WASHINGTON TRIUMPHS.

Humbles St. John's in One of the Greatest Games of Football Ever Seen on Washington Field.

FLOYD BROWN THE STAR.

Before the greatest crowd ever seen at a football game on Washington Field, the snappy Washington football squad humbled St. John's College last Saturday for the first time in 10 years, winning a clean cut victory by the score of 27 to 7. It was simply the triumph of superiority, and there were few if any favoring breaks.

The game was a beautiful one. It was played by both teams in a masterly manner, but the work of Floyd Brown, one of the best all-round players in the State, who was the hero of the day, and Jack Enright and Frampton, these men with the forward pass, were too great for St. John's, and they were simply out-played. The drop-kicking of Brown was the feature of the game. His 48-yard kick for a goal was excelled nowhere in the whole country except by Guernsey, of Yale, and his magnificent run on an intercepted forward pass for a distance of 80 yards for a touchdown was the most brilliant piece of work seen on the gridiron here for years.

An Optimistic View.

Roland S. Morris, chairman of the Pennsylvania Democratic State Committee, is full of optimism after a review of the field of November elections. The Democratic victory in Maryland, the close Democratic share in Kentucky and the increased Democratic vote in Massachusetts are to him harbingers of overwhelming Democratic victory in the country next year.

To Chairman Morris the situation in Massachusetts is especially encouraging. There, he says, "the Democratic candidate for governor received 56,000 more votes than Woodrow Wilson received in 1912. The Republican candidate for governor received 63,000 fewer votes than Taft and Roosevelt received in 1912. Of the 135,000 voters who voted for Roosevelt in 1912, and failed to vote the Progressive party ticket in 1915, 55,000 voted for the Democratic candidate this year. If the Democrats gain the same proportion of Progressive votes throughout the country the Democratic candidate for President in 1916 will have a clear majority of 2,000,000 votes. It is significant that in Massachusetts the so-called leaders of the Progressive party supported the Republican candidate, but the rank and file refused to follow them."

Chairman Morris may be correct in his deductions. The Massachusetts Progressives practically dropped out of the election in that State this year, but it is evident that all of them did not return to the Republican party. And if many Progressives went over to the Democrats in that State, why not in other States?

Resolutions to Town Council of Rock Hall.

MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL, Rock Hall, Md. GENTLEMEN: I beg leave to submit to you a resolution passed by the Rock Hall Driving and Improvement Association at its meeting of November 10th, 1915:

RESOLUTION. Inasmuch that the roads of Rock Hall during the winter are in a most unsatisfactory condition, and in consideration of the fact that this condition is a great extent due, and is very much aggravated by the methods adopted in cleaning out the gutters—placing the dirt removed along the sides instead of in the middle.

We, the members of the Rock Hall Driving and Improvement Association, having the interests of the community at large to heart, do hereby resolve:

- (1) That this condition be respectfully called to the attention of the Town Council by letter from our secretary with a request that all future dirt removed from the gutters be deposited in the center of the road to be left the edges lower and clear from obstruction, thereby facilitating free drainage.
- (2) That we respectfully urge the Town Council to use every effort to shell a width of at least 6 feet in the center of all roads within the town limits or as large a portion thereof as the funds at their disposal permit.
- (3) That we respectfully urge the Town Council to make every endeavor to keep all roads in the town in the best possible condition.
- (4) That this resolution as a whole be entered in the minutes of this association and be given all the publicity possible.

OUR DEATH RECORD.

MR. SNOWDEN THOMAS.

Mr. Snowden Thomas, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed residents of this county, died at the home of Mr. Frank Jester, in Rock Hall, on Friday evening, of paralysis, in the 83rd year of his age. The deceased was the son of the late John Thomas, and a brother of the late Milfin and Evans Thomas. He was born and raised in Kent county and spent most of his life in farming. He was an ardent Democrat, and though never having held political office, he was always active in the interests of his party. He never married. He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. S. L. Thomas, on Washington avenue. Funeral services were held at the grave in St. Paul's cemetery on Sunday afternoon, where interment was made, conducted by Rev. Dr. L. E. Barrett. Undertaker Charles L. Dodd had charge of the funeral arrangements. The pall-bearers were: Walter Hadaway, William DeFord, C. H. Jefferson, Frank Jester, R. Snowden Thomas and M. Wilbur Thomas.

Mrs. Ella D. Huey, wife of Mr. Adam F. Huey, died suddenly on Saturday evening at six o'clock at her home in Massey, of apoplexy, in the 51st year of her age. The sudden death of Mrs. Huey caused a profound shock to the community in which she lived, and in which she was held in the highest esteem. The deceased was before marriage a Miss Barnes, of Queen Anne county. She was interested in the welfare of her town, and was beloved by a host of friends, who regret most seriously her sudden demise. Besides her esteemed husband she leaves one daughter, Miss Margaret, who is attending Hannah Moore Academy. Funeral services were held in St. Clements' P. E. 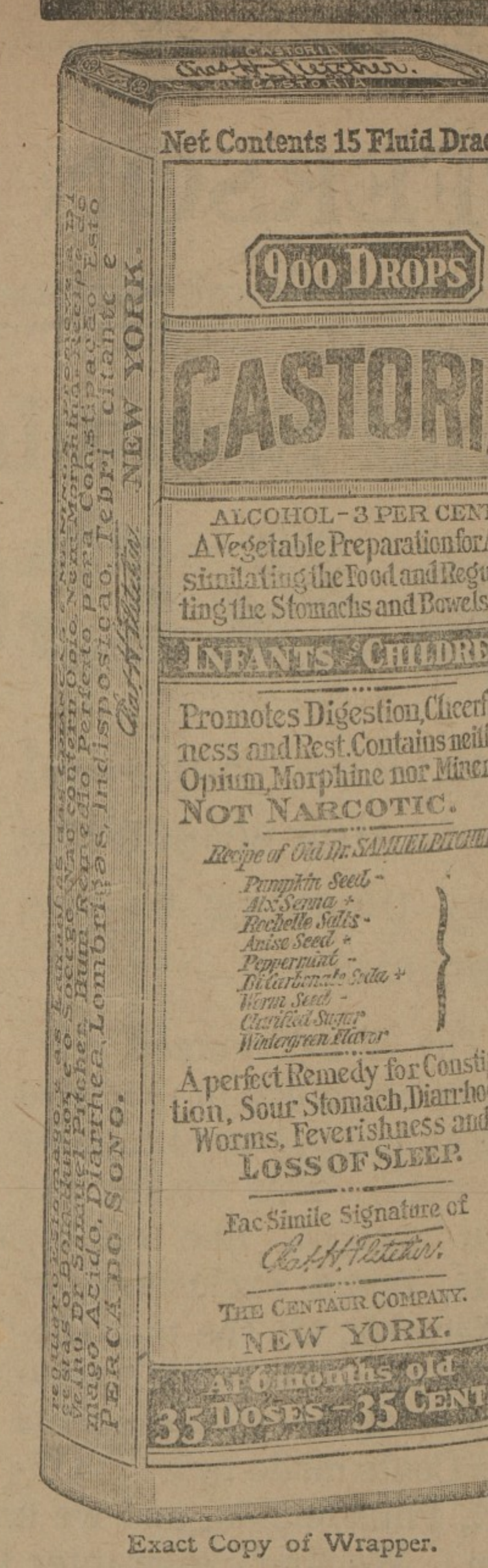
