A Distressing Accident.

Rebecca Emily, the little three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hadaway, of near the Cliffs, was hurried to death on Thursday afternoon about three o'clock. Mrs. Hadaway left her two children in the house while she went across the road for something. The screams of the youngest child attracted the mother, who had been gone less than five minutes, and rushing back she found Rebecca almost hurled to a crisp, her clothing having caught fire from a small stove in the room against which the little girl is supposed to have been playing. The news of the distressing accident spread like wild fire around the neighborhood and neighbors and friends rushed to Mrs. Hadaway's assistance. The little girl was an affectionate and attractive child, and the stricken parents have the sympathy of a host of friends. Funeral services will be held this Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock in Mowbray Chapel, conducted by Rev. O. B. Rice. Interment will be made in Chestertown cemetery. Undertaker Charles L. Dodd will have charge of the funeral arrangements.
