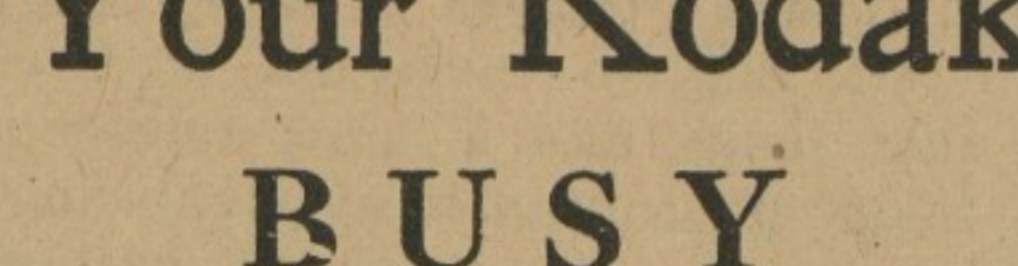

Mrs. Nina Hepburn, wife of the Rev. S. S. Hepburn, rector of I. U. Parish, died at his home near Still Pond at 1 a. m. on Tuesday morning. Mrs. Hepburn has been in failing health for some months, but for the past few weeks had seemed much better and her many friends were unprepared to hear of her death. Mrs. Hepburn, before marriage, was a Miss Powell, of Virginia, and comes from a long line of distinguished ancestry. She was a woman of rare culture and marked intelligence, a beautiful Christian character, active in all work of the church and an ideal clergyman's wife. In everything that pertained to the uplift and welfare of the community in which she lived she was a most earnest worker. In all diocesan work she took an active interest and her loss will be greatly felt. She is survived by her husband, three sons, Dr. Sewell Hepburn, of Annapolis, Dr. Norval Hepburn, of Hartford, Conn., and Mr. Lloyd Hepburn, of New York, and one daughter, Mrs. Hopkins, of Gloucester Co., Virginia. She was 75 years old.

To her honored and revered husband we extend our deepest sympathy. Funeral services were held in I. U. church yesterday at noon, conducted by Rev. Peregrine Wroth, assisted by Rev. Dr. Henry B. Martin. The bearers were A. N. Stavely, Harry Stavely, Edward Hepburn, William Hepburn, P. A. M. Brooks, and Harry Nicols. Undertaker Krusen has charge of the funeral arrangements.

Mrs. Armina G. Hadaway, wife of Mr. George M. Hadaway, died at her late home, in Quaker Neck, last Saturday morning at about two o'clock, aged 50 years, after a lingering illness of tubercular trouble. She is survived by her husband and one daughter, Mrs. Ellston L. Brown. Mrs. Sarah C. Wright died at her residence on High St., Chestertown, Thursday morning, aged 86 years. She leaves one son, Mr. James W. Wright, of Chestertown. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today conducted by Rev. T. F. Beauchamp. C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

Mrs. Perry Wickes, wife of Ex-Judge Perry Wickes, formerly of Kent Co., died at her home in Baltimore Monday. She was before marriage a Miss Welch.
