds in the pen, are pretty sure to have been the heavy layers.

#### A Novel Craft.

In the harbor of Port Weller, the Ontario entrance of the Welland ship canal, says the Engineering News, the surveying staff uses a fat bottomed boat that can lift itself clear of the water. It is a drill boat or sounding scow, of catamaran model, built particularly for the work of finding the elevation of the rock that underlies the bottom of the river. In order to have a steady platform on which to work during rough weather the surveyors had the scow made with a slot at each corner, through which a very heavy spindle or post can be raised or lowered. The lifting mechanism consists of a wheel on top of each post, over which a wire cable passes from the side of the scow to an individual engine. When the scow heaves and sways in the water too much workmen start the four engines, and presently the scow is standing firm, with its four stout legs on the bottom of the river.

#### Trenches in War.
