A NEAR-BLIZZARD HITS
KENT COUNTY HARD

Roads, Fields and Woods Buried Be-
neath Over A Half-Foot of Snow

Kent County people awoke Monday
morning to find the county, already
white in a mantle of snow, buried be-
neath over a half-foot more of the
same fleecy whiteness.

Drifts, several feet high, blocked the
roads of the county, kept the rural
carriers off the roads, caused the Kent
train to be two and a half hours late,
added to the general discomfort of
Kent county people and caused fur-
ther loss among the game of the
county.

The county, for the first few hours
after daybreak, seemed in the grip of
a blizzard that threatened to bury it
deep, but before noon the snow had
stopped falling and the sun soon broke
through the lowering clouds, while the
air, keen at sunrise, before the sun had
sunk behind the dazzling-white
horizon line of Kent, had assumed a
much warmer degree.

Tuesday was a veritable April day,
and the country people, who on Mon-
day had kept close to the blazing
hearth, on Tuesday sallied forth and
came to Chestertown in large num-
bers and the tinkle of the sleigh bells
murmured gently but frequently on
the balmy breeze.

The sleighing has been excellent all
the week and the fastest horses of the
county, driven by young and elderly
men, who seemed to be fearless in
their sport, have enlivened things in
Chestertown with their exciting con-
tests.

In Chestertown, in spite of the fact
that the storm was surging here, and
the blinding pellets made even walking
almost impossible, Officer Samuel E.
Cooper, always looking out for the in-
terests and convenience of the people,
had his snow plows out at daybreak,
and instead of the residents being
compelled to plow through the drifts,
they had good walks. Even in large
cities where we have resided we have
never seen snow cleared away so
quickly, and that Chestertown people
have appreciated the same is evident
by the many complimentary remarks
we have heard regarding Officer Cooper's
prompt work Monday morning.

How The Weather Effects The
Game.—Mr. W. T. Brice, of Lankford,
was in the office the other day. Mr.
Brice was asked regarding the condi-
tion of rabbits and birds and replied
that rabbits suffered very little from
this weather—only when they were
caught beneath a big drift of snow and
could not get out. Quail are the ones
that die, Mr. Brice said, because, hid-
ded in groups upon the ground, the
snow covers them and causes them to
suffocate.

KENT COUNTY LADY TELLS
HOW TO SAVE THE FLOUR

We Must Save The Cereal And This
Is How You Can Do It

In my Sally Landon of last week,
there was a mistake. The liquid
should have been 1 and one-half cups
of milk and same of water. We must
have just half as much liquid as other
things, and if we do not use an egg,
must add a quarter cup more of milk
to take the place.

Now, when we are forced to buy
and use something else than wheat
flour, it is interesting to me to try out
corn-meal mush in things. I find that
anything at all into which I put it,
comes out better than ever. I make
it in this way: Two cups of meal and
a little more than that of hot water
(not boiling), mix this well, and let it
cook slowly for half an hour or more.
Then add the same amount of flour,
with five level teaspoons of yeast pow-
der and one egg, or six of yeast pow-
der if your hens are not doing as you
should. Thin down with milk as you
want it, and a pinch of salt and sugar.

This is fine for waffles, pancakes or
griddle cakes, and if your mush is
well made, and cooked in a double
boiler for a long time, you can add it
to ginger bread and light bread also.

Now, I know you will agree with me
that it will be no hardship to eat these
things, you will just wonder why you
have not been doing it all along. Lots
of folks always do make things this
way, but there are lots more who don't
and to them I hope the luck will
come. Remember you DON'T HAVE
TO HAVE EGGS! Add one spoonful of
baking powder for each absent egg,
and to make the camouflage complete,
three drops of butter coloring! And
I defy any mere man to detect it. If
eggs are used, you will have greater
food value in your bread, same ap-
plies with milk, but you can make
these things without either, and be far
from starving.
