At all other times will be at Treasurer's Office in Chestertown. The Treasurer's Office in the Court House will not be open on the above days.

The Treasurer's Office in the Court House will be open every day except on the above dates from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M. for the receipt of Taxes. Tax-payers will please take notice that taxes will be paid and payable Sept. 1st, and that on all bills unpaid on January 1st, interest will be charged and collected from Sept. 1st. On the first day of January all taxes unpaid are declared in arrears, and delinquents will be warned that unless settlement in full is made before April 1st, the claims against them will be placed in the hands of the Treasurer of the county, who will proceed to seize and sell their property to pay the taxes due with charges and all costs of sale. The Treasurer would therefore request all tax-payers to pay promptly.

The Johns Hopkins University

State Scholarships in Engineering Courses.

Application for scholarships in the Department of Engineering established in the Johns Hopkins University under the provisions of the Laws of Maryland, Chapter 80, 1912, should now be made. Entrance examinations will be held in the building in McCoy Hall, the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, September 22-25, 1914, beginning at 9:00 A. M.

If there is more than one applicant for a particular scholarship a competitive examination will be held at the University on the day following the September entrance examinations.

Each county of the State and each Legislative District of Baltimore will be entitled to one or more scholarships for the year 1914-15. In addition to those which have already been filled, there will also be vacancies in the scholarships awarded to the graduates of Loyola College, Maryland Agricultural College, Mount St. Mary's College, Rock Hill College, St. John's College, Washington College and Western Maryland College, and in the scholarships "At Large," which may be filled in October, 1914.

Applicants should address the Registrar, the Johns Hopkins University, for blank forms of application and for further information as to the examinations, award of scholarships and courses of instruction.

GREAT RECORD FOR TYSON STABLES.

Newark Trainer Closes Season With 46 Wins Out of 88 Starts.

With 46 wins out of 88 starts to his credit Herman R. Tyson, the well-known local trainer and driver, has just returned home with his string of horses from the Southern circuit. This is not only the best year that Mr. Tyson has ever had on the tracks, but, in winning first money in 45 races, it is believed that he has established the record for the United States for 1914. No other driver, as far as is known, has won first money in that many races in a season.

Of the eleven horses that Mr. Tyson had out with him the past season, eight were trotters and three pacers. Every one of the eleven was marked this year, most of them clipping several seconds off their previous marks since joining the Tyson string. The trotters were: Rosebud McKenney, 2:12 1/2; Dick Watts, 2:14; Sadie Penn, 2:16; Miller Boy, 2:14; Karonie, 2:19; Zombro Rex, 2:19; Josephine the Great, 2:19; and Mackinaw, 2:29. The three pacers were: Joseph K. S., owned by Harry J. Stoeckle, of Wilmington, 2:13; Joe Promise, 2:15; and Grace Michael, 2:14.

Mr. Tyson opened the season at Wilmington July 15 and raced horses at the following places during the season: Wilmington, Del.; Chestertown, Md.; Tisbury, Va.; Pocomoke City, Salisbury, Cambridge, Easton, Md.; Pottstown, Pa.; Wilmington, Nazareth, Pa.; Lynchburg, Richmond, Va.; Greensboro, Raleigh, Charlotte and Tabor, N. C., where he finished last week. The complete record for the stable for the season follows:

How to Detect Foot-and-Mouth Disease and How to Handle it.

This disease begins with a very red and angry-looking sore between the two toes. This soon becomes ulcerated and then incrusts with dirt. Drooling from the mouth follows. On lifting up the lips the mucous membrane will be found to be ulcerated in irregular lines, running often up into the nostrils.

TREATMENT.

Isolate at once the animals in which the disease appears and those who have been anywhere near them. Establish an absolute quarantine of the farm. Do not go near or touch the cow unless you are wearing a rubber coat, rubber boots and rubber gloves. Disinfect these as soon as you leave with a 5 per cent. solution of carbolic acid. Communicate by telegraph or telephone with the State Bureau of Animal Industry. If the disease is found, the animal must be killed at once, as well as those which have been exposed to it. The ones that have not contracted the disease may be used for food. Everything that has been near the cow or may have been a possible source of infection must be disinfected.

