Exciting Runaways.

Mrs. N. Lieberman, of Melitts, and Miss Emily Plummer, of Flatland, had a narrow escape from serious injury in a runaway accident on Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Lieberman stopped at the home of Mrs. Plummer and took lunch, and while there the horse got frightened on a swiftly passing automobile. It pulled up the hitching post and ran as far as the home of Mr. R. G. Nicholson when Miss Emily who had mounted a horse overtook the team and drove it to her home. After lunch she and Mrs. Lieberman started to town and when opposite the home of Mr. Joseph Everett the horse began to run. It came into town, and several gentlemen made an effort to stop the horse, one of whom was run over but not hurt in the attempt. The horse turned into Court street and upset the carriage in front of the post office throwing Mrs. Lieberman and Miss Plummer out. Neither was injured, though Mrs. Lieberman was very much shocked. She was taken to the office of Dr. Julian Power, and Dr. Simpers rendered medical attention. Mr. J. E. Morris came to town in his auto and took both ladies to their homes, and Mr. Frank Plummer drove the horse home.

A rather serious runaway occurred on Cannon street Monday afternoon, when "William Barnett," Mr. Geo. T. Satterfield's pacer, started off at a sharp gallop when Mr. Satterfield left him for a few minutes to go into his home on Cannon street. The horse collided with a team being driven by Mrs. Samuel Cox, of near Melitts, who with her little daughter, was thrown into the road and run over. Both escaped any injury, but were covered with considerable mud. Both horses, when they went their way at a fast gallop down town, the carriage owned by Mrs. Cox being almost demolished, while a wheel was torn from another carriage in the flight. A colored man stopped "William Barnett" near Princess street, while the other horse was stopped on High street.
