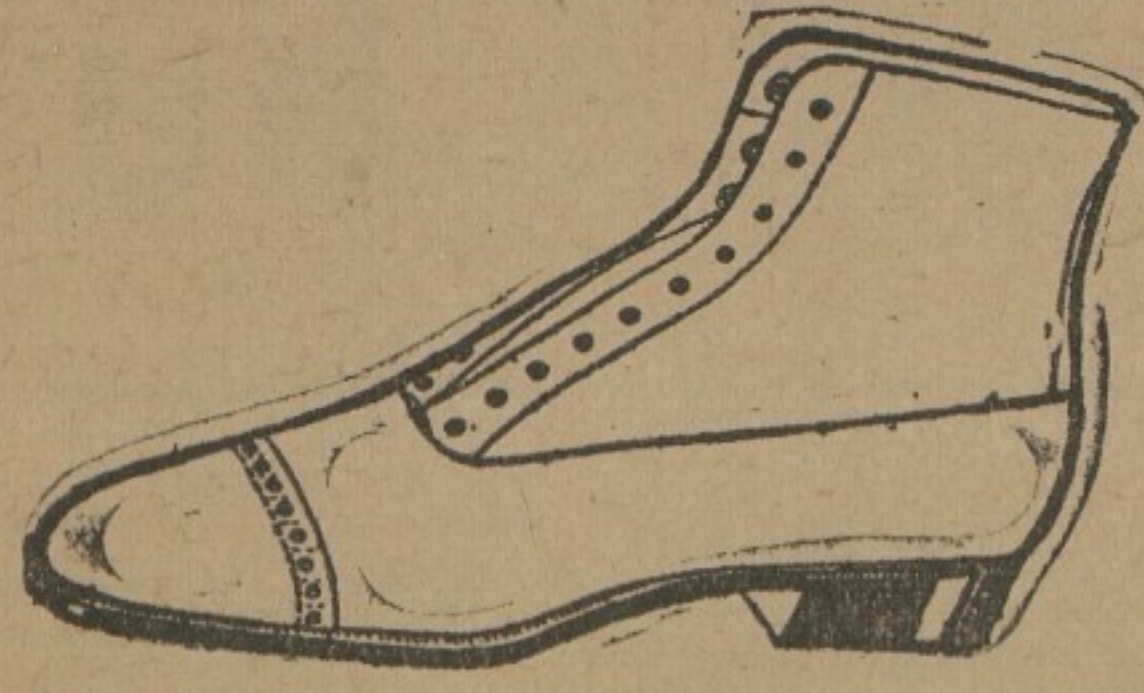


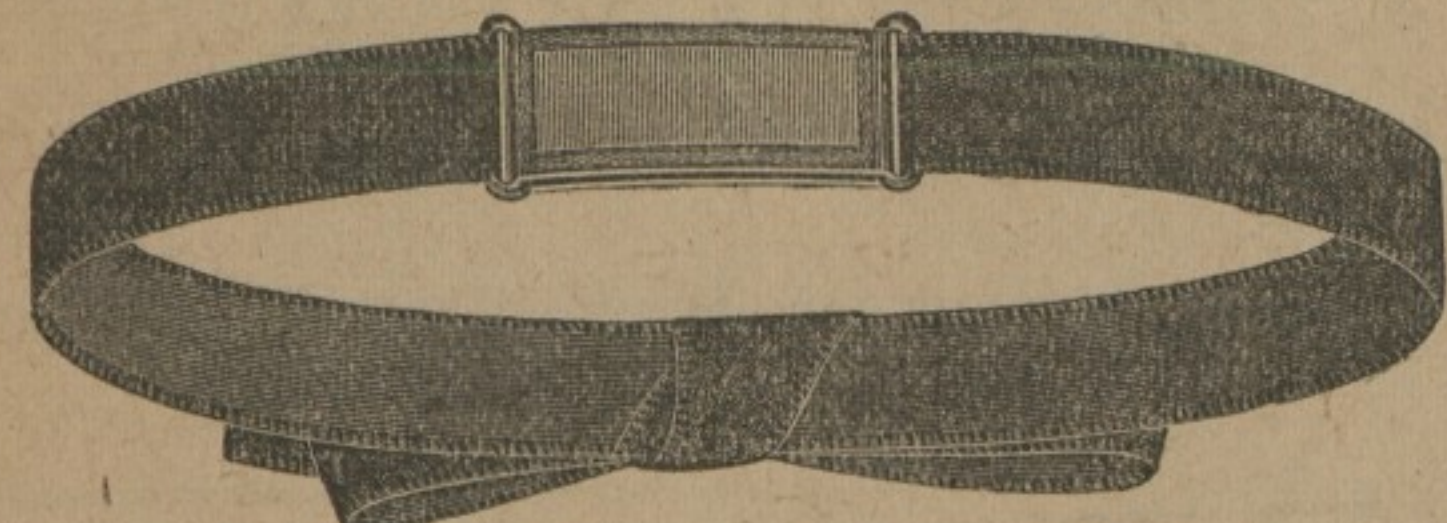

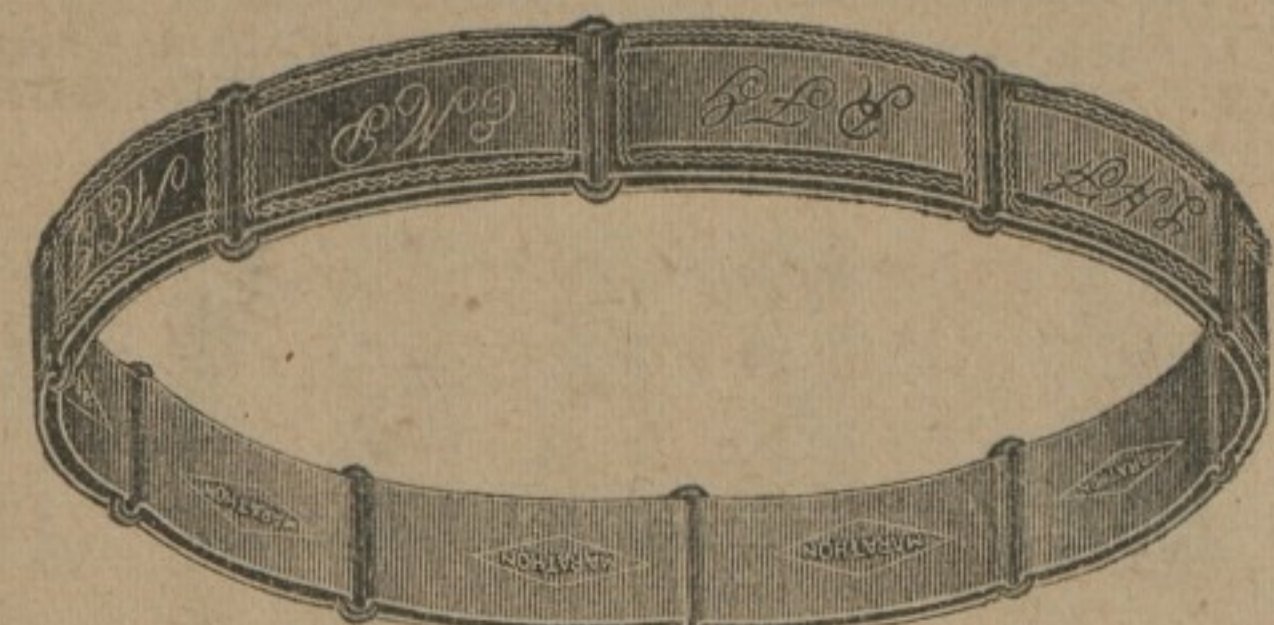

Shipping Game by Parcels Post.—As there seems to be some doubt on the part of some people about the law regarding the shipment of game by Parcels Post, we are advised that such shipment is permissible when game is intended as a gift, but not when it is shipped for sale. It may be shipped out of the county or state as a gift, but not otherwise. And it is a great deal cheaper to ship by Parcels Post than by express.