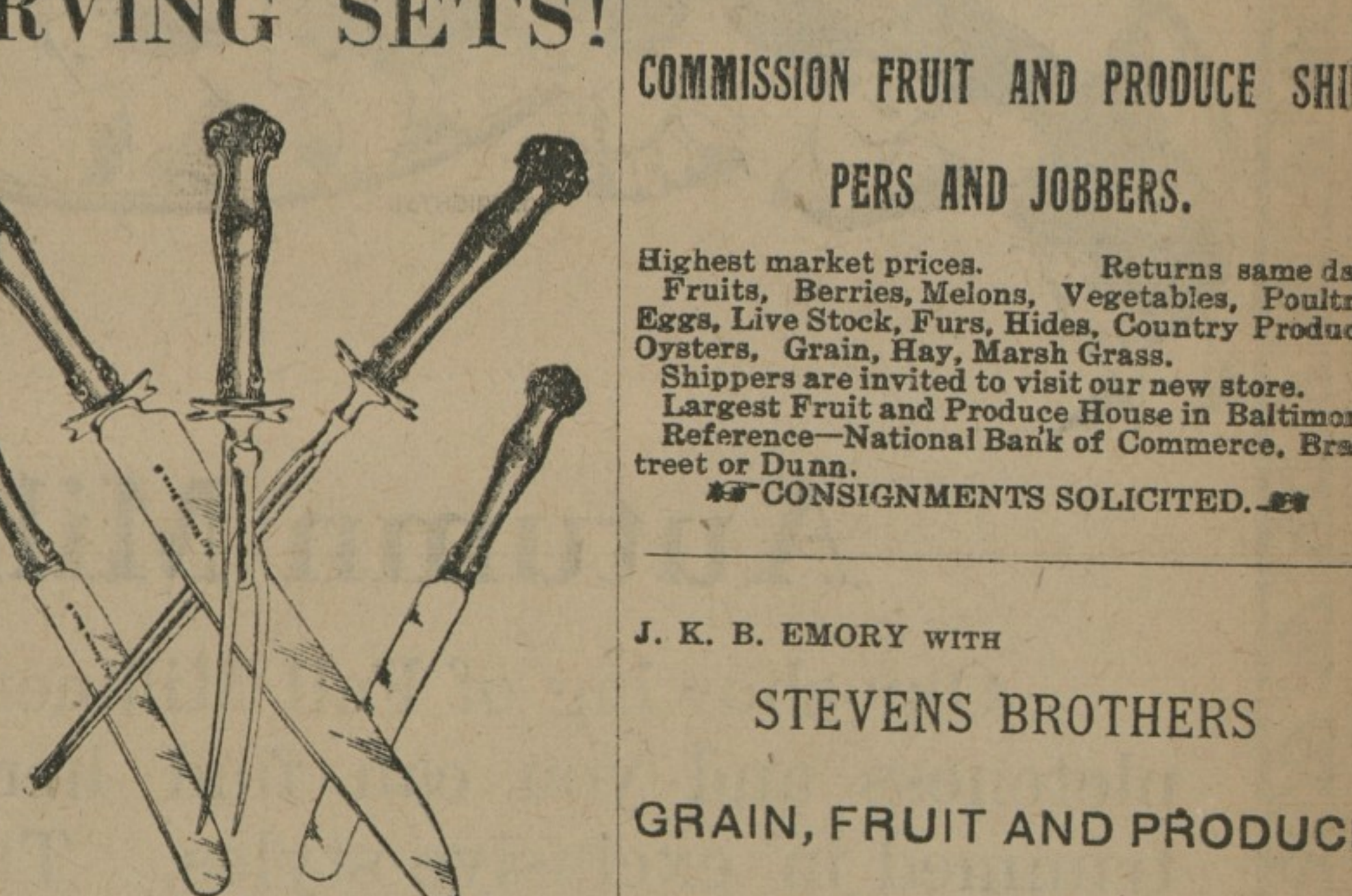
