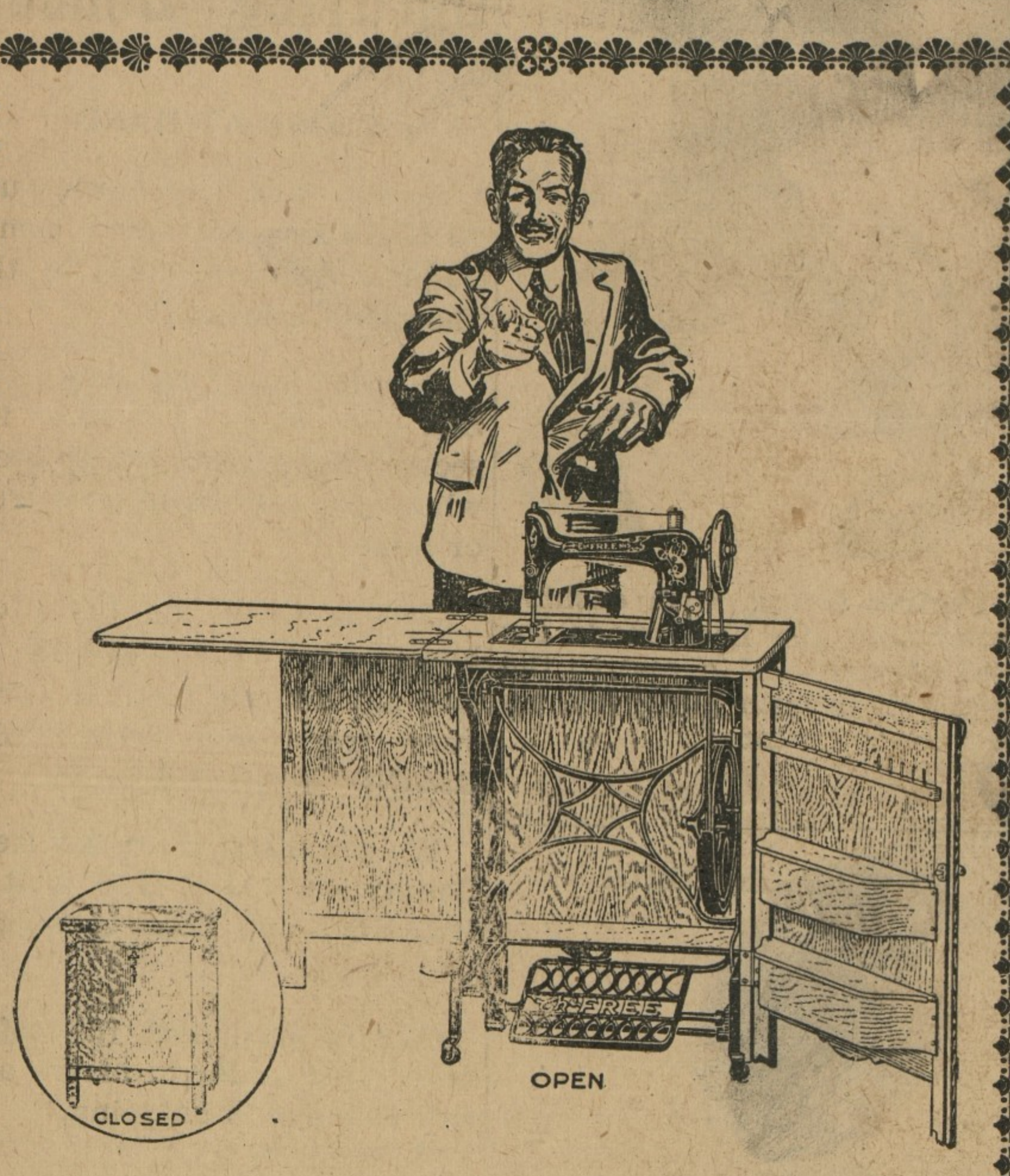

AN EXPLANATION

Chestertown, March 20, 1918.
Messrs. Editors Transcript:
I wish to make a little explanation in reply to the head line in the Kent News Saturday, March 16, 1918, "No Price Limit Fixed For Tomato Growers" which Mr. Hoover tries to explain was not intended to fix the price on tomatoes, yet he issued circulars signed "Food Commission" to every grower in the East to render tenders to the Army and Navy on the basis of \$21.00 per ton for raw material.

