WE MUST get together for the good of the Democratic party. Let Mr. Barrall and Mr. Beck start the movement. It will be as easy as can be if all go in the right way, and the man who opposes the idea, let the responsibility for the future of the Democratic party be upon his shoulders.

DR. HARE, the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, says "It is prohibition or bust" this time. He expects to pass the bill submitting the question to a vote of the people in the next session of the Legislature, and says the League has the necessary votes to pass it. He says the Eastern Shore is a unit for the bill, and the politicians who dare to prevent its passage will be thrown upon the scrap heap.

BOOKER T. Washington, noted colored educator, race leader and author, died at Tuskegee, Ala., this week. Washington was an honor to his race, and did much for their educational and political uplift. Fully 8,000 people, white and colored, from all walks in life attended the funeral which took place on Wednesday from Tuskegee Institute, of which for many years the deceased was President.

THE State of Georgia's Anti-Shipping bill, passed the other day, prevents advertising liquor in any manner—in periodicals, newspapers, billboards, or otherwise, and will become effective May 1, 1916. Judging by the amount of liquor advertising dumped into Kent county on Tuesday through the mails, if the Eastern Shore Anti-Shipping law must remain in force, it would be well for the next Legislature to amend the law as to make it conform to the Georgia statute.

THERE are indications that neither Congressman Lewis nor Mr. Wm. Cabell Bruce will be acceptable to the State Organization as a candidate for United States Senator to succeed Senator Blair Lee, who himself will be a candidate, and there are murmurings that another man will be the Organization candidate. Congressman Lewis' participation in the last primary campaign and his socialistic ideas regarding government ownership of telegraph and telephone lines as well as railroads, will make him an exceedingly weak candidate in the election, and with Gov. Goldsborough or Mr. Jackson, or Mr. Weller as the Republican candidate, there would be very grave danger of the defeat of Congressman Lewis in the election should he win the primaries.

MR. HARRINGTON'S OPPORTUNITY.

Governor-elect Emerson C. Harrington has a great opportunity to redeem the Democratic party and make it the dominant party in the State for years to come. But he will never succeed in the undertaking unless he cuts himself loose from the past alliances which have brought the party into disrepute. The people of the State have elected Mr. Harrington Governor, not because of their love for those leaders who have been responsible for past deeds, but simply because they have taken Mr. Harrington at his word, and believe that he is big enough and bold enough to redeem his campaign promises, and to cut loose from the bosses and become a second Austin L. Crothers. If Mr. Harrington will do this his political future is bright. He is a young man full of intelligence and shrewd in the game of politics, and if he administers the affairs of the State in the interest of all the people, he is destined to become a great factor in his party. We sincerely trust that Mr. Harrington will rise to his great opportunity and see to it in the outset of his administration that there is no semblance of subservience to the old crowd, by allowing it to dictate the presiding officers of the coming Legislature.

Maryland Week.

Maryland week at the Fifth Regiment Armory, Baltimore, during the week has attracted great crowds from all parts of Maryland as well as many from other states, and never before in the history of the state has such an education been provided for agriculturists, dairymen, floriculturists and everybody else, as everything raised on the farm, in the is shown in the magnificent exhibits of water in the orchard and nothouse. Cows were there to show the improved method of milking, plots of ground were there to show the method of cultivating hillside and valleys, as well as proper treatment of soils, and the exhibits of fruits and flowers were simply gorgeous. The chrysanthemums shown would have made our Chesterton growers turn green with envy. Some of them were so large that, if extended, they would fill the space of a water bucket, while no one dreamed that such fruit could be raised in Maryland. The county and grange exhibits were also creditable. Queen Anne county carried off several valuable prizes in the corn and wheat contest—Mr. Josiah Massey, Mr. Potts and Mr. J. T. Anthony holding up the honor and dignity of the county in fine style. It is greatly to be regretted that Kent county was not represented in the exhibits. Mr. Walter B. Harris had a most creditable display of apples, and was among the best prize winners, but Kent should have been represented in many other exhibits. The week was a huge success, and marks an educational epoch in the agricultural history of the State. The next stop for the farmers and grangers will be Salisbury, December 6 to 9.
