DEATHS

Mrs. Harry Gill, daughter of Mrs. and the late Mr. George B. Westcott, of this town, died on Monday evening at her home in Washington aged 32 years. Mrs. Gill has been in ill health for some time and her husband took her to Albuquerque, New Mexico, where they had lived some years, hoping she might be benefited. They returned to Washington last summer, where Mr. Gill had an important position with the government.

Mrs. Gill is survived by her husband, mother, three sisters, Mrs. R. H. Rogers, Mrs. Miss Polly Westcott, of Chestertown, and Mrs. Wilbur Gill, of Washington, and three brothers, Mr. Simon Westcott, of Chestertown, Mr. Joseph Westcott, of Swedesboro, New Jersey, and Mr. Ned Westcott, of Oklahoma.

The funeral took place from her mother's residence on Water St on Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock, Dr. Martin officiating, interment in Chester cemetery.

Mrs. Gill had a large number of friends in Chestertown where her girlhood was spent.

The pall bearers were R. G. Parks, R. H. Rogers, Charles E. Nicholson, Harry Nichols, Charles W. Kihler, Jr., Wilbur D. Gill. Interment in Chester cemetery. Chas. L. Dodd, undertaker.

Mr. John W. Boggs, one of the most progressive and leading citizens of Crumpton, died at his home in the town Friday last, Jan. 18, aged 76 years. Mr. Boggs was born in New Castle County, Del., May 7, 1841, and came to Maryland in 1864, where he has since resided. He was numbered among our best farmers and was a large land owner in both Kent and Queen Anne counties. He was active in his church and was a consistent member.

He is survived by a widow, Mrs. Mary A. Boggs, two sons, William D. and Charles W. Boggs, and one daughter, Mrs. Joel R. Clements, Jr. His funeral took place Wednesday, Jan. 23. Interment in Crumpton cemetery.

Mr. Clarence Jacobs, of Wilmington, Del., died Saturday morning at home of his wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Carter, Sr., of tubercular pneumonia, aged 29 years. He is survived by one brother, Rev. D. W. Jacobs, Rehoboth, Del. His remains were taken away by train on Tuesday morning and funeral services were held at 12 o'clock in Kenton M. E. Church, conducted by Rev. J. L. Johnson, his former pastor. His class mates at school acted as pall bearers. The interment was in the family burying grounds at Smyrna. C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

Mr. Asbury Ruth, a well-known citizen of upper Kent, died at his home in Galena after a lingering illness, last Saturday, aged 79 years. The deceased was never married, and is survived by four nieces. Funeral services were held Tuesday from Olivet M. E. Church, with interment in the adjoining cemetery. Undertaker W. T. Hicks had charge of funeral arrangements.

Mr. Edward James Kennard died on Jan. 21 at his residence 2322 N. Calvert St., Baltimore. Mr. Kennard was the son of Mrs. Mary Kennard Skirven of this county and the late John Kennard, of Cecil Co. He spent his boyhood in Wilmington, where his father was a member of the large firm of Kennard & Co. For some years he practiced law in St. Paul, Minn., afterwards removing to Chestertown, where his family resided and continuing his practice here. While here he married Miss Emma Sparks, of this town. He later engaged in farming near I. U. Church, but for some years previous to his death was in the real estate business in Baltimore. For the last year he has been in declining health. To all who knew him, he was the courteous, polished gentleman, always standing for the best and highest things in life, a devoted husband, father and son and to his bereaved family we extend our deepest sympathy. He is survived by his widow and two daughters, Misses Mary and Genevieve Kennard, his mother, Mrs. Mary Skirven, one brother, Mr. Charles Kennard, and a sister, Miss Addie Groom Kennard.

The funeral services were held at the grave, yesterday morning, conducted by Rev. J. L. Ward, interment in Chester cemetery. The bearers were: Joel H. Smith, Ringgold Jones, E. W. Emory, Edw. Wilkins, Harry Nichols, Frank Hepbron. Undertaker C. L. Dodd.
