REVENUE STAMPS ON NOTES

The new War Tax internal revenue law provides that on and after December 1, 1914, every promissory note and every renewal thereof, shall have attached to it a revenue stamp or stamps of the value of 2c, for each \$100 or fraction thereof. The person using or affixing the stamp must write or stamp thereon, the initials of his name, and the date upon which the same shall be attached or used.

EXAMPLE

A note for \$100 or less will require a two-cent stamp. A note for over \$100 up to \$200 will require four cents in stamps.

A note for over \$200 up to \$300 will require six cents in stamps. Each additional \$100 or fraction thereof will require two cents, whatever the amount of the note.

Each note or check protested will be subject to a stamp tax of twenty-five cents, in addition to the regular protest fees.

To Drive Ten Wells and Erect Tank.

The Chestertown Water Board has begun a movement which will not only furnish an abundant supply of fine water for the town but which will also afford adequate protection against fire. The board has been working upon the plan quietly for the past month or more, and they have recently obtained the consent of the State Board of Health to drive the wells and erect a 100,000-gallon elevated tank. The board has purchased Mr. Robert J. McWhorter's lot on Philosopher's Terrace, where it is at work driving the wells, and they have also purchased of Col. S. L. Wright his lot at the intersection of College and Washington avenues, where they will erect the tank on an elevation of 80 feet. An 8-inch main will be run from the pump house out Philosopher's Terrace to the road on the south of the property of Mr. C. L. Jarrell, out this road to Washington Avenue and hence to the tank on the Wright lot. The tank will also be connected with eight and ten-inch piping to the 6-inch main on College avenue, thus affording two sources of outlet for the water in the tank in time of fire. The old reservoir, which has been the leech in the water system for years, will be abandoned. The 100,000-gallon tank on an elevation of 80 feet will furnish a pressure of 65 pounds in the mains, which is regarded as adequate protection against any kind of a fire. Three wells have been dug on the McWhorter lot varying in capacity from 15 to 45 gallons per minute. It is estimated that the cost of digging the ten wells will be from \$1000 to \$1500. The entire improvement will cost about \$15,000 and will be ready for service about April 1. The Water Board is to be commended upon this greatly needed improvement which should have been made three years ago, when the town issues and Raymond Carr.