I want to ask the Kent News who were to furnish the tomatoes to the canneries? They, the Army and Navy, also served notice on the canner that he was to reserve thirty-five per cent of his pack for their use. That puts the balance, sixty-five per cent, on the open market, the canner and the broker to get the highest price possible for it.

The head line inferred to me that the committee went to Washington on a "fool's errand" and tries to reflect on the farmers' intelligence, of whom the News has always had loyal support.

It only shows that Mr. Henry Burden, who is purchasing agent for the Army and Navy, also President of the National Canners and Packers Association, could put his finger on this sixty-five per cent of the 1918 pack on a minutes notice, and place it at any price to suit himself.

I wish to say, however, that no one man deserves any special credit for the change in price. It was the quick organization that was gotten together on short notice that brought it about. A patriotic set of farmers led by two Congressmen from Maryland, Hon. J. D. Price and Charles Linthicum, also Congress Polk of Delaware.

There seems to be a little misunderstanding on the part of the packer to sign contracts at 50 cents a basket, but in my presence the Congressmen told the Army and Navy that they would be protected by the Government that they could not take these tomatoes from the packer at a loss. They must pay cost, plus a profit.

First Anniversary of Great War

The approach of the first anniversary of the entrance of the United States into the world war finds Maryland living up to every tradition of her founders.

When the autocratic tyrants of the Central Powers shall have been forced to lay down their arms in favor of world democracy, the State that produced the author and birthplace of the National Anthem will not be ashamed of the part it took in the greatest conflict in the history of civilization, for Maryland is one of the foremost leaders among the states in sending her young men to the defence of the colors.

It is in the hope that this most enviable reputation may be maintained that the Navy recruiting authorities are bending every effort to raise the last quota assigned the State, by the Bureau of Navigation.

This quota is composed of Quartermasters' and Carpenters' Mates for the Aviation Branch of the Navy or Naval Reserve.

Lieut. M. A. Lally, in charge of Navy recruiting in Maryland, will also enroll men in the Naval Reserves and there are very good opportunities for ambitious young men in this branch where seamen are especially needed.

Full particulars can be obtained from the nearest postmaster; directly from the Navy Recruiting Station, Calvert and Lexington Sts., Baltimore, or from the Navy Recruiting Substations at Cumberland and Hagerstown.

—Caroline, Queen Anne, Talbot, Worcester and Wicomico each has presented a favorite son for Congressional honors, and now Dorchester county has one in the person of Governor Harrington, it is reported. Kent, to date, has not put forward a Congressional aspirant.

ORDER OF PUBLICATION

In the Circuit Court for Kent County.
In Equity No. 2042.

Bessie May Lambert
vs.
Thomas Clarence Lambert.

The object of the Bill filed in the above entitled case is to procure a Divorce, a "vinculo matrimonii," for the Plaintiff, a resident of Kent County Maryland, from the Defendant. The Bill states:

1. That on the 7th day of October, 1902, she was married unto Thomas Clarence Lambert, with whom she resided in Kent County, in the State of Maryland, until about the 8th day of July, 1914.

2. That the conduct of your Oratrix towards her husband, the said Thomas Clarence Lambert had always been kind, affectionate and above reproach; the said Thomas Clarence Lambert has, without any just cause or reason, abandoned and deserted her, and has declared his intention to live with her no longer, and that such abandonment has continued uninterrupted for at least three years and is deliberate and final, and the separation of the parties is beyond any reasonable expectation of reconciliation. Your Oratrix does not know her husband's whereabouts but when she last heard from him he was said to be in the State of New Jersey.

3. That your Oratrix and the said Thomas Clarence Lambert have three children born to them from said marriage, the eldest of whom is a girl and her said husband since he deserted your Oratrix has never seen her nor his children and has contributed only \$30 towards the support of his children, but has never contributed to or for the support during the last three years or longer.

