## EVENTS OF IMPORTANCE PICKED UP AT THE POSTOFFICE

Brief Items Of Interest From The Most Frequent Place Here

Through the recommendation of Postmaster T. D. Bowers, the Postoffice Dept. is preparing to establish double mail service between here and Rock Hall and has advertised for bids for carrier service for a term of four years, beginning March 1. For some time Postmaster Bowers has been at work upon this plan, and when the matter was properly brought to the attention of the Postoffice Department, it considered the proposition a practical one, and proceeded to take steps looking to the establishment of the service. The double trip service will give the people of the lower section of the county practically the same mail facilities as are now enjoyed by the Patrons of the Chestertown office. There will be two round trips a day, the morning mail leaving Rock Hall at 6 a. m. and reaching the Chestertown office in time for the outgoing morning mail, and the afternoon mail will leave Rock Hall at 12.40 p. m., arriving here in time for the outgoing afternoon mail. This arrangement will give the people of the lower section two mails both ways each day in the week except Sunday, and will greatly increase the advantage of the shippers of that section for keeping in touch with the markets. The new service will begin on Friday, March 1.

Hugo Franz Emil Kotel, who receives mail from both Chestertown and Millington postoffices, appeared before Postmaster Bowers on Wednesday and was duly registered. Each registrant is required to familiarize himself with the requirements of the registration blank and from 10 to 15 days after the last day of the registration he is required to present himself at his postoffice and apply for a registration card. He must furnish to the registration official four photographs of himself not larger than 3 inches by 3 inches, which must be attached to each affidavit and to the registration card. A full description of the registrant must also be taken. Any Alien Enemy found without a registration card ten or fifteen days after the expiration of the time for registration, will be subject to heavy penalty.

An examination to fill the vacancy on the rural route from Worton Postoffice caused by the resignation of Mr. Hugh Wallis, will be held in the High School building this morning, beginning promptly at 11.30 o'clock. There are about twelve applicants for the place.
