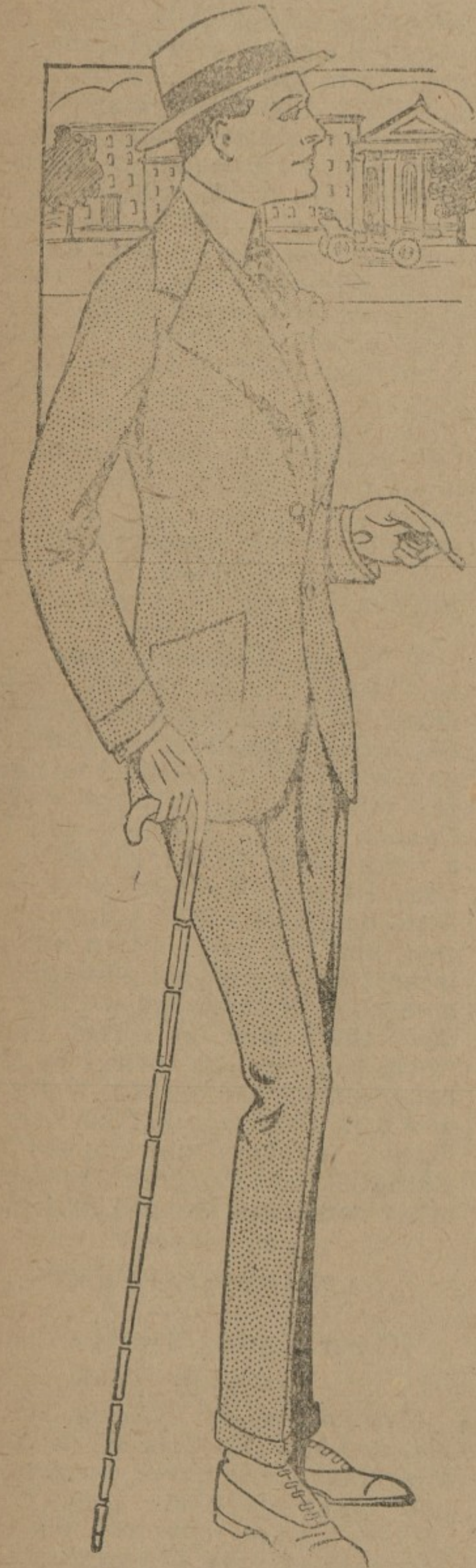

Report of the Auditing Committee OF KENT COUNTY, MARYLAND.

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners for Kent County: GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with an Act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed January, 1904, we have been appointed auditors for Kent county, and we have examined the books, accounts, and papers of the office of the County Commissioners, Treasurer, Board of School Commissioners and Trustees of Almshouse, and submit the following report as shown in the following exhibits:

EXHIBITS

In order that the succeeding Auditing Committee, as well as the general public, may understand the work done by the auditors, we wish to state that we have compared the assessment books of the county with the tax books of the Treasurer and verified them. We have traced each bill presented through the books of the County Commissioners, Treasurer, to the checks returned. We have left in the Commissioners' office a list of orders and certificates which have not been paid. You will observe the exhibits showing expenditures for the amount of \$193,352.72, while the Treasurer's expenditures are \$115,415.66. The former is made up of Orders and Certificates for 1914-15, while the latter is made up of Orders of 1914-15 and Certificates of 1913-14 paid in 1914-15.