It is thereupon this 25th day of February A. D. 1918 Ordered by the Circuit Court for Kent County, in Equity, that the Plaintiff by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in said Kent County once in each of four successive weeks before the 1st day of April next, giving notice to the said Thomas Clarence Lambert, non-resident defendant, warning him to appear in this Court in person, or by solicitor, on or before the 15th day of his, why a decree ought not to be April next to show cause, if any he passed as prayed.

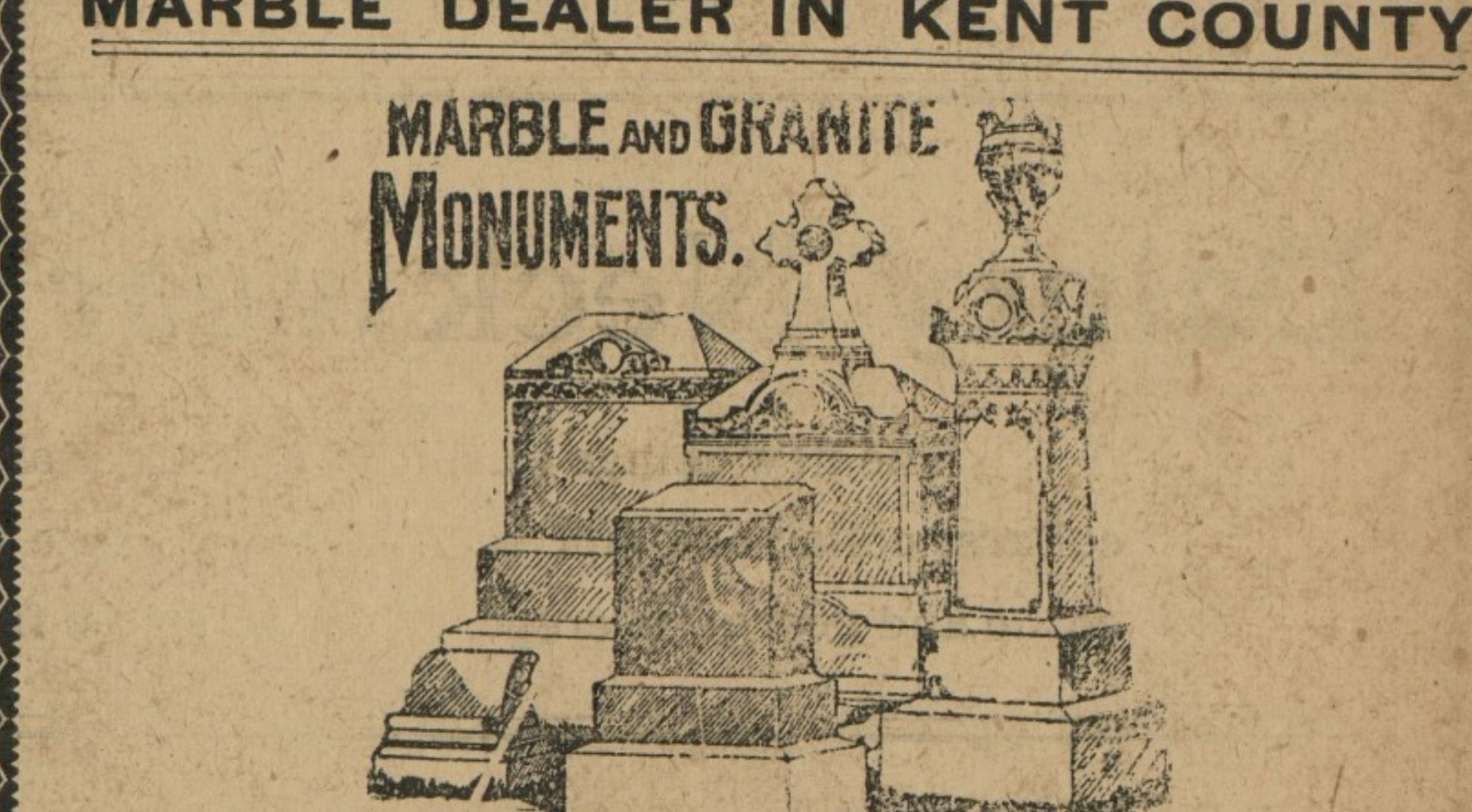
